- ☐ The Court determines the initial parole eligibility.
- ☐ Parole is not a right.



B

What is the Parole Board

- ☐ Independent body.
- ☐ Carefully plans a safe return to the community.
- ☐ Returns offenders to prison whenever community safety is threatened.



C

Parole Supervision

- ☐ Careful control and supervision of offenders.
- ☐ Monitoring of the offender's home, job, activities and associates.
- ☐ Drug testing & treatment, electronic monitoring, no contact with victims, requirement to pay restitution.
- ☐ Supervised by officers of the Division of Parole and Probation.



D

Parole & the Judicial System

- ☐ Legal framework that empowers judges, prison officials and parole boards.
- ☐ A flexible system for punishing offenders and protecting the public.



E

Parole Board within Nevada's Criminal Justice System

Court sentences offender to prison and establishes the minimum sentence for parole eligibility.



Department of Corrections (NDOC) determines parole eligibility based on the sentence and credit earnings established by law.



Parole Board considers offender for release, then grants or denies parole.



If parole is granted, the Division of Parole and Probation (P&P) supervises parolee.



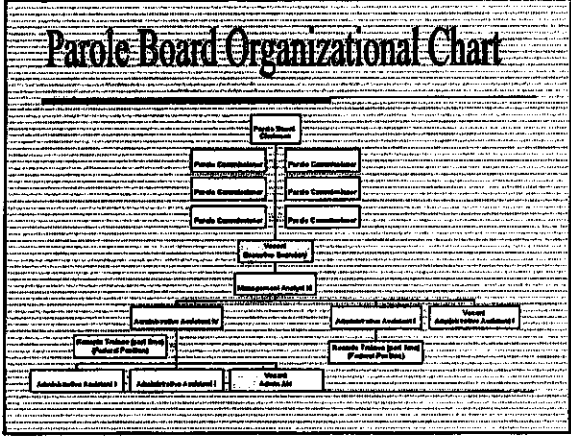

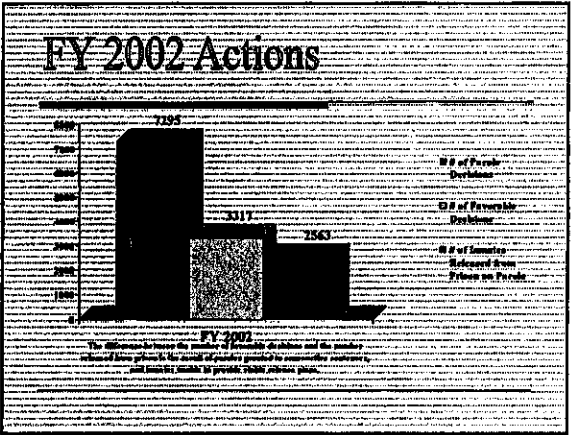

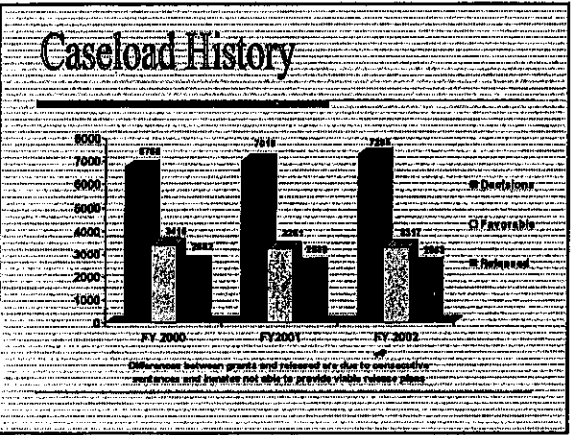
- Made 7,295 decisions

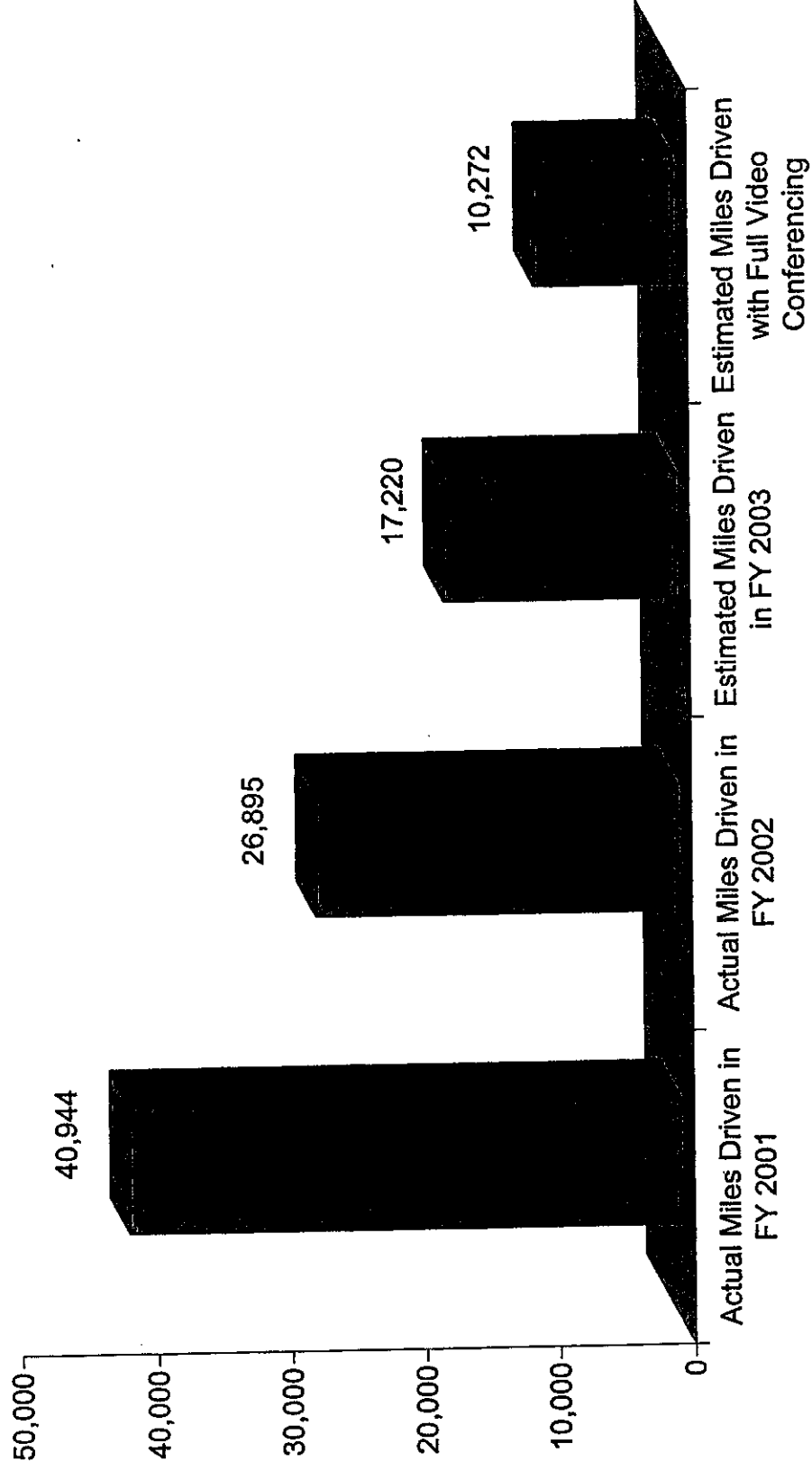

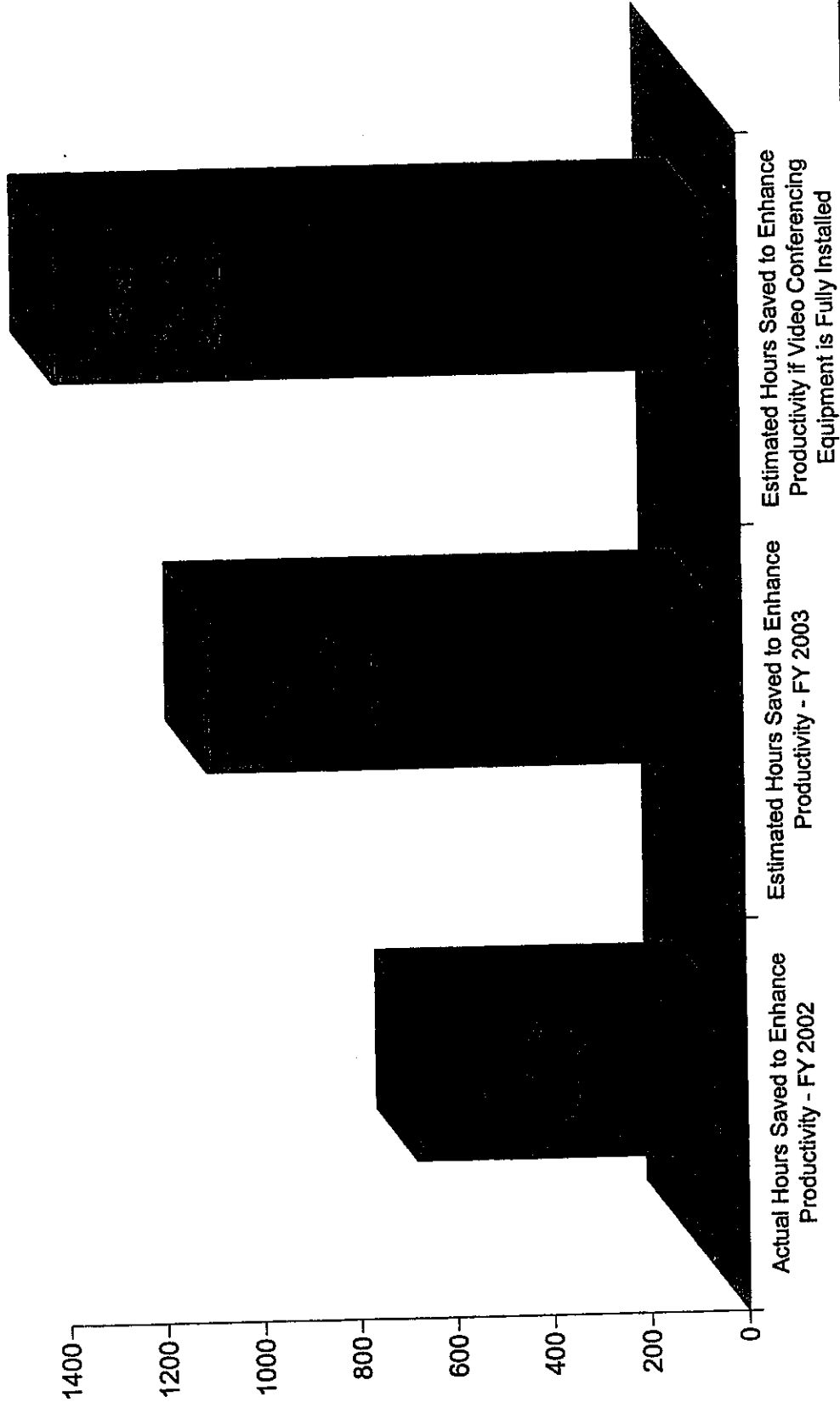

Mileage Reduced Through use of Video Conferencing

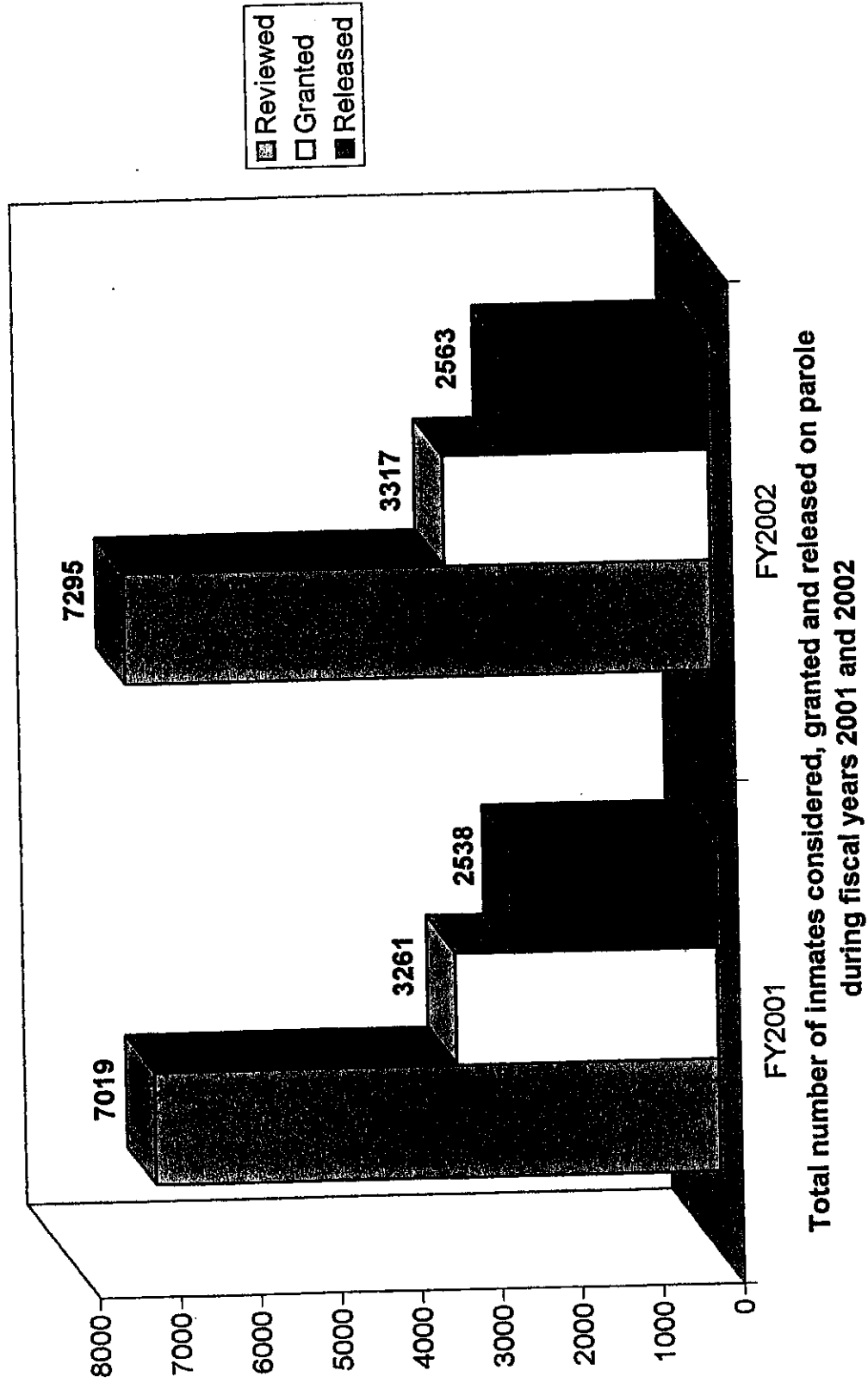

Commissioner Work-Hours Saved Through Use of Video Conferencing

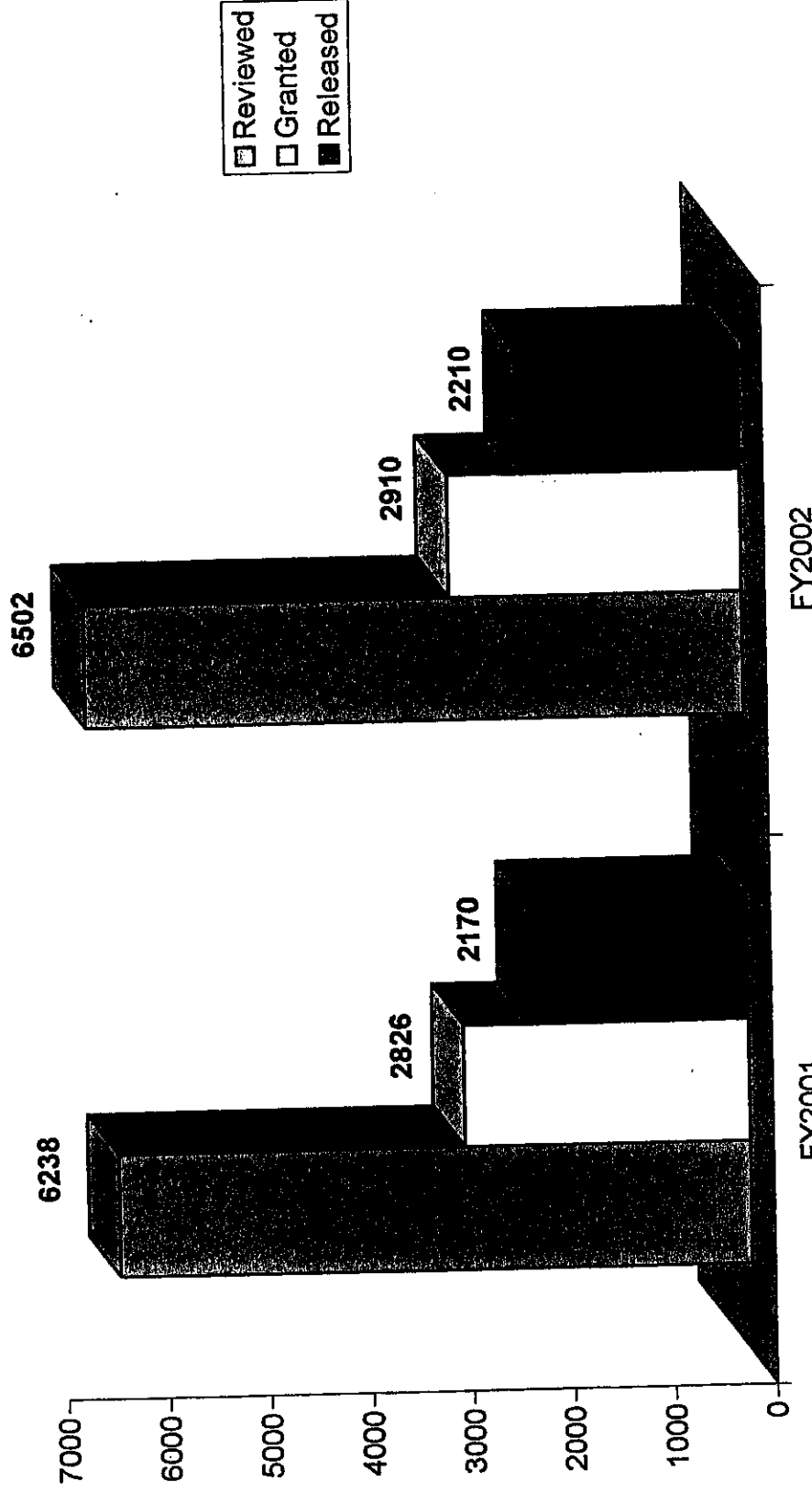


FY 01-02 Parole Actions - Totals



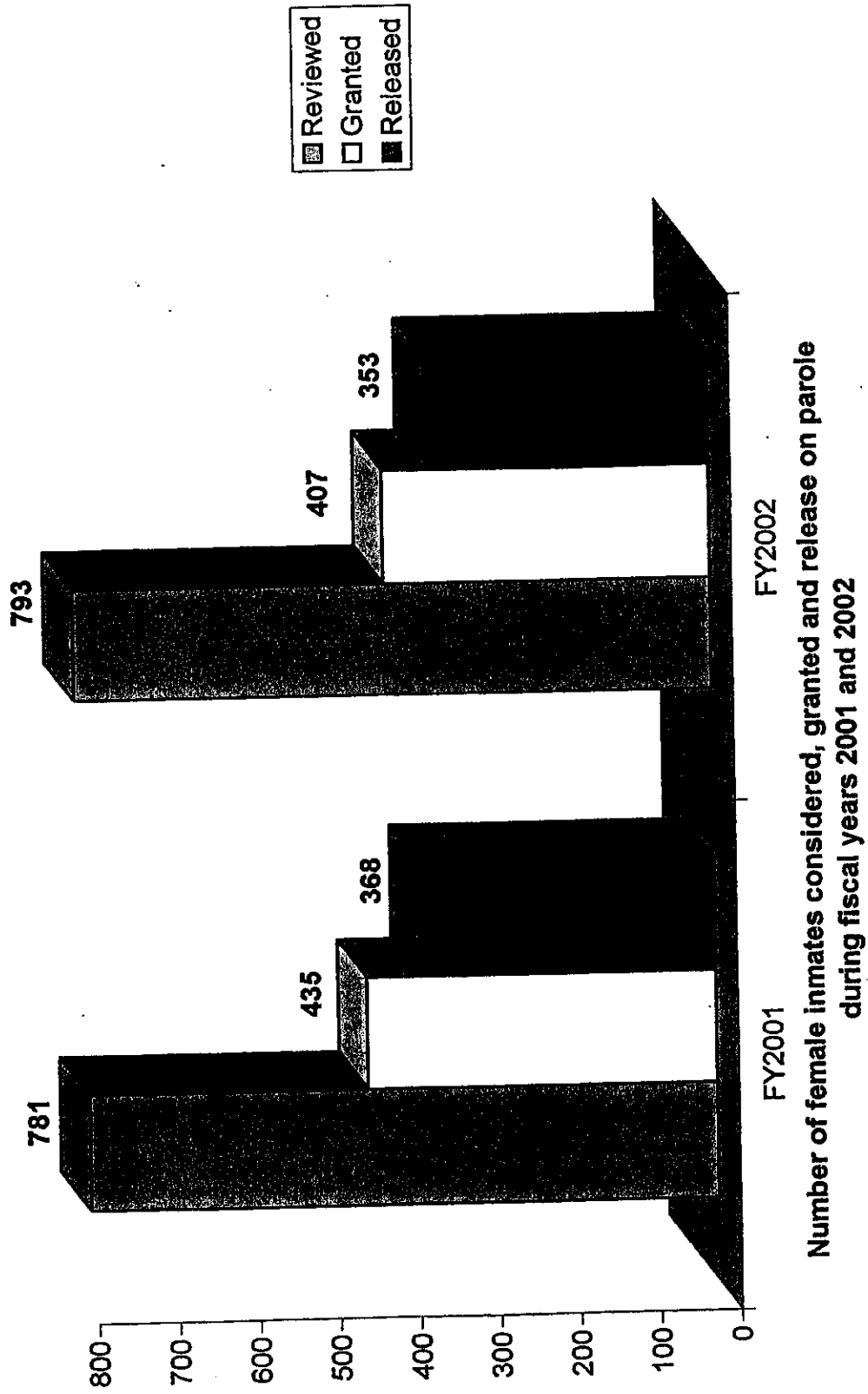
Total number of inmates considered, granted and released on parole during fiscal years 2001 and 2002
