## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10–SENATORS SHAFFER, AMODEI, O'DONNELL AND WASHINGTON

## MARCH 15, 2001

SUMMARY—Urges Congress to require implementation of certain safety precautions if Federal Government locates repository for storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel in Nevada. (BDR R-1247)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION—Urging Congress to require the implementation of certain safety precautions if the Federal Government locates a repository for the storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel in Nevada.

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982, as amended by Congress in 1987, the Federal Government is considering a site in Nevada for the location of a geologic repository for the storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel; and

WHEREAS, If such a repository is ultimately located in Nevada, at least 77,000 metric tons of hazardous radioactive materials would be transported through and stored for not less than 10,000 years in this state; and

WHEREAS, Such transportation and storage of those deadly radioactive substances in Nevada would create a substantial risk of their emission into the air, soil and ground water of this state and pose a serious long-term threat to the health of the residents of this state and the welfare of its economy; and

WHEREAS, The extremely hazardous and long-lived nature of those substances make it necessary to ensure that any procedures, facilities and equipment that may be used for their transportation and storage meet highly stringent, continuing standards for containment and safety; and

WHEREAS, If the Federal Government ultimately locates a repository for the storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel in Nevada, Congress should at the very least ensure that certain safety precautions are carried out to protect the residents and environment of this state from radiological contamination and allow appropriate public and state governmental review of the operation of the repository; now, therefore, be it



RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, JOINTLY, That the members of the 71st session of the Nevada Legislature do hereby urge the Congress of the United States, if the Federal Government locates a repository for the storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel in the State of Nevada, to take such actions as are necessary to ensure that:

- 1. Each container used for the storage of high-level radioactive waste or spent nuclear fuel at or in the repository is placed in a manner that allows for the safe retrieval of the container for maintenance;
- 2. A facility is located contiguous to the repository which is capable of safely retrieving, repairing and replacing those containers;
- 3. The repository contains a system for monitoring those containers which:
- (a) Provides for the continuous monitoring of every exterior surface of every container; and
- (b) Allows any member of the general public to view at any time each monitoring device and container through a website on the Internet;
- 4. Representatives of appropriate agencies of this state have complete and unrestricted access to all locations and records necessary to confirm the safety of the repository;
- 5. No member of the general public receives, as a result of the management and storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel inside and outside of the repository and all of its associated facilities, any exposure to radionuclides in excess of:
- (a) Four millirems per year to the whole body or any single organ through the normal consumption and other use of any ground water; or
- (b) An annual committed effective dose equivalent of 15 millirems; and 6. No high-level radioactive waste or spent nuclear fuel is transported to the repository through any area which is located within 10 miles of any city or unincorporated town in this state whose population is 3,000 or more; and be it further

RESOLVED, That it is the intention of the Nevada Legislature that this resolution must not be construed in such a manner as to indicate that the Nevada Legislature or the State of Nevada explicitly or impliedly consents to the location of a repository for the storage of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel anywhere in the State of Nevada; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Senate prepare and transmit a copy of this resolution to the Vice President of the United States as the presiding officer of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and each member of the Nevada Congressional Delegation; and be it further

RESOLVED. That this resolution becomes effective upon passage.
