SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION—Urging the Governor to designate alternative routes for the transportation of nuclear waste to Yucca Mountain.

WHEREAS, The Federal Government has placed Nevada in the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 as the only site to be characterized for the storage of nuclear waste, and in order to remove Nevada from that Act, there will need to be at least 51 votes in the Senate and 218 votes in the House of Representatives to select another state for the storage of nuclear waste: and

WHEREAS, On no fewer than three occasions, Congress has voted to place the interim storage of nuclear waste in Nevada with an affirmative vote in the Senate by almost two-thirds of its members, just shy of a veto-sustaining majority; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Energy is approaching the final stages of the technical characterization of Yucca Mountain as a repository for high-level nuclear waste and spent nuclear fuel; and

WHEREAS, The transportation of nuclear waste and spent nuclear fuel is a detriment to traffic flow and could slow commuter traffic; and

WHEREAS, The transportation and handling of these materials is, in fact, very dangerous in many respects; and

WHEREAS, It is generally considered by all transportation experts that transportation of dangerous and hazardous materials is safest when such materials are transported by rail, and transportation of these large canisters



of waste around our cities by rail is the method preferred by the residents of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, It is of the utmost importance to the State of Nevada to protect the health and safety of its residents and to protect the economic base of this state; and

WHEREAS, Over 1.5 million people currently reside in the Las Vegas Valley, and that area continues to be one of the fastest growing areas of the nation; and

WHEREAS, The protection of Las Vegas and the Las Vegas Valley is essential to the present and future economic well-being of Nevada; and

WHEREAS, Both the perception and the reality associated with the transportation of high-level nuclear waste materials through the Las Vegas Valley will provide adverse impacts on Las Vegas and Nevada highways;

WHEREAS, In the event that the United States Congress declares Yucca Mountain to be a suitable site for a high-level radioactive waste repository, it is imperative that a plan be in place for alternative routes for the transportation of nuclear waste to Yucca Mountain; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, JOINTLY, That the Nevada Legislature requests and urges that the Governor of the State of Nevada take action under current regulations of the United States Department of Transportation which allow him to designate alternative highway routes and thereby designate alternative routes that are designed to avoid the southern Nevada metropolitan area; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the United States Department of Energy is hereby urged to locate an alternate route to Yucca Mountain from an existing railroad mainline and to build a railroad to Yucca Mountain which avoids entirely the southern Nevada metropolitan area; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of the Senate prepare and transmit a copy 31 of this resolution to Governor Kenny C. Guinn, the Secretary of Energy and each member of the Nevada Congressional Delegation; and be it 33 34

RESOLVED, That this resolution becomes effective upon passage.
