## ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 11–COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

(ON BEHALF OF LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION'S STUDY OF THE CARE AND COMMITMENT OF MENTALLY ILL)

**FEBRUARY 4, 1999** 

## Referred to Committee on Health and Human Services

SUMMARY—Directs Legislative Commission to appoint interim committee to continue review and evaluation of services and treatment provided to persons who are mentally ill and to persons who are affected with mental retardation in this state. (BDR R-170)

ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION—Directing the Legislative Commission to appoint an interim committee to continue the review and evaluation of the services and treatment provided to persons who are mentally ill and to persons who are affected with mental retardation in this state.

- WHEREAS, The population of persons who are mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental retardation residing in this state has increased dramatically during this past decade; and
- WHEREAS, There has been a growth in the need for community-based treatment as a result of the deinstitutionalization of persons who are
- 6 mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental retardation; and
- 6 mentany in and persons who are affected with mental retardation, and
  - WHEREAS, Already overcrowded jails are housing persons who are
  - mentally ill without the resources or personnel to provide the treatment or
- 9 social services that are required; and
- WHEREAS, Youth suicide, which is preventable with early intervention
- and treatment, is the third leading cause of death among young Americans;
- 12 and
- WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that
- between 1980 and 1994, the suicide rate for persons from 10 to 14 years of
- age increased by 120 percent; and
- WHEREAS, The coordination of services provided to persons who are
- 17 mentally ill by law enforcement agencies, the courts, emergency

management agencies, and crisis and case management teams is required to ensure that treatment is provided to persons who are mentally ill efficiently and in the least restrictive environment; and

WHEREAS, The delivery of mental health services requires coordinated community-based programs that address rural and urban needs, inpatient services, services to substitute for inpatient treatment, crisis treatment, medication, case management, housing, vocational opportunities and training, and other complementary assistance; and

WHEREAS, Mental health services have not been comprehensively reviewed for nearly 10 years; and

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WHEREAS, Further review of the mental health services provided to persons in this state is necessary to ensure that persons who are mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental retardation receive the care necessary to allow them to lead more productive lives; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, THE SENATE CONCURRING, That the Legislative Commission is hereby directed to appoint an interim committee, composed of members of the Assembly and members of the Senate, to continue the study of services and treatment provided to persons who are mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental retardation in this state, including, without limitation, an examination, review and evaluation of the:

- 1. Services that are available to persons who are mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental retardation from public and private agencies in this state and the manner in which those services are delivered;
- 2. Resources that are needed to provide the care that is required and the fiscal impact of providing those resources on the state and local governments, including the effect of adolescent suicide on such resources; and
- 3. Feasibility of coordinating services and treatment provided to
  persons who are mentally ill and persons who are affected with mental
  retardation by various public and private agencies; and be it further
  RESOLVED, That any recommended legislation proposed by the
  committee must be approved by a majority of the members of the Assembly
  appointed to the committee and a majority of the members of the Senate
  appointed to the committee; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Legislative Commission submit a report of the results of the study and any recommended legislation to the 71st session of the Nevada Legislature.

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
