ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 397-ASSEMBLYWOMAN GIUNCHIGLIANI

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing diplomas and high school proficiency examination. (BDR 34-131)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact. Effect on the State: Yes.

EXPLANATION - Matter in bolded italics is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; removing the requirement that a pupil pass the high school proficiency examination as a condition to receipt of a high school diploma; designating the types of diplomas that may be issued to pupils; requiring the State Board of Education to prescribe alternative criteria for receipt of an advanced diploma; requiring homeschooled children to take certain achievement and proficiency examinations; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. NRS 385.3469 is hereby amended to read as follows:

385.3469 1. The State Board shall prepare an annual report of accountability that includes, without limitation:

- (a) Information on the achievement of all pupils based upon the results of the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- 10 (b) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, pupil 11 achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately 12 for the following subgroups of pupils:



- 1 (1) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined 2 by the State Board;
 - (2) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by the State Board;
 - (3) Pupils with disabilities;

- (4) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and
- (5) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State Board.
- (c) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each subgroup identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the annual measurable objectives of the State Board.
- (d) The percentage of all pupils who were not tested, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the subgroups identified in paragraph (b).
- (f) The most recent 3-year trend in the achievement of pupils in each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, which may include information regarding the trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such information is available.
- (g) Information on whether each school district has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of each school district, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377 and the number of consecutive years that the school district has carried that designation.
- (h) Information on whether each public school, including, without limitation, each charter school, has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of each public school, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.
- (i) Information on the results of pupils who participated in the examinations of the National Assessment of Educational Progress required pursuant to NRS 389.012.
- (j) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each grade level for all elementary schools, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, and the average class size for each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each



secondary school, reported for each school district and for this State as a whole.

- (k) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, information on the professional qualifications of teachers employed by the school districts and charter schools, including, without limitation:
 - (1) The percentage of teachers who are:

- (I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;
- (II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in which the teachers are employed; or
- (III) Otherwise providing instruction without an endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are employed;
- (2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by highly qualified teachers; and
- (3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by highly qualified teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by high-poverty compared to low-poverty schools, which for the purposes of this subparagraph, means schools in the top quartile of poverty and the bottom quartile of poverty in this State.
- (1) The total expenditure per pupil for each school district in this State, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.
- (m) The total statewide expenditure per pupil. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.
- (n) For all elementary schools, junior high schools and middle schools, the rate of attendance, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (o) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, reported for each school district, including, without



limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, excluding pupils who:

- (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful completion of the examinations of general educational development.
- (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard diploma.
 - (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.
- (p) The attendance of teachers who provide instruction, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (q) Incidents involving weapons or violence, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (r) Incidents involving the use or possession of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (s) The suspension and expulsion of pupils required or authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (t) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (u) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (v) The transiency rate of pupils, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole. For the purposes of this paragraph, a pupil is not a transient if he is transferred to a different school within the school district as a result of a change in the zone of attendance by the board of trustees of the school district pursuant to NRS 388.040.
- (w) Each source of funding for this State to be used for the system of public education.
- 40 (x) The amount and sources of money received by this State for remedial education.
 - (y) The percentage of pupils who graduated from a high school or charter school in the immediately preceding year and enrolled in remedial courses in reading, writing or mathematics at a university or community college within the University and Community



College System of Nevada, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

- (z) The technological facilities and equipment available for educational purposes, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (aa) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of pupils who received:
 - (1) An advanced high school diploma.
 - (2) A standard high school diploma.

- (3) An adjusted *high school* diploma.
- (4) A certificate of attendance.
- (bb) The number and percentage of pupils who [did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils] failed to pass the high school proficiency examination, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (cc) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or local law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.
- (dd) Information on the paraprofessionals employed at public schools in this State, including, without limitation, the charter schools in this State. The information must include:
- (1) The number of paraprofessionals employed, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole; and
- (2) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in programs supported with Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in programs supported with Title I money.
- (ee) An identification of appropriations made by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.



- 2. A separate reporting for a subgroup of pupils must not be made pursuant to this section if the number of pupils in that subgroup is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual pupil. The State Board shall prescribe a mechanism for determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a subgroup for that subgroup to yield statistically reliable information.
 - 3. The annual report of accountability must:
- (a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(1) and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto;
 - (b) Be prepared in a concise manner; and
- (c) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can understand.
- 4. On or before September 1 of each year, the State Board shall provide for public dissemination of the annual report of accountability and submit a copy of the report to the:
 - (a) Governor;
 - (b) Committee;
- (c) Bureau;

- (d) Board of Regents of the University of Nevada;
- (e) Board of trustees of each school district; and
- (f) Governing body of each charter school.
- 5. As used in this section:
- 25 (a) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(23).
- 27 (b) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in 28 NRS 391.008.
 - **Sec. 2.** NRS 385.347 is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - 385.347 1. The board of trustees of each school district in this State, in cooperation with associations recognized by the State Board as representing licensed personnel in education in the district, shall adopt a program providing for the accountability of the school district to the residents of the district and to the State Board for the quality of the schools and the educational achievement of the pupils in the district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in charter schools in the school district. The board of trustees of a school district shall report the information required by subsection 2 for each charter school within the school district, regardless of the sponsor of the charter school.

 - (a) The educational goals and objectives of the school district.



(b) Pupil achievement for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The board of trustees of the district shall base its report on the results of the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550 and shall compare the results of those examinations for the current school year with those of previous school years. The report must include, for each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and each grade in which the examinations were administered:

- (1) The number of pupils who took the examinations;
- (2) An explanation of instances in which a school was exempt from administering or a pupil was exempt from taking an examination;
- (3) A record of attendance for the period in which the examinations were administered, including an explanation of any difference in the number of pupils who took the examinations and the number of pupils who are enrolled in the school;
- (4) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, pupil achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the following subgroups of pupils:
- (I) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined by the State Board;
- (II) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by the State Board;
 - (III) Pupils with disabilities;
 - (IV) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and
- (V) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State Board;
- (5) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each subgroup identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the annual measurable objectives of the State Board;
 - (6) The percentage of pupils who were not tested;
- (7) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, the percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the subgroups identified in subparagraph (4);

- (10) For each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, information that compares the results of pupils in the school with the results of pupils throughout the school district and throughout this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.

If a statewide program is not available, each school district shall use its own financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.
 - (f) The curriculum used by the school district, including:

- (1) Any special programs for pupils at an individual school; and
- 12 (2) The curriculum used by each charter school in the 13 district.
 - (g) Records of the attendance and truancy of pupils in all grades, including, without limitation:
 - (1) The average daily attendance of pupils, for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
 - (2) For each elementary school, middle school and junior high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district that provides instruction to pupils enrolled in a grade level other than high school, information that compares the attendance of the pupils enrolled in the school with the attendance of pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.
 - (h) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, for each such grade, for each school in the district and for the district as a whole, excluding pupils who:
 - (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful completion of the examinations of general educational development.
 - (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard diploma.
 - (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.
 - (i) Records of attendance of teachers who provide instruction, for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
 - (j) Efforts made by the school district and by each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, to increase:
 - (1) Communication with the parents of pupils in the district; and



(2) The participation of parents in the educational process and activities relating to the school district and each school, including, without limitation, the existence of parent organizations and school advisory committees.

- (k) Records of incidents involving weapons or violence for each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (l) Records of incidents involving the use or possession of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances for each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (m) Records of the suspension and expulsion of pupils required or authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467.
- (n) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (o) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (p) The transiency rate of pupils for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. - (t) The technological facilities and equipment available at each school, including, without limitation, each charter school, and the district's plan to incorporate educational technology at each school.
- (u) For each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the number and percentage of pupils who received:



- (1) An advanced high school diploma.
- (2) A standard high school diploma.

- [(2)] (3) An adjusted *high school* diploma.
- (4) A certificate of attendance.
- (v) For each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the number and percentage of pupils who [did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils] failed to pass the high school proficiency examination.
- (w) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, for each school in the district and for the district as a whole.
- (x) The amount and sources of money received for the training and professional development of teachers and other educational personnel for each school in the district and for the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.
- (y) Whether the school district has made adequate yearly progress. If the school district has been designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377, the report must include a statement indicating the number of consecutive years the school district has carried that designation.
- (z) Information on whether each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation:
- (1) The number and percentage of schools in the district, if any, that have been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623; and
- (2) The name of each school, if any, in the district that has been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.
- (aa) Information on the paraprofessionals employed by each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The information must include:
- (1) The number of paraprofessionals employed at the school; and
- (2) The number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in positions supported with



Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in positions supported with Title I money.

- (bb) For each high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school that operates as a high school, information that provides a comparison of the rate of graduation of pupils enrolled in the high school with the rate of graduation of pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The information required by this paragraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.
- (cc) An identification of the appropriations made by the Legislature that are available to the school district or the schools within the district and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.
- (dd) Such other information as is directed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
- 3. The records of attendance maintained by a school for purposes of paragraph (i) of subsection 2 must include the number of teachers who are in attendance at school and the number of teachers who are absent from school. A teacher shall be deemed in attendance if the teacher is excused from being present in the classroom by the school in which he is employed for one of the following reasons:
- (a) Acquisition of knowledge or skills relating to the professional development of the teacher; or
- (b) Assignment of the teacher to perform duties for cocurricular or extracurricular activities of pupils.
- 4. The annual report of accountability prepared pursuant to subsection 2 must:
- (a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. \S 6311(h)(2) and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto; and
- (b) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can understand.
 - 5. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall:
 - (a) Prescribe forms for the reports required pursuant to subsection 2 and provide the forms to the respective school districts.
 - (b) Provide statistical information and technical assistance to the school districts to ensure that the reports provide comparable information with respect to each school in each district and among the districts throughout this State.
 - (c) Consult with a representative of the:
 - (1) Nevada State Education Association;
 - (2) Nevada Association of School Boards;
 - (3) Nevada Association of School Administrators;

 - (6) Legislative Counsel Bureau,

- → concerning the program and consider any advice or recommendations submitted by the representatives with respect to the program.
- The Superintendent of Public Instruction may consult with representatives of parent groups other than the Nevada Parent Teacher Association concerning the program and consider any advice or recommendations submitted by the representatives with respect to the program.
- 7. On or before April 1 of each year, the board of trustees of each school district shall submit to:
- (a) Each advisory board to review school attendance created in the county pursuant to NRS 392.126 the information required in paragraph (g) of subsection 2.
- (b) The Commission on Educational Technology created by NRS 388.790 the information prepared by the board of trustees pursuant to paragraph (t) of subsection 2.
- 8. On or before August 15 of each year, the board of trustees of each school district shall:
 - (a) Submit the report required pursuant to subsection 2 to the:
 - (1) Governor:
 - (2) State Board;
 - (3) Department;

- (a) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(23). 38
- (b) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in 39 NRS 391.008. 40
 - **Sec. 3.** Chapter 389 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 4 and 5 of this act.
 - Sec. 4. 1. A pupil may receive a high school diploma designated as an advanced diploma if he satisfies the requirements for graduation from high school and he:



- 1 (a) Passes the high school proficiency examination 2 administered pursuant to NRS 389.015; or
 - (b) Satisfies the alternative criteria prescribed by the State Board pursuant to subsection 5.
 - 2. A pupil may receive a high school diploma designated as a standard diploma if he does not satisfy the criteria for receipt of an advanced diploma but otherwise satisfies the requirements for graduation from high school.
 - 3. A pupil with a disability who does not satisfy the requirements for receipt of an advanced high school diploma or a standard high school diploma may receive a diploma designated as an adjusted diploma if he satisfies the requirements set forth in his individualized education program. As used in this subsection, "individualized education program" has the meaning ascribed to it in $20 \text{ U.S.C.} \ \S 1414(d)(1)(A)$.
 - 4. A pupil who does not satisfy the requirements for receipt of a high school diploma may receive a certificate of attendance in lieu of a diploma if he has reached the age of 17 years. The school in which the pupil is enrolled shall allow the pupil to participate in the graduation ceremony of the school to receive his certificate of attendance.
 - 5. The State Board shall adopt regulations that prescribe alternative criteria for receipt of an advanced high school diploma, including, without limitation, administration of an oral examination or evaluation of a portfolio of a pupil's work, or both.
 - 6. A pupil who satisfies the:

- 27 (a) Alternative criteria prescribed by the State Board for 28 receipt of an advanced high school diploma;
- 29 (b) Requirements for receipt of a standard high school 30 diploma; or
 - (c) Requirements for receipt of an adjusted diploma,
 - is not exempt from taking the high school proficiency examination administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 for the purpose of measuring the adequate yearly progress of the school and the school district in which the pupil is enrolled as set forth in NRS 385.361, unless he is otherwise exempt in accordance with the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, 20 U.S.C. §§ 6301 et seq.
 - Sec. 5. 1. If a person is enrolled in an adult high school diploma program approved by the Department and the person fails one or more portions of the high school proficiency examination, there is no limitation on the number of times that the person may retake the portion or portions of the examination that he failed to pass.
 - 2. A person who is enrolled in an adult high school diploma program approved by the Department must be allowed to take and



1 retake the high school proficiency examination or any portion or 2 portions of the examination that he failed to pass, regardless of his 3 age.

- **Sec. 6.** NRS 389.015 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 389.015 1. The board of trustees of each school district shall administer examinations in all public schools of the school district. The governing body of a charter school shall administer the same examinations in the charter school. The examinations administered by the board of trustees and governing body must determine the achievement and proficiency of pupils in:

- (c) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 6, science.
- 2. The examinations required by subsection 1 must be:

- (a) Importance of passing the examination, including, without limitation, an explanation that if the pupil fails the examination he is not eligible to receive *an advanced high school diploma or* a standard high school diploma;
 - (b) Subject areas tested on the examination;

- (c) Format for the examination, including, without limitation, the range of items that are contained on the examination;
- (d) Manner by which the scaled score, as reported to pupils and their parents or legal guardians, is derived from the raw score;

 - 2. The Department shall review the pamphlet on an annual basis and make such revisions to the pamphlet as it considers necessary to ensure that pupils and their parents or legal guardians fully understand the examination.
 - 3. On or before September 1, the Department shall provide a copy of the pamphlet or revised pamphlet to the board of trustees of each school district and the governing body of each charter school that includes pupils enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school grade level.
 - 4. The board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each junior high, middle school or high school within the school district for posting. The governing body of each charter school shall ensure that a copy of the pamphlet is posted at the charter school. Each principal of a junior high, middle



school, high school or charter school shall ensure that the teachers, counselors and administrators employed at the school fully understand the contents of the pamphlet.

5. On or before January 15, the:

(a) Board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school of the school district and to the parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.

(b) Governing body of each charter school shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in the charter school at a junior high, middle school or high school grade level and to the

parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.

Sec. 9. NRS 392.070 is hereby amended to read as follows:

392.040 must be excused when satisfactory written evidence is presented to the board of trustees of the school district in which the child resides that the child is receiving at home or in some other school equivalent instruction of the kind and amount approved by the State Board. As a condition to excusing a homeschooled child from compulsory attendance, the board of trustees of the school district shall require:

- (a) The child to take the achievement and proficiency examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015, excluding the high school proficiency examination, if the grade level in which those examinations are administered is commensurate with the grade level in which the child receives instruction at home.
- (b) That the results of the achievement and proficiency examinations administered to the child be submitted to the Department.
- The State Board shall adopt regulations governing the administration of the achievement and proficiency examinations, excluding the high school proficiency examination, to homeschooled children to ensure the confidentiality and security of the examinations.
- 2. The board of trustees of each school district shall provide programs of special education and related services for homeschooled children. The programs of special education and related services required by this section must be made available:
- (a) Only if a child would otherwise be eligible for participation in programs of special education and related services pursuant to NRS 388.440 to 388.520, inclusive:
- (b) In the same manner that the board of trustees provides, as required by 20 U.S.C. § 1412, for the participation of pupils with disabilities who are enrolled in private schools within the school district voluntarily by their parents or legal guardians; and



(c) In accordance with the same requirements set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 1412 which relate to the participation of pupils with disabilities who are enrolled in private schools within the school district voluntarily by their parents or legal guardians.

- 3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2 for programs of special education and related services, upon the request of a parent or legal guardian of a child who is enrolled in a private school or a parent or legal guardian of a homeschooled child, the board of trustees of the school district in which the child resides shall authorize the child to participate in a class that is not available to the child at the private school or home school or participate in an extracurricular activity, excluding sports, at a public school within the school district if:
- (a) Space for the child in the class or extracurricular activity is available; and
- (b) The parent or legal guardian demonstrates to the satisfaction of the board of trustees that the child is qualified to participate in the class or extracurricular activity.
- → If the board of trustees of a school district authorizes a child to participate in a class or extracurricular activity, excluding sports, pursuant to this subsection, the board of trustees is not required to provide transportation for the child to attend the class or activity. A homeschooled child must be allowed to participate in interscholastic activities and events pursuant to NRS 386.420 to 386.470, inclusive.
- 4. The board of trustees of a school district may revoke its approval for a pupil to participate in a class or extracurricular activity at a public school pursuant to subsection 3 if the board of trustees or the public school determines that the pupil has failed to comply with applicable statutes, or applicable rules and regulations of the board of trustees. If the board of trustees revokes its approval, neither the board of trustees nor the public school are liable for any damages relating to the denial of services to the pupil.
- 5. The programs of special education and related services required by subsection 2 may be offered at a public school or another location that is appropriate.
- 6. The Department may adopt such regulations as are necessary for the boards of trustees of school districts to provide the programs of special education and related services required by subsection 2.
- 7. As used in this section, "related services" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 U.S.C. § 1401(22).
 - **Sec. 10.** NRS 396.930 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 396.930 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 2 and 3, a student may apply to the Board of Regents for a millennium scholarship if he:



- (a) Has been a resident of this State for at least 2 years before he applies for the scholarship;
 - (b) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c), graduated from a public or private high school in this State:
 - (1) After May 1, 2000, but not later than May 1, 2003; or
 - (2) After May 1, 2003, and, except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c) of subsection 2, not more than 6 years before he applies for the scholarship;
 - (c) Does not satisfy the requirements of paragraph (b) and:
 - (1) Was enrolled as a pupil in a public or private high school in this State with a class of pupils who were regularly scheduled to graduate after May 1, 2000;
 - (2) Received his high school diploma within 4 years after he was regularly scheduled to graduate; and
 - (3) Applies for the scholarship not more than 6 years after he was regularly scheduled to graduate from high school;
 - (d) Maintained in high school in the courses designated by the Board of Regents pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2, at least:
 - (1) A 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he was a member of the graduating class of 2003 or 2004;
 - (2) A 3.1 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he was a member of the graduating class of 2005 or 2006; or
 - (3) A 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he was a member of the graduating class of 2007 or a later graduating class; and
 - (e) Is enrolled in at least:

- (1) Six semester credit hours in a community college within the System; or
- (2) Twelve semester credit hours in another eligible institution.
 - 2. The Board of Regents:
 - (a) Shall define the core curriculum that a student must complete in high school to be eligible for a millennium scholarship. Eligibility for a millennium scholarship must not be conditioned upon passage of the high school proficiency examination that is administered pursuant to NRS 389.015.
 - (b) Shall designate the courses in which a student must earn the minimum grade point averages set forth in paragraph (d) of subsection 1.
 - (c) May establish criteria with respect to students who have been on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States to exempt such student from the 6-year limitation on applications that is set forth in subparagraph (2) of paragraph (b) of subsection 1.
 - 3. Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c) of subsection 1, for students who did not graduate from a public or private high



school in this State and who have been residents of this State for at least 2 years, the Board of Regents shall establish:

- (a) The minimum score on a standardized test that such students must receive; or
 - (b) Other criteria that students must meet,
- → to be eligible for millennium scholarships.

- 4. In awarding scholarships, the Board of Regents shall enhance its outreach to students who:
 - (a) Are pursuing a career in education or health care;
- (b) Come from families who lack sufficient financial resources to pay for the costs of sending their children to an eligible institution; or
- (c) Substantially participated in an antismoking, antidrug or antialcohol program during high school.
- **Sec. 11.** Section 107 of chapter 1, Statutes of Nevada 2003, 19th Special Session, at page 89, is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - Sec. 107. The high school proficiency examination that measures the performance of pupils on the standards of content and performance in science must first be administered to pupils enrolled in grade 11 in the 2007-2008 school year, who must pass the examination before the completion of grade 12 to graduate with [a standard] an advanced high school diploma in the 2008-2009 school year.
- **Sec. 12.** On or before February 1, 2006, the State Board of Education shall prescribe, in accordance with section 4 of this act, alternative criteria for receipt of an advanced high school diploma, which must be effective for the 2006-2007 school year and thereafter.
- **Sec. 13.** Notwithstanding the provisions of NRS 389.015 to the contrary, if a pupil who is classified as a senior in high school during the 2004-2005 school year or the 2005-2006 school year fulfilled the requirements for a standard high school diploma except that he did not receive a passing score on the high school proficiency examination on the final administration of the examination in the applicable school year:
- 1. The school in which the pupil is enrolled shall allow the pupil to participate in the graduation ceremony of his high school in 2005 or 2006, as applicable; and
 - 2. The pupil must be awarded a standard high school diploma.
- → If such a pupil has been given a certificate of attendance before the effective date of this act, he must be awarded a standard high school diploma to replace the certificate of attendance.
- **Sec. 14.** 1. This section and section 13 of this act become effective upon passage and approval.
