Senate Finance - Assembly Ways and Means Department of Conservation Natural Resources Hearing Budget Highlights 4101 31 January 2003

The Nevada Natural Heritage Program systematically collects information on the occurrences, distribution, and population status of all sensitive species in Nevada. These data are continually updated and maintained in a system of computerized databases, topographic maps, GIS and manual files. The Program serves a clearinghouse for information on sensitive species, and sets priorities for conservation efforts based on species rarity, vulnerability, and management needs. Currently, the Program maintains detailed information on over 600 species of animals and plants and is expanding our documentation and inventory of the state's vegetation communities.

In a recent publication, States of the Union: Ranking America's Biodiversity (NatureServe, 2002), Nevada ranked 11th highest in the nation for overall species diversity. Our state was also ranked third in the nation for species a risk, 6th in number of endemic species, and 11th in the nation for number of extinctions.

Highlights:

Our staff of eight has recently expanded with a biologist supported by a grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service through the Nevada Biodiversity Initiative. A wetlands planner recently joined the staff to complete a statewide wetlands plan and coordinate the development of a wetland inventory and archive with support of an EPA grant.

Additional funding in Enhancements is requested in both years of the biennium in E-710 for computer replacements. These replacements will by funded with grants from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
