SUMMARY—Provides for names of candidates to be listed on ballot in accordance with randomized procedure of alphabetization. (BDR 24-907)

AN ACT relating to elections; providing for the names of candidates to be listed on a ballot in accordance with a randomized procedure of alphabetization; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** NRS 293.250 is hereby amended to read as follows: 293.250 1. The Secretary of State shall, in a manner consistent with the election laws of this state, prescribe:
- (a) The form of all ballots, absent ballots, diagrams, sample ballots, certificates, notices, declarations, applications to register to vote, lists, applications, pollbooks, registers, rosters, statements and abstracts required by the election laws of this state.
- (b) The procedure to be followed when a computer is used to register voters and to keep records of registration.
- 2. The Secretary of State shall prescribe with respect to the matter to be printed on every kind of ballot:



- (a) The placement and listing of all offices, candidates and measures upon which voting is statewide, which must be uniform throughout the State.
- (b) The listing of all other candidates required to file with him, and the order of listing all offices, candidates and measures upon which voting is not statewide, from which each county or city clerk shall prepare appropriate ballot forms for use in any election in his county.

The order of listing candidates prescribed by the Secretary of State pursuant to this subsection must comply with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256.

- 3. The Secretary of State shall place the condensation of each proposed constitutional amendment or statewide measure near the spaces or devices for indicating the voter's choice.
- 4. The fiscal note for and explanation of each proposed constitutional amendment or statewide measure, including arguments for and against it, must be included on all sample ballots.
- 5. The condensations and explanations for constitutional amendments and statewide measures proposed by initiative or referendum must be prepared by the Secretary of State, upon consultation with the Attorney General. The fiscal notes for constitutional amendments and statewide measures proposed by initiative or referendum must be prepared by the Secretary of State, upon consultation with the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau. The condensations, explanations and fiscal notes must be in easily understood language and of reasonable length, and whenever feasible must be completed by August 1 of the year in which the general election is to be held.
- 6. The names of candidates for township and legislative or special district offices must be printed only on the ballots furnished to voters of that township or district.
  - 7. A county clerk:

- (a) May divide paper ballots into two sheets in a manner which provides a clear understanding and grouping of all measures and candidates.
- (b) Shall prescribe the color or colors of the ballots and voting receipts used in any election which the clerk is required to conduct.
  - **Sec. 2.** NRS 293.256 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 293.256 *I*. In any election regulated by this chapter, the names of candidates as printed on the ballot [shall]:
- (a) Must not include any title, designation or other reference which will indicate the profession or occupation of such candidates :: and
- (b) Must be listed according to a randomized procedure of alphabetization.



- 2. As used in this section, "randomized procedure of alphabetization" means a procedure pursuant to which:
- (a) Each of the 26 letters of the alphabet is selected successively at random, by way of:
  - (1) The drawing of lots; or

- (2) A computer or other device that is able to generate characters at random;
- (b) The first letter selected at random is assigned to the numeral "1" and each successive letter selected at random is assigned to the next higher numeral until the last letter selected is assigned to the numeral "26";
- (c) For the ordering of the names of the candidates on the applicable ballot, the candidate whose surname begins with the letter corresponding to the numeral "1" is listed first on the ballot, followed by the candidates whose surnames begin with the letters corresponding to numerals "2" through "26," in that order;
- (d) If the surnames of two or more candidates begin with the same letter, the second and, if necessary, subsequent letters of the surnames of the candidates are compared until such subsequent letters are determined to be different, at which point the candidate whose subsequent letter has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose subsequent letters have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b);
- (e) If the surnames of two or more candidates are the same, the candidate whose given name begins with a letter that has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose given names begin with letters that have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b);
- (f) If the surnames of two or more candidates are the same and the given names of those candidates begin with the same letter, the second and, if necessary, subsequent letters of the given names of the candidates are compared until such subsequent letters are determined to be different, at which point the candidate whose subsequent letter has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose subsequent letters have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b); and
- (g) If the surnames and given names of two or more candidates are the same, the order of those candidates on the ballot is determined by drawing lots.



**Sec. 3.** NRS 293.263 is hereby amended to read as follows:

293.263 On the primary ballots for a major political party the name of the major political party must appear at the top of the ballot. Following this designation must appear the names of candidates grouped [alphabetically] in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256 under the title and length of term of the partisan office for which those candidates filed.

**Sec. 4.** NRS 293.265 is hereby amended to read as follows:

293.265 On nonpartisan primary ballots there must appear at the top of the ballot the designation "Candidates for nonpartisan offices." Following this designation must appear the names of candidates grouped [alphabetically] in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256 under the title and length of term of the nonpartisan office for which those candidates filed.

**Sec. 5.** NRS 293.267 is hereby amended to read as follows:

293.267 1. Ballots for a general election must contain the names of candidates who were nominated at the primary election, the names of the candidates of a minor political party and the names of independent candidates.

- 2. Names of candidates must be grouped [alphabetically] in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256 under the title and length of term of the office for which those candidates filed.
  - 3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4:
- (a) Immediately following the name of each candidate for a partisan office must appear the name of his political party or the word "independent," as the case may be.
- (b) Immediately following the name of each candidate for a nonpartisan office must appear the word "nonpartisan."
- 4. Where a system of voting other than by paper ballot is used, the Secretary of State may provide for any placement of the name of the political party or the word "independent" or "nonpartisan" which clearly relates the designation to the name of the candidate to whom it applies.
  - **Sec. 6.** NRS 293.268 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 293.268 The offices for which there are candidates, the names of the candidates therefor, and the questions to be voted upon must be printed on ballots in the following order:
  - 1. President and Vice President of the United States.
- 2. United States Senator and Representative in Congress, in that sequence.
- 42 3. Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, 43 Treasurer, Controller and Attorney General, in that sequence.
  - 4. State Senators and Assemblymen.
  - 5. County and township partisan offices.



- 6. Statewide nonpartisan offices.
- 7. District nonpartisan offices.
- 8. County nonpartisan offices.
- 9. City offices:
- (a) Mayor;

- (b) Councilmen, who must be placed on the ballot:
- (1) If the applicable city has been divided into wards, according to ward in numerical order [, if no] and, within each ward, in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256; or
- (2) If the applicable city has not been divided into wards, in [alphabetical order;] accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293.256; and
  - (c) Municipal judges.
  - 10. Township nonpartisan offices.
  - 11. Questions presented to the voters of the State.
- 12. Questions presented only to the voters of a special district or political subdivision of the State.
  - **Sec. 7.** NRS 293C.255 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 293C.255 *I*. In any election regulated by this chapter, the names of candidates as printed on the ballot [must]:
- (a) Must not include any title, designation or other reference that indicates the profession or occupation of the candidates :; and
- (b) Must be listed according to a randomized procedure of alphabetization.
- 2. As used in this section, "randomized procedure of alphabetization" means a procedure pursuant to which:
- (a) Each of the 26 letters of the alphabet is selected successively at random, by way of:
  - (1) The drawing of lots; or
- 31 (2) A computer or other device that is able to generate 32 characters at random;
  - (b) The first letter selected at random is assigned to the numeral "1" and each successive letter selected at random is assigned to the next higher numeral until the last letter selected is assigned to the numeral "26";
  - (c) For the ordering of the names of the candidates on the applicable ballot, the candidate whose surname begins with the letter corresponding to the numeral "1" is listed first on the ballot, followed by the candidates whose surnames begin with the letters corresponding to numerals "2" through "26," in that order;
  - (d) If the surnames of two or more candidates begin with the same letter, the second and, if necessary, subsequent letters of the surnames of the candidates are compared until such subsequent letters are determined to be different, at which point the candidate



whose subsequent letter has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose subsequent letters have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b);

(e) If the surnames of two or more candidates are the same, the candidate whose given name begins with a letter that has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose given names begin with letters that have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b);

- (f) If the surnames of two or more candidates are the same and the given names of those candidates begin with the same letter, the second and, if necessary, subsequent letters of the given names of the candidates are compared until such subsequent letters are determined to be different, at which point the candidate whose subsequent letter has been assigned a lower numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b) is placed on the ballot before the candidate or candidates whose subsequent letters have been assigned a higher numerical value in accordance with paragraph (b); and
- (g) If the surnames and given names of two or more candidates are the same, the order of those candidates on the ballot is determined by drawing lots.
  - **Sec. 8.** NRS 293C.257 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 293C.257 For a primary city election there must appear at the top of each ballot the designation "Candidates for city offices." Following this designation must appear the names of candidates grouped [alphabetically] in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293C.255 under the title and length of term of the office for which those candidates filed.
- **Sec. 9.** NRS 293C.260 is hereby amended to read as follows: 293C.260 1. Except as otherwise provided in NRS 293C.140, ballots for a general city election must contain the names of candidates who were nominated at the primary city election.
- 2. The names of candidates must be grouped [alphabetically] in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293C.255 under the title and length of term of the office for which those candidates filed.
- **Sec. 10.** NRS 293C.262 is hereby amended to read as follows: 293C.262 1. The offices for which there are candidates, the names of the candidates therefor and the questions to be voted upon must be printed on ballots for a city election in the following order:
  - (a) City offices:

(1) Mayor;



(2) Councilmen, who must be placed on the ballot:
(I) If the applicable city has been divided into wards,

according to ward in numerical order [, if no] and, within each ward, in accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293C.255; or

- (II) If the applicable city has not been divided into wards, in [alphabetical order;] accordance with paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 293C.255; and
  - (3) Municipal judges.
- (b) Questions presented to the voters of a city or a portion of a city.
  - 2. The city clerk:

- (a) May divide paper ballots into two sheets in a manner that provides a clear understanding and grouping of all measures and candidates.
- (b) Shall prescribe the color or colors of the ballots and voting receipts used in any election which the clerk is required to conduct.
