

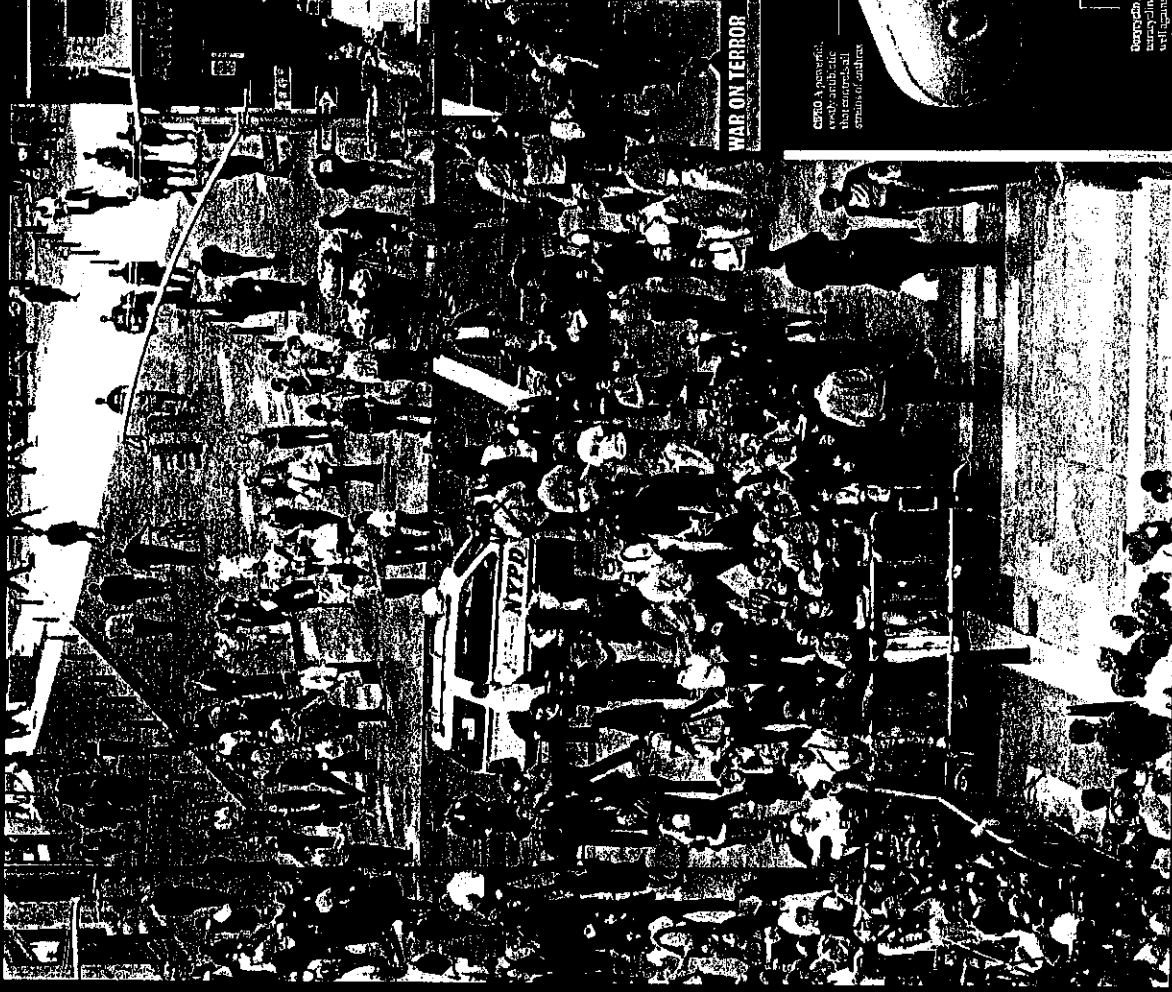

Pharmacists and doctors report that the anti-anthrax medication Cipro is flying off the shelves. But Americans need to be careful: popping pills out of fear may do more harm than good in the long run.
