ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 681–COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

March 22, 1999

Referred to Committee on Health and Human Services

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing investigations of criminal histories of certain persons employed by or associated with medical facilities and certain facilities for dependents. (BDR 40-1612)

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EXPLANATION - Matter in bolded italics is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to health care facilities; requiring the investigation of the criminal histories of prospective operators and certain employees, independent contractors and volunteers of medical facilities and certain facilities for the dependent under certain circumstances; removing the prohibition against hiring or contracting with persons at certain health care facilities who have committed certain crimes; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** NRS 449.060 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 2 449.060 1. Each license issued pursuant to NRS 449.001 to 449.240,
- 3 inclusive, expires on December 31 following its issuance and is renewable
- 4 for 1 year upon reapplication and payment of the fee provided in NRS
- 5 449.040 and 449.050 unless the health division finds, after an
- 6 investigation, that the facility has not:
 - (a) Satisfactorily complied with the provisions of NRS 449.001 to
- 8 449.240, inclusive, or the standards and regulations adopted by the board;
- 9 (b) Obtained the approval of the director of the department of human
- resources before undertaking a project, if such approval is required by
- 11 NRS 439A.100; or
- (c) Conformed to all applicable local zoning regulations.
- 2. Each reapplication for an agency to provide nursing in the home, a
- 14 residential facility for intermediate care,] a renewal of a license to operate

- a medical facility [for skilled nursing or a residential] or a facility for [groups] the dependent must include, without limitation, a statement that the facility [or agency] is in compliance with the provisions of NRS 449.173 to 449.188, inclusive.
 - **Sec. 2.** NRS 449.176 is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 449.176 1. Each applicant for a license to operate a *medical facility* or a facility for [intermediate care, facility for skilled nursing or residential facility for groups] the dependent shall submit to the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history two complete sets of fingerprints for submission to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for its report.
- 2. The central repository for Nevada records of criminal history shall determine whether the applicant has been convicted of a crime [listed in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of] set forth in NRS 449.188 and immediately inform the administrator of the facility, if any, and the health division of whether the applicant has been convicted of such a crime.
 - **Sec. 3.** NRS 449.179 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 449.179 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection [4,] 2, within 10 days after hiring an employee [,] or volunteer or contracting with an independent contractor, the administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, [an agency to provide nursing in the home,] a medical facility [for intermediate care,] or a facility for [skilled nursing or a residential facility for groups] the dependent shall:
- (a) Obtain a written statement from the employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* stating whether he has been convicted of any crime [listed] *set forth* in NRS 449.188;
- (b) Obtain a verbal and written confirmation of the information contained in the written statement obtained pursuant to paragraph (a);
- (c) Obtain from the employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* two sets of fingerprints and a written authorization to forward the fingerprints to the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history for submission to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for its report; and
- (d) Submit to the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history the fingerprints obtained pursuant to paragraph (c).
- 2. The administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, a medical facility or a facility for the dependent is not required to obtain the information described in subsection 1 from an employee, independent contractor or volunteer who:
- 38 (a) Will not provide treatment, care or services to clients of the facility; and
- 40 (b) Produces proof that an investigation of his criminal history has
 41 been conducted by the central repository for Nevada records of criminal
 42 history within the immediately preceding 6 months and the investigation

did not indicate that the employee, independent contractor or volunteer had been convicted of any crime set forth in NRS 449.188.

- The administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, a medical facility or a facility for the dependent shall ensure the criminal history of each employee, independent contractor or volunteer at the facility is investigated at least once every 5 years. The administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, the facility shall:
- (a) If the facility does not have the fingerprints of the employee, independent contractor or volunteer on file, obtain two sets of fingerprints from the employee, independent contractor or volunteer;

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- (b) Obtain written authorization from the employee, independent contractor or volunteer to forward the fingerprints on file or obtained 12 pursuant to paragraph (a) to the central repository for Nevada records of 13 criminal history for submission to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for its report; and 15
 - (c) Submit the fingerprints to the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history.
- Upon receiving fingerprints submitted pursuant to subsection 1 or 18 3, *the* central repository for Nevada records of criminal history shall 19 determine whether the employee, independent contractor or volunteer 20 has been convicted of a crime listed in NRS 449.188 and immediately 21 [inform] submit a report of its findings to the health division, the 22 administrator of, and the person licensed to operate, the [agency or] facility at which the person fis employed of whether or not the employee has been convicted of such a crime. 25 $\frac{3.1}{2}$ works. 26
 - The central repository for Nevada records of criminal history may impose a fee upon [an agency or] a facility that submits fingerprints pursuant to this section for the reasonable cost of the investigation [. The agency or and report. The facility may recover from the employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* not more than one-half of the fee imposed by the central repository. If the [agency or] facility requires the employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* to pay for any part of the fee imposed by the central repository, it shall allow the employee, independent contractor or volunteer to pay the amount through periodic payments.
- [4. The provisions of this section do not apply to an employee who has 37 undergone an investigation of his criminal background as a condition to receiving a professional license in this state.] 39
- **Sec. 4.** NRS 449.182 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40
- 449.182 Each [agency to provide nursing in the home,] medical 41 facility and facility for fintermediate care, facility for skilled nursing and
- residential facility for groups the dependent shall maintain accurate

- records of the information concerning its employees, *independent contractors and volunteers* collected pursuant to NRS 449.179, and shall maintain a copy of the fingerprints submitted to the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history [and] or proof *that* it submitted two sets of fingerprints to the central repository for its report. These records must be made available for inspection by the health division at any reasonable time and copies thereof must be furnished to the health division upon request.
- **Sec. 5.** NRS 449.185 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9 449.185 1. Upon receiving [information] a report from the central 10 repository for Nevada records of criminal history pursuant to NRS 11 179A.075 or 449.179, or evidence from any other source, that an employee, independent contractor or volunteer of a person who is 13 employed at an agency to provide nursing in the home, medical facility or a facility for fintermediate care, a facility for skilled nursing or a 15 residential facility for groups the dependent has been convicted of a crime [listed in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of] set forth in NRS 449.188, the 17 administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, the fagency or facility shall facility may terminate the employment or contract of that person after allowing him time to correct the information as required pursuant to 20
 - 2. If an employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* believes that the information provided by the central repository is incorrect, he may immediately inform the [agency or facility. An agency or] facility. A facility that is so informed shall give an employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* a reasonable amount of time of not less than 30 days to correct the information received from the central repository before terminating the employment *or contract* of the person pursuant to subsection 1.

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- 3. [An agency or] A facility that has complied with NRS 449.179 may not be held civilly or criminally liable based solely upon the ground that the [agency or] facility allowed an employee, independent contractor or volunteer to work:
- (a) Before it received the **[information]** *report* concerning the employee , *independent contractor or volunteer* from the central repository;
- (b) During any period required pursuant to subsection 2 to allow the employee, *independent contractor or volunteer* to correct [such information;] the report;

 - **Sec. 7.** NRS 179A.075 is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - 179A.075 1. The central repository for Nevada records of criminal history is hereby created within the Nevada highway patrol division of the department.
- 2. Each agency of criminal justice and any other agency dealing with 33 34 crime or delinquency of children shall:
- (a) Collect and maintain records, reports and compilations of statistical 35 data required by the department; and 36
- (b) Submit the information collected to the central repository in the 37 38 manner recommended by the advisory committee and approved by the director of the department. 39
- Each agency of criminal justice shall submit the information 40 relating to sexual offenses and other records of criminal history it collects, 41 42 and any information in its possession relating to the genetic markers of the blood and the secretor status of the saliva of a person who is convicted of

sexual assault or any other sexual offense, to the division in the manner prescribed by the director of the department. A report of disposition must be submitted to the division:

- (a) Through an electronic network;
- (b) On a medium of magnetic storage; or
- (c) In the manner prescribed by the director of the department, within 30 days after the date of disposition. If an agency has submitted a record regarding the arrest of a person who is later determined by the agency not to be the person who committed the particular crime, the agency shall, immediately upon making that determination, so notify the division. The division shall delete all references in the central repository relating to that particular arrest.
 - 4. The division shall:

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- (a) Collect, maintain and arrange all information submitted to it relating to:
 - (1) Sexual offenses and other records of criminal history; and
- (2) The genetic markers of the blood and the secretor status of the saliva of a person who is convicted of sexual assault or any other sexual offense.
- (b) Use a record of the subject's fingerprints as the basis for any records maintained regarding him.
- (c) Upon request during a state of emergency proclaimed pursuant to NRS 414.070, provide the information that is contained in the central repository to the state disaster identification team of the division of emergency management of the department of motor vehicles and public safety.
 - 5. The division may:
 - (a) Disseminate any information which is contained in the central repository to any other agency of criminal justice;
 - (b) Enter into cooperative agreements with federal and state repositories to facilitate exchanges of such information; and
 - (c) Request of and receive from the Federal Bureau of Investigation information on the background and personal history of any person:
 - (1) Who has applied to any agency of the state or any political subdivision for a license which it has the power to grant or deny;
 - (2) With whom any agency of the state or any political subdivision intends to enter into a relationship of employment or a contract for personal services;
 - (3) About whom any agency of the state or any political subdivision has a legitimate need to have accurate personal information for the protection of the agency or the persons within its jurisdiction; or
- 42 (4) For whom such information is required to be obtained pursuant to NRS

449.179.

The central repository shall:

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- (a) Collect and maintain records, reports and compilations of statistical data submitted by any agency pursuant to subsection 2.
- (b) Tabulate and analyze all records, reports and compilations of statistical data received pursuant to this section.
- (c) Disseminate to federal agencies engaged in the collection of statistical data relating to crime information which is contained in the central repository.
 - (d) Investigate the criminal history of any person who:
- (1) Has applied to the superintendent of public instruction for a license;
 - (2) Has applied to a county school district for employment; or
 - (3) Is employed by a county school district,
- and notify the superintendent of each county school district and the superintendent of public instruction if the investigation of the central repository indicates that the person has been convicted of a violation of NRS 200.508, 201.230, 453.3385, 453.339 or 453.3395, or convicted of a felony or any offense involving moral turpitude.
- (e) Upon discovery, notify the superintendent of each county school district by providing him with a list of all persons:
 - (1) Investigated pursuant to paragraph (d); or
- (2) Employed by a county school district whose fingerprints were sent previously to the central repository for investigation, who the central repository's records indicate have been convicted of a violation of NRS 200.508, 201.230, 453.3385, 453.339 or 453.3395, or convicted of a felony or any offense involving moral turpitude since the central repository's initial investigation. The superintendent of each county school district shall determine whether further investigation or action by the district is appropriate.
- (f) Submit a report to the administrator of, or person licensed to operate, a medical facility or facility for the dependent of any employee, independent contractor or volunteer who provides treatment, care or services to clients of the facility and whose fingerprints were sent previously to the central repository for investigation, who the central repository's records indicate has been convicted of a violation of a crime set forth in NRS 449.188.
- (g) Investigate the criminal history of each person who submits 38 fingerprints or has his fingerprints submitted pursuant to NRS 449.176 or 449.179. 39
- 40 (h) On or before July 1 of each year, prepare and present to the governor a printed annual report containing the statistical data relating to crime received during the preceding calendar year. Additional reports may
- be presented to the governor throughout the year regarding specific areas

of crime if they are recommended by the advisory committee and approved by the director of the department.

[(h)] (i) On or before January 31 of each odd-numbered year, prepare and submit to the director of the legislative counsel bureau, for submission to the legislature, a report containing statistical data about domestic violence in this state.

- [(i)] (j) Identify and review the collection and processing of statistical data relating to criminal justice and delinquency of children by any agency identified in subsection 2, and make recommendations for any necessary changes in the manner of collecting and processing statistical data by any such agency.
 - 7. The central repository may:

- (a) At the recommendation of the advisory committee and in the manner prescribed by the director of the department, disseminate compilations of statistical data and publish statistical reports relating to crime or delinquency of children.
- (b) Charge a reasonable fee for any publication or special report it distributes relating to data collected pursuant to this section. The central repository may not collect such a fee from an agency of criminal justice, any other agency dealing with crime or delinquency of children which is required to submit information pursuant to subsection 2 or the state disaster identification team of the division of emergency management of the department of motor vehicles and public safety. All money collected pursuant to this paragraph must be used to pay for the cost of operating the central repository.
- 8. As used in this section, "advisory committee" means the committee established by the director of the department pursuant to NRS 179A.078.
- **Sec. 8.** 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the administrator of, or person licensed to operate, a medical facility or a facility for the dependent shall, before January 1, 2000, obtain from the central repository for Nevada records of criminal history a report for each employee, independent contractor and volunteer who is working at the facility on October 1, 1999, of any crimes set forth in NRS 449.188 for which the employee, independent contractor or volunteer has been convicted.
- 2. The provisions of this section do not apply to any employee, independent contractor or volunteer who is working at such a facility on October 1, 1999, for whom the report of such an investigation has been obtained by the administrator of, or the person licensed to operate, the facility after October 1, 1994.

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
