**SUMMARY**—Encourages adoption of regulations to facilitate display and sale of artistic expressions protected by First Amendment in state, county and municipal parks, and recreational and cultural facilities. (BDR S-555)

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AN ACT relating to parks; encouraging the adoption of regulations to facilitate the display and sale of artistic expressions protected by the First Amendment in state, county and municipal parks, recreational and cultural facilities; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

1        WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has  
2 recognized that art is a form of expression protected by the First  
3 Amendment; and

4        WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has held  
5 that a narrow, succinctly articulable message is not a condition of  
6 constitutional protection, which if confined to expressions  
7 conveying a particularized message, would never reach the  
8 unquestionably shielded painting of Jackson Pollock, music of  
9 Arnold Schoenberg, or Jabberwocky verse of Lewis Carroll; and

10      WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has held  
11 that public parks are quintessential public forums where citizens  
12 may engage in constitutionally protected expression, subject only to  
13 *reasonable* restrictions on the time, place and manner of their doing  
14 so; and

1        WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has held  
2 that it is unquestioned that the First Amendment protection is not  
3 lost simply because the protected expression is sold for profit; and

4        WHEREAS, The President's Committee on the Arts and the  
5 Humanities has found that participation in the arts and humanities  
6 unlocks the human potential for creativity and supports a thriving  
7 culture that is at the core of a vital society; and

8        WHEREAS, The use of the parks for the appreciation and  
9 viewing of art has not yet been fully realized but presents continuing  
10 opportunities to broaden the visitor base and public enjoyment of  
11 Nevada's parks by making art and culture basic components of  
12 recreation; now, therefore,

13                  THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
14                  SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

15                  **Section 1.** 1. The Legislature hereby encourages:

16                  (a) The Administrator of the Division of State Parks of the State  
17 Department of Conservation and Natural Resources;

18                  (b) Each board of county commissioners, county park and  
19 recreation commission and county park commission; and

20                  (c) The governing body of each city or town,

21                  ➔ to adopt regulations to facilitate the display and sale of artistic  
22 expressions protected by the First Amendment in the public parks,  
23 public recreational and cultural facilities and other public spaces  
24 within their respective jurisdictions.

25                  2. The Legislature hereby encourages the Administrator,  
26 county commissioners, county park and recreation commissions,  
27 county park commissions and the governing bodies to adopt  
28 regulations that do not create impediments to artistic expression, but  
29 include reasonable standards for:

30                  (a) Designating space within public parks, public recreational  
31 and cultural facilities or other suitable public spaces within their  
32 respective jurisdictions, including sidewalks, for the display of  
33 various forms of artistic expression, including space for an artist to  
34 sell art he has created; and

35                  (b) Allocating space within the public park, public recreational  
36 or cultural facility or other public space among the artists wishing to  
37 display and sell their work in the public park, public recreational or  
38 cultural facility or other public space, at the lowest cost possible to  
39 encourage artists and the public to participate in, develop and enjoy  
40 various forms of art.
