REMARKS FROM THE FLOOR

Assemblyman Yeager requested that the following remarks be included in the journal.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN TITUS:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to this body. It has been a long day, lots of negotiation looking for the right thing to do for the state of Nevada. As somebody whose great-grandfather came to this state as a miner in the 1860s, I have to rise in support of mining for our great state. We heard a lot of negative comments in some of the testimony about how horrible it is. I would submit to you that all of us have on our desks some sort of technology, whether it is your phone or your computer; we might have a wedding band or other types of jewelry, and I will tell you that Nevada mining has produced components contained in these. Many of the small components, some of those chemicals and minerals that you heard our fiscal analyst mention, come from Nevada mines.

We have an incredible regulatory system here in Nevada that puts these companies through a lot. They work hard and they provide the best paying jobs in our state. If we do not keep our

mining in Nevada where we can monitor mines through regulation, we will be getting these products from foreign countries who have very little mining regulation. If you do not think that impacts our world and our environment—I am proud of the job that Nevada mining does. I would hope that the next time you use your phone or turn on some technology, or you look at your wedding ring, you appreciate what Nevada mining has done for not only our state but for our nation and for our world. So let us not be too hard on Nevada mining.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN HANSEN:

I rise to also offer some of my thoughts on mining. I do not stand here today in defense of mining because of any money I might have received from mining. You can check my C and E report [contributions and expenses]. I have received donations and appreciate those. That is not my motivation. In fact, if we are going to go down that road, the money from Bloomberg for the gun bills would be far in excess of any influence mining has had in this building.

I come to the body today about mining from a heritage standpoint. My family traded the coal mines in the late 1800s in Wales to come to Nevada, to Lincoln County, to try to eke out an existence. It is a rough life; it is a tough life. It is subject to the gyrations of a very volatile market. Mining is subject to the whims of the national economy and the laws that we make here in this body. I have been offended by some of the slaps at mining today. I represent 38,000 square miles of Nevada, seven counties in which mining has a large presence. I stand here today for those in those communities that work underground, that work above ground, that work long days, that are compensated by fair companies who pay them on average \$90,000 a year. Over 33,000 jobs in Nevada are in mining. On top of the net proceeds tax, which is an industry specific tax that only three other businesses in this state pay, mining also pays the modified business tax and the property tax. They did not get a tax credit or an abatement on property taxes. They pay sales tax and then on top of all those taxes that go into the state coffers they pay the net proceeds on minerals and royalties taxes.

In the communities where these mines reside, they are huge partners. They give to the schools, they buy buses for the teams, they offer apprenticeship programs, and they offer scholarships. They walk the talk. And in the vastness of this state—I have been all over, across hills and valleys, it is a beautiful sagebrush green state—the footprint of mining is less than a half a percent of 1 percent of the 70 million acres of land that we have in Nevada. The actual usage is even smaller than that

I just wanted to put on the record that mining has been a great contributor to the state of Nevada. Historically we are the Silver State. The President needed our state for the war effort to win in the Civil War and to defeat the scourge that slavery was. We have played a part in that and mining was a part of that as well. I stand here as a proud Nevadan, a proud member of a mining heritage, and grateful that the mining industry is willing to make this accelerated net proceeds payment.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN BILBRAY-AXELROD:

I apologize that I cannot be there in the Chamber. As a third generation Nevadan—my father was born in Las Vegas in 1938—I think I am very aware of what mining has and has not done for this state. And it is high time, as southern Nevadans especially with 78 percent of the state population, we recognize that it is time they pay their fair share. Honestly, this bill does not do nearly enough, not nearly enough. Thank you for what you have to say about mining, and I am so happy that they are here in Nevada and rake the earth. But this is our state, this is all of our state, and they do things that are not right and you know it. It is high time they pay. This is not the end of it.

Assemblyman Yeager moved that the Assembly adjourn until Thursday, July 16, 2020, at 10 a.m.
