SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing millennium scholarships. (BDR 34-282)

EXPLANATION - Matter in bolded italics is new; matter between brackets fomitted materiall is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; authorizing certain students who attend institutions of higher education that are located outside this state to apply for millennium scholarships; requiring the state treasurer to disburse millennium scholarships to eligible students who attend institutions of higher education that are located outside this state; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 397 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto

the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act.

Sec. 2. As used in sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in sections 3, 4 and 5 have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.

Sec. 3. "Board of regents" means the board of regents of the University of Nevada.

Sec. 4. "Millennium scholarship" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 396.918.

Sec. 5. "Millennium scholarship trust fund" means the trust fund created pursuant to NRS 396.926.

Sec. 6. 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, a student may apply to the state treasurer for a millennium scholarship if he:

(a) Has been a resident of this state for at least 2 years before he applies for the scholarship;

(b) Graduated from a public or private high school in this state:

(1) After May 1, 2000; and 17 18

(2) Not more than 8 years before he applies for the scholarship;

(c) Maintained at least a 3.0 grade-point average on a 4.0 grading scale in high school in the core curriculum, as determined by the board of regents pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 396.930; and

22 (d) Is enrolled:

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(1) Full time in a university or other institution of higher education that is located outside this state; or

- (2) At least part time in a community college that is located outside this state.
- 2. A student who did not graduate from a public or private high school in this state may apply to the state treasurer for a millennium scholarship if he:
- (a) Has been a resident of this state for at least 2 years before he applies for the scholarship;
- (b) Otherwise satisfies the criteria set forth in subsection 1 and the criteria established by the board of regents pursuant to subsection 3 of NRS 396.930; and
- (c) Receives at least the minimum score on a standardized test established by the board of regents pursuant to subsection 3 of NRS 396.930.
- 3. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the board of regents shall not prescribe or establish any additional requirements for eligibility for receipt of millennium scholarships by students who are enrolled in universities, community colleges and other institutions of higher education that are located outside this state.
- 4. The provisions of this section do not apply to a student who is enrolled in a university or community college within the University and Community College System of Nevada.
- Sec. 7. 1. Within the limits of money available in the millennium scholarship trust fund, a student who is eligible for a millennium scholarship pursuant to section 6 of this act is entitled to receive:
- (a) If he is enrolled in a community college located outside this state, \$40 per credit for which the student is enrolled, or the amount of money that is necessary for the student to pay the costs of attending the community college that are not otherwise satisfied by other grants or scholarships, whichever is less.
- (b) If he is enrolled in a university or other institution of higher education that is located outside this state, other than a community college, \$80 per credit for which the student is enrolled, or the amount of money that is necessary for the student to pay the costs of attending the university or institution that are not otherwise satisfied by other grants or scholarships, whichever is less.
- No student may be awarded a millennium scholarship for a total amount in excess of \$10,000.
- 2. A student who receives a millennium scholarship pursuant to this section shall:
- (a) Make satisfactory academic progress toward a recognized degree or certificate, as determined by the state treasurer pursuant to subsection 7; and
 - (b) Maintain at least a 2.0 grade-point average on a 4.0 grading scale.
- 3. A millennium scholarship received pursuant to this section must be used only:
- (a) For the payment of tuition, registration fees and laboratory fees and expenses;



- (b) To purchase required textbooks and course materials; and
- (c) For other costs related to the attendance of a student at a university, community college or other institution of higher education that is located outside this state.
- 4. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, if a student drops out of school or fails to maintain at least a 2.0 grade-point average in any semester or quarter, as applicable, the student shall repay the millennium scholarship before the student is eligible to receive an additional millennium scholarship or otherwise receive money pursuant to sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act. The state treasurer shall establish criteria for a waiver from the repayment required by this subsection, including, without limitation, service in the military and conditions of hardship such as medical necessity.
- 5. The state treasurer shall disburse a millennium scholarship directly to each student whose application is approved for each semester or quarter, as applicable, upon proof that:
 - (a) The student is enrolled:

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- (1) Full time in a university or other institution of higher education that is located outside this state; or
- (2) At least part time in a community college that is located outside this state; and
- (b) The student is in good standing and making satisfactory academic progress toward a recognized degree or certificate, as determined by the state treasurer pursuant to subsection 7.
- 6. The state treasurer shall make periodic reports to the board of regents regarding the disbursements made pursuant to subsection 5 to inform the board of regents of the amount of money available in the millennium scholarship trust fund for disbursement by the board of regents to students pursuant to NRS 396.914 to 396.934, inclusive.
 - 7. The state treasurer:
- (a) Shall adopt regulations establishing the criteria for determining whether a student is making satisfactory academic progress toward a recognized degree or certificate for purposes of subsection 5.
- (b) May adopt such additional regulations as are necessary to carry out the provisions of sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act.
- **Sec. 8.** NRS 396.911 is hereby amended to read as follows: 396.911

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- (a) Increasing the number of residents of the State of Nevada who enroll in and attend [a university or community college of the University and Community College System of Nevada;] institutions of higher education;
- (b) Reducing and preventing the use of tobacco products, alcohol and illegal drugs, especially by children;
- (c) Expanding the availability of health insurance and health care for children and adults in this state, especially for children and for adults with disabilities;
- (d) Assisting senior citizens who have modest incomes in purchasing prescription drugs and assisting those senior citizens in meeting their needs related to health care, home care, respite care and their ability to live independent of institutional care; and
 - (e) Promoting the general health of all residents of the State of Nevada.
- Sec. 9. NRS 396.926 is hereby amended to read as follows: 396.926 1. The millennium scholarship trust fund is hereby created in the state treasury. The state treasurer may accept gifts, grants, bequests and donations for deposit in the trust fund.
 - The state treasurer shall deposit in the trust fund:
- (a) Forty percent of all money received by the State of Nevada pursuant to any settlement entered into by the State of Nevada and a manufacturer of tobacco products;
- (b) Forty percent of all money recovered by the State of Nevada from a judgment in a civil action against a manufacturer of tobacco products; and
- (c) Any gifts, grants, bequests or donations specifically designated for the trust fund by the donor.
- 3. The state treasurer shall administer the trust fund. As administrator of the trust fund, the state treasurer:
 - (a) Shall maintain the financial records of the trust fund;
- (b) Shall invest the money in the trust fund as the money in other state funds is invested;
 - (c) Shall manage any account associated with the trust fund;
- (d) Shall maintain any instruments that evidence investments made with the money in the trust fund;
- (e) May contract with vendors for any good or service that is necessary to carry out the provisions of this section; and
 - (f) May perform any other duties necessary to administer the trust fund.
- 4. All interest and income earned on the money in the trust fund must, after deducting any applicable charges, be credited to the trust fund. All claims against the trust fund must be paid as other claims against the state
- 5. Not more than 2 percent of the amount of money in the trust fund may be used to pay the costs of administering the trust fund.
- 6. The money in the fund remains in the fund and does not revert to the state general fund at the end of any fiscal year.
- 7. Money in the trust fund may be used only for the purposes set forth in NRS 396.914 to 396.934, inclusive ++, and sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act.



Sec. 10. NRS 439.600 is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 439.600 1. The legislature hereby declares that its priorities in expending the proceeds to the State of Nevada from settlement agreements with and civil actions against manufacturers of tobacco products are:
- (a) To increase the number of Nevada [students] residents who attend and graduate from [Nevada] institutions of higher education; and
- (b) To assist Nevada residents in obtaining and maintaining good health.
- 2. To further these priorities, the legislature hereby declares that it is in the best interest of the residents of this state that all money received by the State of Nevada pursuant to any settlement entered into by the State of Nevada and a manufacturer of tobacco products and all money recovered by the State of Nevada from a judgment in a civil action against a manufacturer of tobacco products be dedicated solely toward the achievement of the following goals:
- (a) Increasing the number of Nevada residents who enroll in and attend a university or community college of the University and Community College System of Nevada; institutions of higher education;
- (b) Reducing and preventing the use of tobacco products, alcohol and illegal drugs, especially by children;
- (c) Expanding the availability of health insurance and health care for children and adults in this state, especially for children and for adults with disabilities;
 (d) Assisting senior citizens who have modest incomes in purchasing
 - (d) Assisting senior citizens who have modest incomes in purchasing prescription drugs and assisting those senior citizens in meeting their needs related to health care, home care, respite care and their ability to live independent of institutional care; and
- (e) Promoting the general health of all residents of the State of Nevada.
 Sec. 11. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2001.
