SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing education. (BDR 34-864)

AN ACT relating to public education; changing the name of the State Board for Occupational Education to the State Board for Career and Technical Education; changing the term "occupational education" to "career and technical education"; requiring each school district to establish and maintain a program of career and technical education in accordance with the regulations adopted by the State Board for Career and Technical Education: establishing career and technical education diplomas; authorizing a school district to hire certain persons with technical expertise to assist with classroom instruction for a program of career and technical education; requiring school districts to schedule start times for public schools in a certain manner; authorizing school districts and charter schools to request permission from the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada for high school teachers to teach dual-credit courses; authorizing teachers to submit evaluations of principals; revising various provisions governing pupils; making an appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.



## Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law creates the State Board for Occupational Education and establishes the requirements for occupational education in public schools within the State. (NRS 388.330-388.400)

This bill renames the State Board for Occupational Education to the State Board for Career and Technical Education and redesignates occupational education as career and technical education. This bill requires each school district to establish and maintain a program of career and technical education in accordance with the requirements of the Board. Each program must include an internship program developed in cooperation with the State Apprenticeship Council which allows pupils to work as apprentices in business settings.

This bill establishes career and technical education diplomas. An advanced career and technical education diploma is awarded to a pupil who successfully completes a career and technical education program and passes all portions of the high school proficiency examination. A standard career and technical education diploma is awarded to a pupil who successfully completes a career and technical education diploma and who receives at least the average score prescribed by the State Board for Career and Technical Education on the high school proficiency examination. The average score must be derived by combining all portions of the examination rather than requiring a passing score on each portion.

This bill authorizes a school district to employ a person who is not a licensed teacher to assist with instruction in a career and technical education program if the person holds a master's degree in the field in which he will assist with instruction and he does not assist with instruction for more than 25 percent of a course. A person must undergo a criminal background check before he may be employed.

Existing law requires each school district to schedule 180 days of free school per school year. (NRS 388.090)

This bill requires a school district to schedule the school day so that pupils are not required or authorized to attend public school before 8:00 a.m. In addition, all elementary schools must begin the school day before all middle schools and high schools and all middle schools must begin the school day before all high schools. If a school district does not comply with these scheduling requirements by the beginning of the 2006-2007 school year, 5 percent of its basic support allocation from the State Distributive School Account must be withheld.

Existing law authorizes high school pupils to earn credit towards graduation from high school for courses taken at a community college or university within the University and Community College System of Nevada. (NRS 389.160)

This bill authorizes school districts and charter schools to request permission from the Board of Regents for certain high school teachers to provide instruction for the dual-credit courses offered in which a pupil earns high school credit and college credit for the same course.

Existing law requires each school district to develop an objective policy for the evaluation of administrators employed by the school district. (NRS 391.3127)

This bill amends existing law to provide that teachers employed at a school where an administrator is employed may submit an evaluation for inclusion in the formal evaluation of the administrator.

This bill makes an appropriation of \$250,000 to the Department of Education to provide grants of money to pay registration fees and other costs of pupils who are enrolled in dual-credit courses in which high school credit and college credit may be earned for the same course.

- (4) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and
- (5) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State Board.
- (c) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each subgroup identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the annual measurable objectives of the State Board.
- (d) The percentage of all pupils who were not tested, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the subgroups identified in paragraph (b).
- (f) The most recent 3-year trend in the achievement of pupils in each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, which may include information regarding the trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such information is available.



(g) Information on whether each school district has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of each school district, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377 and the number of consecutive years that the school district has carried that designation.

- (h) Information on whether each public school, including, without limitation, each charter school, has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of each public school, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.
- (i) Information on the results of pupils who participated in the examinations of the National Assessment of Educational Progress required pursuant to NRS 389.012.
- (j) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each grade level for all elementary schools, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, and the average class size for each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each secondary school, reported for each school district and for this State as a whole.
- (k) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, information on the professional qualifications of teachers employed by the school districts and charter schools, including, without limitation:
  - (1) The percentage of teachers who are:

- (v) For each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the number and percentage of pupils who did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils failed to pass the high school proficiency examination.
- (w) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, for each school in the district and for the district as a whole.
- (x) The amount and sources of money received for the training and professional development of teachers and other educational personnel for each school in the district and for the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (y) Whether the school district has made adequate yearly progress. If the school district has been designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377, the report must



include a statement indicating the number of consecutive years the school district has carried that designation.

- (z) Information on whether each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation:
- (1) The number and percentage of schools in the district, if any, that have been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623; and
- (2) The name of each school, if any, in the district that has been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.
- (aa) Information on the paraprofessionals employed by each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The information must include:
- (1) The number of paraprofessionals employed at the school; and
- (2) The number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in positions supported with Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in positions supported with Title I money.
- (bb) For each high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school that operates as a high school, information that provides a comparison of the rate of graduation of pupils enrolled in the high school with the rate of graduation of pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The information required by this paragraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.
- (cc) An identification of the appropriations made by the Legislature that are available to the school district or the schools within the district and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.
- (dd) Such other information as is directed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
- 3. The records of attendance maintained by a school for purposes of paragraph (i) of subsection 2 must include the number of teachers who are in attendance at school and the number of teachers who are absent from school. A teacher shall be deemed in attendance if the teacher is excused from being present in the classroom by the school in which he is employed for one of the following reasons:



- (a) Acquisition of knowledge or skills relating to the professional development of the teacher; or
  - (b) Assignment of the teacher to perform duties for cocurricular or extracurricular activities of pupils.

If a pupil fails to demonstrate at least adequate achievement on the examination administered before the completion of grade 4, 7 or 10, he may be promoted to the next higher grade, but the results of his examination must be evaluated to determine what remedial study is appropriate. If such a pupil is enrolled at a school that has failed to make adequate yearly progress or in which less than 60 percent of the pupils enrolled in grade 4, 7 or 10 in the school who took the examinations administered pursuant to this section received an average score on those examinations that is at least equal to the 26th percentile of the national reference group of pupils to which the examinations were compared, the pupil must, in accordance with the requirements set forth in this subsection, complete remedial study that is determined to be appropriate for the pupil.
- 5. If a pupil fails to pass the *high school* proficiency examination [administered before the completion of grade 11,] or to receive the average score on the examination prescribed by the State Board for Career and Technical Education pursuant to section 8 of this act, as applicable, he must not be graduated until he is able, through remedial study, to pass the proficiency examination, but he may be given a certificate of attendance, in place of a diploma, if he has reached the age of 17 years.



- The State Board shall prescribe standard examinations of achievement and proficiency to be administered pursuant to subsection 1. The high school proficiency examination must include the subjects of reading, mathematics and science and, except for the writing portion prescribed pursuant to NRS 389.550, must be developed, printed and scored by a nationally recognized testing company in accordance with the process established by the testing company. The examinations on reading, mathematics and science prescribed for grades 4, 7 and 10 must be selected from examinations created by private entities and administered to a national reference group, and must allow for a comparison of the achievement and proficiency of pupils in grades 4, 7 and 10 in this State to that of a national reference group of pupils in grades 4, 7 and 10. The questions contained in the examinations and the approved answers used for grading them are confidential, and disclosure is unlawful except:
- (a) To the extent necessary for administering and evaluating the examinations.
  - (b) That a disclosure may be made to a:

- (1) State officer who is a member of the Executive or Legislative Branch to the extent that it is necessary for the performance of his duties;
- (2) Superintendent of schools of a school district to the extent that it is necessary for the performance of his duties;
- (3) Director of curriculum of a school district to the extent that it is necessary for the performance of his duties; and
- (4) Director of testing of a school district to the extent that it is necessary for the performance of his duties.
- (c) That specific questions and answers may be disclosed if the Superintendent of Public Instruction determines that the content of the questions and answers is not being used in a current examination and making the content available to the public poses no threat to the security of the current examination process.
  - **Sec. 24.** NRS 389.0173 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 389.0173 1. The Department shall develop an informational pamphlet concerning the high school proficiency examination for pupils who are enrolled in junior high, middle school and high school, and their parents and legal guardians. The pamphlet must include a written explanation of the:
- (a) Importance of passing the examination, including, without limitation, an explanation that if the pupil fails the examination or does not receive an average score prescribed by the State Board for Career and Technical Education pursuant to section 8 of this act, as applicable, he is not eligible to receive a [standard] high school diploma;



(b) Subject areas tested on the examination;

- (c) Format for the examination, including, without limitation, the range of items that are contained on the examination;
- (d) Manner by which the scaled score, as reported to pupils and their parents or legal guardians, is derived from the raw score;
- (e) Timeline by which the results of the examination must be reported to pupils and their parents or legal guardians;
- (f) Maximum number of times that a pupil is allowed to take the examination if he fails to pass the examination after the first administration;
- (g) Courses of study that the Department recommends that pupils take to prepare the pupils to successfully meet the academic challenges of the examination and pass the examination; and
- (h) Courses of study which the Department recommends that pupils take in high school to successfully prepare for the college entrance examinations.
- 2. The Department shall review the pamphlet on an annual basis and make such revisions to the pamphlet as it considers necessary to ensure that pupils and their parents or legal guardians fully understand the examination.
- 3. On or before September 1, the Department shall provide a copy of the pamphlet or revised pamphlet to the board of trustees of each school district and the governing body of each charter school that includes pupils enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school grade level.
- 4. The board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each junior high, middle school or high school within the school district for posting. The governing body of each charter school shall ensure that a copy of the pamphlet is posted at the charter school. Each principal of a junior high, middle school, high school or charter school shall ensure that the teachers, counselors and administrators employed at the school fully understand the contents of the pamphlet.
  - 5. On or before January 15, the:
- (a) Board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school of the school district and to the parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.
- (b) Governing body of each charter school shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in the charter school at a junior high, middle school or high school grade level and to the parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.
  - **Sec. 25.** NRS 389.160 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 389.160 1. A pupil enrolled in high school, including, without limitation, a pupil enrolled in grade 9, 10, 11 or 12 in a



charter school, who successfully completes a course of education offered by a community college or university in this State which has been approved pursuant to subsection 2, must be allowed to apply the credit received for the course so completed to the total number of credits required for graduation from high school or the charter school in which the pupil is enrolled.

- 2. With the approval of the State Board, the board of trustees of each county school district and the governing body of each charter school shall prescribe the courses for which credits may be received pursuant to subsection 1, including [occupational] career and technical courses for academic credit, and the amount of credit allowed for the completion of those courses.

  - (b) Holds a master's degree in the subject area he teaches.
  - **Sec. 26.** NRS 389.165 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 389.165 1. A pupil enrolled in high school who successfully completes a community service project which has been approved pursuant to this section must be allowed to apply [not more than one] credit received for the completion of the project toward the total number of credits required for graduation from high school. [The] All credit received must be applied toward the pupil's elective course credits and not toward a course that is required for graduation from high school. A pupil may not receive credit for the completion of a community service project if the project duplicates a course of study in which the pupil has received instruction.
- 2. With the approval of the State Board, the board of trustees of each school district shall prescribe for the district the:
- (a) Community service projects for which credit will be [granted;] granted.

- **Sec. 27.** NRS 391.3127 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 391.3127 1. Each board, following consultation with and involvement of elected representatives of administrative personnel or their designated representatives, shall develop an objective policy for the objective evaluation of administrators in narrative form. The policy must set forth a means according to which an administrator's overall performance may be determined to be satisfactory or unsatisfactory. The policy [may]:
- (a) Must include a provision authorizing each teacher employed at a school where the administrator is employed to submit an evaluation for inclusion in the formal evaluation of the administrator.
- (b) May include an evaluation by the administrator, superintendent, pupils or other administrators, or any combination thereof.
- → A copy of the policy adopted by the board must be filed with the Department and made available to the Commission.

- 392.033 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, a pupil who is enrolled in a junior high school or middle school must complete at least 15 units of credits to be promoted to high school. The State Board shall adopt regulations which prescribe the courses of study required for promotion to high school, which [may] must include the credits [to be earned.] required for each course of study.
- 2. The board of trustees of a school district may adopt written rules that authorize a pupil who is enrolled in a junior high school or middle school to apply for a reduction of the total units of credit



required for promotion to high school if the pupil has fewer than three absences in each year that he is enrolled in a junior high school or middle school. The board of trustees may reduce the total units of credit required for promotion to high school pursuant to this subsection by not more than one-half of the total units of credit required for promotion.

- [3.] 4. The board of trustees of each school district shall adopt a procedure for evaluating the course of study or credits completed by a pupil who transfers to a junior high or middle school from a junior high or middle school in this State or from a school outside of this State.
  - **Sec. 29.** NRS 392.125 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 392.125 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4, before any pupil enrolled in a public school may be retained in the same grade rather than promoted to the next higher grade for the succeeding school year, the pupil's teacher and principal must make a reasonable effort to arrange a meeting and to meet with his parents or guardian to discuss the reasons and circumstances.
- 2. The teacher and the principal in joint agreement have the final authority to retain a pupil in the same grade for the succeeding school year.
  - 3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection [2] 3 of NRS 392.033 for the promotion of a pupil to high school, no pupil may be retained more than one time in the same grade.
- 4. This section does not apply to the academic retention of pupils who are enrolled in a charter school.
  - **Sec. 30.** NRS 392.455 is hereby amended to read as follows:
  - 392.455 1. If a school district or a charter school has established classes in **[occupational]** career and technical education, the teachers and pupils in those classes must wear devices provided by the school district or the charter school which are designed to protect their eyes while they are using power tools, torches or other dangerous equipment or machinery.
  - 2. The teachers and pupils in classes in science must wear devices provided by the school district which are designed to protect their eyes when chemicals or toxic substances are used in those classes.



**Sec. 31.** Chapter 396 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

For the purposes of the dual credit authorized pursuant to NRS 389.160, the board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a charter school may request that the Board of Regents grant permission for a licensed teacher who:

- 1. Is employed by the school district or charter school;
- 2. Provides instruction at a high school; and
- 3. Holds a master's degree in the subject area he teaches,

to provide instruction for dual-credit courses.

Within the limits of legislative appropriations, the Department of Education, the county school districts of the various counties of the State, the Nevada Youth Training Center Bureau and the Caliente Youth Center Bureau of the Division of Child and Family Services of the Department of Human Resources and any other state facility for the detention of children that is operated pursuant to title 5 of NRS may enter into cooperative arrangements for improving the quality of the academic and [occupational] career and technical education provided at the Nevada Youth Training Center, the Caliente Youth Center and any other state facility for the detention of children that is operated pursuant to title 5 of NRS.
- 2. - 563.030 1. One member of the Board must be a member of the teaching staff of the College of Agriculture of the University of Nevada, Reno;

- 3. One member of the Board must be a member of the staff of the State Board for [Occupational] Career and Technical Education; and
- 4. Four members of the Board must be persons concerned with the raising and improving of livestock in the State of Nevada, not necessarily stock raisers, selected as follows:

  - (b) One person whose interest is in horses; and

A principal or other administrator of a high school in which a pupil is enrolled and is receiving dual credit or participating in early studies from a course at a community college or university pursuant to NRS 389.160 may apply to the Department of Education for a grant of money to pay the costs of the pupil to attend the course.
- 3. The Department of Education shall establish a program by which a principal or administrator of a high school may apply to the Department for a grant of money pursuant to this section. The program must set forth, without limitation:

**Sec. 41.** The provisions of NRS 354.599 do not apply to any additional expenses of a local government that are related to the provisions of this act.
