ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION—Recognizing March 2, 1999, as "Read Across America" Day in Nevada in commemoration of Dr. Seuss's birthday.

- WHEREAS, Theodor Seuss Geisel was born on March 2, 1904, in
- 2 Springfield, Massachusetts; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Theodor Seuss Geisel graduated from Dartmouth College in
- 4 1925 and began writing humorous articles and creating cartoons for
- 5 various magazines; and

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- 6 WHEREAS, His first children's book, And to Think That I Saw It on
- 7 Mulberry Street, was rejected by 43 publishers until, in 1937, a friend
- published the book for him; and
- 9 WHEREAS, In May of 1954, *Life* magazine published a report
- 10 concerning illiteracy among school children, stating that, among other
- things, children were having trouble learning to read because the books
- were boring; and
- WHEREAS, This comment inspired Theodor Seuss Geisel's publisher,
- 14 Bennett Cerf, to compile a list of 400 words that he felt were important,
- asking Mr. Geisel to cut the list to 250 words, the amount of words a first
- 6 grader could absorb, and using only those words to write a book that would
- 17 excite children: and

- WHEREAS, Nine months later, Mr. Geisel, using 220 of the words given
- 2 to him, published *The Cat in the Hat*, which became an instant success;
- 3 and
- WHEREAS, Later in 1960, Bennett Cerf bet Mr. Geisel \$50 that he
- 5 couldn't write an entire book using only 50 words and from that challenge
- 6 came the famous children's book, Green Eggs and Ham, which also
- 7 became an instant success; and
- 8 WHEREAS, From that point on, Theodor Seuss Geisel became known as
- 9 "Dr. Seuss," and children became enthused about reading every Dr. Seuss
- 10 book available; and
- WHEREAS, Dr. Seuss died on September 24, 1991, but his legacy of
- children's books will live forever as an inspiration to children everywhere
- to learn to read and to share in the laughter, enjoyment and knowledge that a book can provide; and
- WHEREAS, In honor of Dr. Seuss and the joy of reading, the National
- 16 Education Association has designated March 2, 1999, as "Read Across
- 17 America" day and has called upon every child to read with a caring adult
- on this day in honor of what would have been Dr. Seuss's 95th birthday;
- 19 now, therefore, be it
- 20 RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, THE SENATE
- 21 CONCURRING, That March 2, 1999, is hereby recognized as "Read Across
- 22 America" Day in Nevada in commemoration of Dr. Seuss's birthday; and
- 23 be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That children and adults are encouraged to read a favorite
- 25 book together on this date to share the joy of reading; and be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly prepare and transmit
- 27 a copy of this resolution to Elaine Lancaster, President of the Nevada State
- 28 Education Association, and Ken Lange, Executive Director of the Nevada
- 29 State Education Association.

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
