The following measures will be considered for action by the Assembly Committee on Elections, Procedures, and Ethics during a work session on Thursday, April 3, 2003:

ASSEMBLY BILL 344

Provides for special election to fill vacancy in office of Representative in Congress in event of catastrophe. (BDR 24-648)

Discussion

Assembly Bill 344 was heard by the Committee on March 27, 2003. Assembly Speaker Richard D. Perkins presented the bill to the Committee. The bill provides for a special election to fill a vacancy in the office of Representative in Congress in the event of a catastrophe.

Proposed Conceptual Amendments

Amend the bill as a whole using the proposed mock-up of A.B. 344 under Tab A (proposed by Brian Woodson, Speaker Perkins' Intern) and considering the following additional amendments:

- 1. Page 2, Section 6, line 8, add the phrase "as soon as practicable" after the word "conducted" (proposed by Brian Woodson, Speaker Perkins' Intern);
- 2. Page 2, Section 6, line 11, add the phrase "as soon as practicable" after the word "conducted" (proposed by Brian Woodson, Speaker Perkins' Intern); and
- 3. Page 2, Section 7, line 27, add the phrase "which can comply with mailing out of state ballots" after the words "NRS 293.204" (proposed by Alan Glover, Carson City Clerk/Recorder).

Discussion

The resolution urges the President of the United States and Congress to support a free trade agreement between the Republic of China on Taiwan and the United States.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 344

PREPARED FOR ASSEMBLYMAN RICHARD D. PERKINS MARCH 21, 2003

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 304 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 8, inclusive, of this act.

Sec. 2. As used in sections 2 to 8, inclusive, of this act, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in sections 3, 4 and 5 of this act have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.

Sec. 3. "Catastrophe" means a natural or man-made event that causes a vacancy in at least one-fourth of the total number of offices in the United States House of Representatives, including any number of offices representing the State of Nevada, or at least one-half of the total number of offices representing the State of Nevada.

Sec. 4. "Disappearance" means the inability to establish

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Sec. 4. "Disappearance" means the inability to establish conclusively whether a Representative in Congress has survived a catastrophe.

Sec. 5. "Vacancy" means the <u>death</u>, resignation or <u>declination of a</u>
Representative in Congress, or the <u>death or disappearance</u>; as a result of
a Representative in Congress of a resulting from a catastrophe, of a
Representative in Congress as defined in Section 3 of this act.

- Sec. 6. In the event of a catastrophe vacancy in the office of Representative in Congress, the Governor shall issue an election proclamation within seven culendar days of the event giving rise to the vacancy calling for a special election to fill # the vacancy in the office of Representative in Congress. The Governor shall specify the date of the special election in the proclamation. If the vacancy is caused by the death, resignation, or declination of a Representative in Congress, the Fithe election must be conducted on a Tuesday at least not more than 180 calendar days following the issuance of the election proclamation. If the vacancy is caused by a catastrophe as defined in Section 5 of this act, the election must be conducted on a Tuesday 56 days, but not more than & 90 calendar days; following the issuance of the election proclamation, except that Under either circumstance, the special election may be conducted within 90 calendar days following the issuance of the election proclamation in order to consolidate the special election with the next regularly scheduled:
 - 1. Statewide election; or

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- 2. Local election occurring wholly or partially within the same territory in which the vacancy exists, if the voters eligible to vote in the local election comprise at least 50 percent of all the voters eligible to vote on the vacancy.
- Sec. 7. 1. If the Governor issues an election proclamation calling for a special election pursuant to section 6 of this act, no primary election may be held. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, a candidate must be nominated in the manner provided in chapter 293 of NRS and must file a declaration or acceptance of candidacy within the time prescribed by the Secretary of State pursuant to NRS 293.204. A candidate of a major political party is nominated by filing a declaration or acceptance of candidacy within the time prescribed by the Secretary of State pursuant to NRS 293.204. A minor political party that wishes to place its candidates on the ballot must file a list of its candidates with the Secretary of State not more than 46 days before the special election and not less than 32 days before the special election. To have his name appear on the ballot, an independent candidate must file his petition of candidacy with the appropriate filing officer not more than 46 days before the special election and not less than 32 days before the special election.
- 2. Except as otherwise provided in sections 2 to 8, inclusive, of this act:
- (a) The election must be conducted pursuant to the provisions of chapter 293 of NRS.
 - (b) The general election laws of this state apply to the election.
- Sec. 8. The Secretary of State shall adopt such regulations as are necessary for conducting elections pursuant to the provisions of sections 2 to 8, inclusive, of this act.

Sec. 9. NRS 304.040 is hereby amended to read as follows:
304.040 [Party] Except as otherwise provided in sections 2 to 8,
inclusive, of this act, party candidates for Representative in Congress shall be nominated in the same manner as state officers are nominated.
Sec. 10. This act becomes effective upon passage and approval.

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
