AN ACT relating to cultural resources; requiring the administrator of the office of historic preservation of the department of museums, library and arts to establish a stewardship program for the protection of cultural resources; requiring the administrator to establish an advisory commission for certain purposes; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Chapter 383 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2, 3 and 4 of this act.

Sec. 2. 1. The administrator shall, by regulation, establish a stewardship program to:

(a) Protect cultural resources in this state;

- (b) Increase public awareness of the significance and value of cultural resources and the damage done to cultural resources by vandalism;
- (c) Discourage vandalism of cultural resources and the sale and trade of artifacts;
- (d) Support the adoption and enforcement of national, state, tribal and local laws and regulations to preserve cultural resources;
- (e) Support and encourage high standards for the investigation of cultural resources throughout this state;
- (f) Promote cooperation among agencies, organizations, Indian tribes and natural persons who are concerned about the protection of cultural



resources and enter into agreements with such agencies, organizations, Indian tribes and natural persons to promote the protection of cultural resources; and

- (g) Add to the inventory of cultural resources maintained pursuant to NRS 383.021.
- 2. The administrator shall select, train and certify volunteers to serve in the stewardship program based upon policy, criteria and procedures established by the administrator.
  - 3. The stewardship program must:

- (a) In cooperation with agencies, organizations, Indian tribes and natural persons who are concerned about the protection of cultural resources, create a list of sites that are cultural resources in this state for monitoring;
- (b) Establish activities for periodic monitoring by volunteers of cultural resources on the list created pursuant to paragraph (a);
- (c) Establish requirements for reporting damage, threats of damage or vandalism of cultural resources to appropriate authorities as determined by the administrator; and
- (d) Establish programs for educating the public concerning the significance and value of cultural resources and the loss to the public resulting from damage to cultural resources.
- 4. The administrator shall coordinate the cooperation of federal authorities, Indian tribes and state and local governmental agencies, as necessary, to carry out the stewardship program.
- 5. The administrator and the office shall provide administrative support to the stewardship program.
- 6. Volunteers selected for the stewardship program serve without compensation and are not entitled to receive a per diem allowance or travel expenses.
- Sec. 3. 1. The administrator shall create an advisory commission on stewardship of cultural resources to advise the administrator on issues relating to the stewardship program.
- 2. The administrator shall appoint as members of the advisory commission:
  - (a) At least one person who is a representative of an Indian tribe;
- 36 (b) At least one person who is an archeologist;
  - (c) At least one person who is a representative of the University and Community College System of Nevada;
  - (d) At least one person who is a representative of the division of state parks of the state department of conservation and natural resources; and
    - (e) At least one person who is a representative of the general public;
- 42 (f) As the administrator deems appropriate, such other persons who 43 possess a demonstrated interest or expertise in one or more of the 44 following fields:
  - (1) Prehistoric archeology.
  - (2) Historic archeology.
  - (3) Paleontology.

  - (5) Law enforcement.

- 3. The members of the advisory commission serve:
- (a) At the pleasure of the administrator; and
- (b) Except as otherwise provided in subsections 4 and 5, without compensation and without receiving a per diem allowance or travel expenses.
- 4. A member of the advisory commission may receive a per diem allowance and travel expenses if the administrator determines that extraordinary circumstances warrant such pay and that money is available for this.
- 5. A state agency, local government or public institution shall not require an officer or employee who is a member of the advisory commission to make up the time he is absent from work to carry out his duties as a member, and shall not require the member to take annual vacation or compensatory time for the absence. Each member of the advisory commission who is an officer or employee of the state, a local government or a public institution must be:
- (a) Relieved from his duties without loss of his regular compensation so that he may prepare for and attend meetings of the advisory commission and perform any work necessary to carry out the duties of the advisory commission in the most timely manner practicable;
- (b) Compensated for attending meetings and performing other work for the advisory commission as if such work were part of his regular duties in his position of employment with the state or a local government; and
- (c) Paid a per diem allowance and travel expenses for attending meetings and performing other work for the advisory commission as if such work were part of his regular duties in his position of employment with the state or a local government.
- 6. The members of the advisory commission shall select a chairman and such other officers as the commission deems appropriate.
  - Sec. 4. The advisory commission shall:
  - 1. Advise the administrator on:
- (a) Conducting programs of education to promote the protection of cultural resources and inform the public on issues relating to cultural resources;
- (b) Encouraging the enforcement of laws to prevent theft, damage, vandalism and other activities destructive to cultural resources;
- (c) Enhancing the statewide historic preservation plan prepared pursuant to NRS 383.081, including matters concerning the acquisition and management of sites that are cultural resources;
- (d) Developing a mechanism to assist a person who owns a cultural resource or real property upon which a cultural resource is located to protect and manage the cultural resource;
- 46 (e) Encouraging the continued study of archeology and paleontology 47 in this state; and 48
  - (f) Activities and issues relating to archeology and paleontology.



- 2. Not later than January 15 of each odd-numbered year, prepare and submit to the director of the legislative counsel bureau a report of the activities of the advisory commission. The director of the legislative counsel bureau shall transmit the report to the assembly standing committee on natural resources, agriculture, and mining and to the senate standing committee on natural resources.

  - Sec. 5. NRS 383.011 is hereby amended to read as follows:
    383.011 As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

  - "Administrator" means the administrator of the office. "Advisory board" means the board of museums and history.
- 3. "Artifacts" includes both archeological and paleontological materials.
- 4. "Cultural resources" means objects, sites and information of historic, prehistoric, archeological, architectural, paleontological or traditional significance.
- 5. "Director" means the director of the department of museums, library and arts.
- <del>[4.]</del> 6. "Office" means the office of historic preservation of the department of museums, library and arts.
- Sec. 6. NRS 383.021 is hereby amended to read as follows:
  383.021
  1. The office of historic preservation is hereby created.

- (a) Encourage, plan and coordinate historic preservation and archeological activities within the state, including programs to survey, record, study and preserve or salvage fobjects, localities and information of historic, prehistoric and paleoenvironmental significance.] cultural
- (b) Compile and maintain an inventory of **historic**, archeological and architectural cultural resources in Nevada deemed significant by the administrator.
- (c) Designate repositories for the materials that comprise the inventory. 31
- 32 3. The Comstock historic district commission is within the office.
- 33 **Sec. 7.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2001.
