

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4—COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

FEBRUARY 26, 2010

Referred to Committee of the Whole

SUMMARY—Temporarily provides flexibility for school districts from the requirements of class-size reduction. (BDR S-37)

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EXPLANATION – Matter in ***bolded italics*** is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; temporarily providing flexibility for school districts from the requirements of pupil-teacher ratios; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 Existing law prescribes certain ratios of pupils per teacher in grades 1 through
2 3. (NRS 388.700) In counties whose population is less than 100,000, a school
3 district may adopt an alternative plan for class-size reduction for specified grade
4 levels in the elementary schools, including grades 4, 5 and 6. (NRS 388.720) The
5 2009 Session of the Nevada Legislature appropriated money for school districts to
6 implement their class-size reduction plans. (Sections 17 through 21, inclusive,
7 chapter 389, Statutes of Nevada 2009, pp. 2134-2136) This bill temporarily revises
8 provisions governing class-size reduction to allow school districts flexibility in
9 addressing budget shortfalls. For the 2010-2011 school year, this bill allows a
10 school district to elect to increase class size by not more than two pupils to achieve
11 ratios of 18 pupils per teacher in grades 1 and 2, and 21 pupils per teacher in grade
12 3. If a school district elects to increase class size in this manner, all money that
13 would have otherwise been expended by the school district to achieve the lower
14 class sizes in grades 1 through 3 must be used to minimize the impact of budget
15 reductions on class sizes in grades 4 through 12. This exception applies only for the
16 2010-2011 school year and sunsets on June 30, 2011.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Section 17 of chapter 389, Statutes of Nevada 2009,
2 at page 2134, is hereby amended to read as follows:

3 Sec. 17. The Legislature hereby finds and declares that:

4 1. The intended goal of the Legislature is to achieve a
5 pupil-teacher ratio of not more than 15 pupils per teacher or
6 30 pupils per two teachers in kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and
7 3 where core curriculum is taught;

8 2. Available money is estimated to provide a sufficient
9 number of teachers to achieve in each school district pupil-
10 teacher ratios of 16 pupils per teacher in selected kindergarten
11 classrooms in which pupils are most at risk of failure and in
12 grades 1 and 2 in Fiscal Years 2009-2010 and 2010-2011, and
13 to achieve a pupil-teacher ratio in grade 3 of 19 pupils per
14 teacher in Fiscal Years 2009-2010 and 2010-2011;

15 *3. For the 2010-2011 Fiscal Year, available money is
16 estimated to achieve the ratios set forth in subsection 2.
17 However, in recognition of the significant downturn in the
18 national and state economies and to allow school districts
19 flexibility in addressing budget shortfalls during this fiscal
20 crisis and notwithstanding the provisions of NRS 388.700,
21 388.710 and 388.720 to the contrary, a school district may,
22 for the 2010-2011 school year, elect to increase the class
23 size by not more than two pupils per teacher to achieve
24 ratios of 18 pupils per teacher in grades 1 and 2, and 21
25 pupils per teacher in grade 3. If a school district elects to
26 increase class size as authorized by this subsection:*

27 *(a) All money that would have otherwise been expended
28 by the school district to achieve the class sizes set forth in
29 subsection 2 must be used to minimize the impact of budget
30 reductions on class sizes in grades 4 to 12, inclusive;*

31 *(b) The reduction of class sizes in grades 4 to 12,
32 inclusive, must be fiscally neutral such that the plan to
33 reduce the ratios in those grades will not cost more to carry
34 out than complying with the ratios prescribed by subsection
35 2; and*

36 *(c) All plans and reports concerning class size made by
37 the school district to the Department of Education must
38 include the pupil-teacher ratios achieved for each grade
39 level, including grades 1, 2 and 3 and grades 4 to 12,
40 inclusive;*

1 **[3.] 4.** Certain school districts do not have a sufficient
2 number of classrooms available to permit an average class
3 size of 19 pupils per teacher in grade 3;

4 **[4.] 5.** It is unreasonable to assign two teachers to
5 classrooms of 38 pupils to attain a district-wide pupil-teacher
6 ratio of 19 pupils per teacher in grade 3;

7 **[5.] 6.** School districts may, instead, attain the desired
8 pupil-teacher ratio in classes where core curriculum is taught
9 by using alternative methods of reducing the ratio, such as
10 employing teachers to provide remedial instruction;

11 **[6.] 7.** School districts may wish to use money for class-
12 size reduction to carry out programs that have been found to
13 be effective in improving academic achievement;

14 **[7.] 8.** The Legislature has specifically designed the
15 laws relating to class-size reduction to allow the local school
16 districts the necessary discretion to effectuate the reduction in
17 the manner appropriate in their respective districts;

18 **[8.] 9.** School districts are encouraged, to the extent
19 possible, to further reduce the pupil-teacher ratio in each
20 classroom in the district for grades 1, 2 and 3 for which
21 additional funding is provided;

22 **[9.] 10.** The Legislature intends to continue the reduced
23 pupil-teacher ratio for selected kindergarten classrooms in
24 which pupils are most at risk of failure and for grades 1 and 2
25 throughout the State and to continue reducing the pupil-
26 teacher ratio in grade 3; and

27 **[10.] 11.** Thereafter, the intended goal of the Legislature
28 is to reduce the pupil-teacher ratio per class in grade 3 to not
29 more than 15 pupils per class, thereafter to reduce the pupil-
30 teacher ratio per class in grades 4, 5 and 6 to not more than 22
31 pupils per class and thereafter to reduce the pupil-teacher
32 ratio per class in grades 7 to 12, inclusive, to not more than
33 25 pupils per class.

34 **Sec. 2.** Section 19 of chapter 389, Statutes of Nevada 2009, at
35 page 2135, is hereby amended to read as follows:

36 Sec. 19. 1. The Department of Education shall transfer
37 from the State Distributive School Account the sum of
38 \$145,935,501 for distribution by the Superintendent of Public
39 Instruction to the county school districts for Fiscal Year
40 2010-2011 which must, except as otherwise provided in
41 sections 20 and 21 of this act, be used to employ teachers to
42 comply with the required ratio of pupils to teachers, as set
43 forth in NRS 388.700, in grades 1 and 2 and in selected
44 kindergartens with pupils who are considered at risk of failure
45 by the Superintendent of Public Instruction and to maintain

1 the current ratio of pupils per teacher in grade 3. Expenditures
2 for the class-size reduction program must be accounted for in
3 a separate category of expenditure in the State Distributive
4 School Account.

5 2. Except as otherwise provided in **subsection 3 of**
6 **section 17 of this act and** sections 20 and 21 of this act, the
7 money transferred by subsection 1 must be used to pay the
8 salaries and benefits of not less than 2,163 teachers employed
9 by school districts to meet the required pupil-teacher ratios in
10 the 2010-2011 school year.

11 3. Any remaining balance of the sum transferred by
12 subsection 1, including any money added thereto pursuant to
13 section 18 of this act, must not be committed for expenditure
14 after June 30, 2011, and must be reverted to the State General
15 Fund on or before September 16, 2011.

16 **Sec. 3.** Section 20 of chapter 389, Statutes of Nevada 2009, at
17 page 2135, is hereby amended to read as follows:

18 Sec. 20. 1. The board of trustees of each county
19 school district:

20 (a) Shall file a plan with the Superintendent of Public
21 Instruction describing how the money appropriated by
22 ~~sections 18 and 19~~ **section 18** of this act will be used to
23 comply with the required ratio of pupils to teachers in
24 kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3 ~~or~~ and **how the money**
25 **appropriated by section 19 of this act will be used to comply**
26 **with the required ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten**
27 **and grades 1, 2 and 3 or with the ratio authorized by**
28 **subsection 3 of section 17 of this act; or**

29 (b) May, after receiving approval of the plan from the
30 Superintendent of Public Instruction, use the money
31 appropriated by sections 18 and 19 of this act to carry out:

32 (1) An alternative program for reducing the ratio of
33 pupils per teacher, including, without limitation, any
34 legislatively approved program of flexibility; or

35 (2) Programs of remedial education that have been
36 found to be effective in improving pupil achievement in
37 grades 1, 2 and 3, so long as the combined ratio of pupils per
38 teacher in the aggregate of kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3
39 of the school district does not exceed the combined ratio of
40 pupils per teacher in the aggregate of kindergarten and grades
41 1, 2 and 3 of the school district in the 2004-2005 school year.

42 ➔ The plan approved by the Superintendent of Public
43 Instruction must describe the method to be used by the school
44 district to evaluate the effectiveness of the alternative

1 program or remedial education programs in improving pupil
2 achievement.

3 2. In no event must the provisions of this section be
4 construed to authorize the board of trustees of a school
5 district in a county whose population is 100,000 or more to
6 develop an alternative plan for the reduction of pupil-teacher
7 ratios pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 388.720.

8 **Sec. 4.** This act becomes effective upon passage and approval
9 and expires by limitation on June 30, 2011.
