
ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 48—ASSEMBLYMAN HOLCOMB

FEBRUARY 11, 2005

Referred to Concurrent Committees on Education
and Ways and Means

SUMMARY—Requires State Board for Occupational Education to prescribe program of career and technical education. (BDR 34-781)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.
Effect on the State: Contains Appropriation not included in Executive Budget.

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets ~~omitted material~~ is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; revising provisions governing the annual reports of accountability prepared by the State Board of Education and the board of trustees of each school district; changing the name of “occupational education” to “career and technical education”; requiring the State Board for Occupational Education to prescribe a program of career and technical education; requiring each school district to establish and maintain a program of career and technical education in accordance with the program prescribed by the State Board; authorizing charter schools to establish and maintain a program of career and technical education in accordance with the program prescribed by the State Board; making an appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel’s Digest:

- 1 Existing law establishes the requirements for occupational education in public
- 2 schools within the State. (NRS 388.380)
- 3 This bill redesignates occupational education as career and technical education.
- 4 This bill requires the Board to prescribe a program of career and technical
- 5 education for pupils enrolled in grades 9 through 12. This bill requires all school
- 6 districts to establish and maintain a program of career and technical education in
- 7 accordance with the Board’s program. A charter school is authorized, but not
- 8 required, to establish and maintain such a program. A school district may request a



9 waiver from the requirement to establish and maintain a program if the school
10 district demonstrates circumstances in the school district that prevent the district
11 from establishing and maintaining the program.

12 This bill appropriates \$12 million over the next 2 fiscal years to the Department
13 of Education for allocations to school districts and charter schools to provide a
14 program of career and technical education. A school district or charter school must
15 submit an application for an allocation. The amount of an allocation to a school
16 district or charter school whose application is approved must be based on the
17 estimated number of pupils who will participate in the program for that fiscal year
18 and the financial need of the school district or charter school.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** NRS 385.3469 is hereby amended to read as
2 follows:

3 385.3469 1. The State Board shall prepare an annual report
4 of accountability that includes, without limitation:

5 (a) Information on the achievement of all pupils based upon the
6 results of the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015
7 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without
8 limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a
9 whole.

10 (b) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, pupil
11 achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately
12 for the following subgroups of pupils:

13 (1) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined
14 by the State Board;

15 (2) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by
16 the State Board;

17 (3) Pupils with disabilities;

18 (4) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and

19 (5) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State
20 Board.

21 (c) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each subgroup
22 identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the
23 annual measurable objectives of the State Board.

24 (d) The percentage of all pupils who were not tested, reported
25 for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
26 school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

27 (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the percentage
28 of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and
29 reported separately for the subgroups identified in paragraph (b).

30 (f) The most recent 3-year trend in the achievement of pupils in
31 each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS
32 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including,



1 without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this
2 State as a whole, which may include information regarding the trend
3 in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such
4 information is available.

5 (g) Information on whether each school district has made
6 adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of
7 each school district, if any, designated as demonstrating need for
8 improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377 and the number of
9 consecutive years that the school district has carried that
10 designation.

11 (h) Information on whether each public school, including,
12 without limitation, each charter school, has made adequate yearly
13 progress, including, without limitation, the name of each public
14 school, if any, designated as demonstrating need for improvement
15 pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that
16 the school has carried that designation.

17 (i) Information on the results of pupils who participated in the
18 examinations of the National Assessment of Educational Progress
19 required pursuant to NRS 389.012.

20 (j) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each
21 grade level for all elementary schools, reported for each school
22 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
23 district, and for this State as a whole, and the average class size for
24 each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each
25 secondary school, reported for each school district and for this State
26 as a whole.

27 (k) For each school district, including, without limitation, each
28 charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole,
29 information on the professional qualifications of teachers employed
30 by the school districts and charter schools, including, without
31 limitation:

32 (1) The percentage of teachers who are:

33 (I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;

34 (II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the
35 requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in
36 which the teachers are employed; or

37 (III) Otherwise providing instruction without an
38 endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are
39 employed;

40 (2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,
41 as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by
42 highly qualified teachers; and

43 (3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,
44 as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by



1 highly qualified teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by
2 high-poverty compared to low-poverty schools, which for the
3 purposes of this subparagraph, means schools in the top quartile of
4 poverty and the bottom quartile of poverty in this State.

5 (l) The total expenditure per pupil for each school district in this
6 State, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
7 district. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed
8 to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual
9 schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in
10 complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not
11 available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial
12 analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

13 (m) The total statewide expenditure per pupil. If this State has a
14 financial analysis program that is designed to track educational
15 expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board
16 shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph.
17 If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the
18 Department's own financial analysis program in complying with
19 this paragraph.

20 (n) For all elementary schools, junior high schools and middle
21 schools, the rate of attendance, reported for each school district,
22 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
23 for this State as a whole.

24 (o) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grades 9
25 to 12, inclusive, reported for each school district, including, without
26 limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a
27 whole, excluding pupils who:

28 (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful
29 completion of the examinations of general educational development.

30 (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the
31 Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard
32 diploma.

33 (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.

34 (p) The attendance of teachers who provide instruction, reported
35 for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
36 school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

37 (q) Incidents involving weapons or violence, reported for each
38 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
39 the district, and for this State as a whole.

40 (r) Incidents involving the use or possession of alcoholic
41 beverages or controlled substances, reported for each school district,
42 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
43 for this State as a whole.

44 (s) The suspension and expulsion of pupils required or
45 authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467, reported for each



1 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
2 the district, and for this State as a whole.

3 (t) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary
4 problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, reported for each school
5 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
6 district, and for this State as a whole.

7 (u) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the
8 same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, reported for each
9 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
10 the district, and for this State as a whole.

11 (v) The transiency rate of pupils, reported for each school
12 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
13 district, and for this State as a whole. For the purposes of this
14 paragraph, a pupil is not a transient if he is transferred to a different
15 school within the school district as a result of a change in the zone
16 of attendance by the board of trustees of the school district pursuant
17 to NRS 388.040.

18 (w) Each source of funding for this State to be used for the
19 system of public education.

20 (x) The amount and sources of money received by this State for
21 remedial education.

22 (y) The percentage of pupils who graduated from a high school
23 or charter school in the immediately preceding year and enrolled in
24 remedial courses in reading, writing or mathematics at a university
25 or community college within the University and Community
26 College System of Nevada, reported for each school district,
27 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
28 for this State as a whole.

29 (z) The technological facilities and equipment available for
30 educational purposes, reported for each school district, including,
31 without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this
32 State as a whole.

33 (aa) For each school district, including, without limitation, each
34 charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the
35 number and percentage of pupils who received:

36 (1) A standard high school diploma.

37 (2) *A Career and Technical Education Advanced Diploma.*

38 (3) An adjusted diploma.

39 ~~(3)~~ (4) A certificate of attendance.

40 (bb) The number and percentage of pupils who did not receive a
41 high school diploma because the pupils failed to pass the high
42 school proficiency examination, reported for each school district,
43 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
44 for this State as a whole.



(cc) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or local law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(dd) Information on the paraprofessionals employed at public schools in this State, including, without limitation, the charter schools in this State. The information must include:

(1) The number of paraprofessionals employed, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole; and

(2) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in programs supported with Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in programs supported with Title I money.

(ee) An identification of appropriations made by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.

2. A separate reporting for a subgroup of pupils must not be made pursuant to this section if the number of pupils in that subgroup is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual pupil. The State Board shall prescribe a mechanism for determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a subgroup for that subgroup to yield statistically reliable information.

3. The annual report of accountability must:

(a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(1) and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto;

(b) Be prepared in a concise manner; and

(c) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can understand.

4. On or before September 1 of each year, the State Board shall provide for public dissemination of the annual report of accountability and submit a copy of the report to the:

(a) Governor;

(b) Committee;



- (c) Bureau;
- (d) Board of Regents of the University of Nevada;
- (e) Board of trustees of each school district; and
- (f) Governing body of each charter school.

5. As used in this section:

(a) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(23).

(b) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 391.008.

Sec. 2. NRS 385.347 is hereby amended to read as follows:

385.347 1. The board of trustees of each school district in this State, in cooperation with associations recognized by the State Board as representing licensed personnel in education in the district, shall adopt a program providing for the accountability of the school district to the residents of the district and to the State Board for the quality of the schools and the educational achievement of the pupils in the district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in charter schools in the school district. The board of trustees of a school district shall report the information required by subsection 2 for each charter school within the school district, regardless of the sponsor of the charter school.

2. The board of trustees of each school district shall, on or before August 15 of each year, prepare an annual report of accountability concerning:

(a) The educational goals and objectives of the school district.

(b) Pupil achievement for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The board of trustees of the district shall base its report on the results of the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550 and shall compare the results of those examinations for the current school year with those of previous school years. The report must include, for each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and each grade in which the examinations were administered:

(1) The number of pupils who took the examinations;

(2) An explanation of instances in which a school was exempt from administering or a pupil was exempt from taking an examination;

(3) A record of attendance for the period in which the examinations were administered, including an explanation of any difference in the number of pupils who took the examinations and the number of pupils who are enrolled in the school;

(4) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, pupil achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the following subgroups of pupils:



(I) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined by the State Board;

(II) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by the State Board;

(III) Pupils with disabilities;

(IV) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and

(V) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State Board;

(5) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each subgroup identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the annual measurable objectives of the State Board;

(6) The percentage of pupils who were not tested;

(7) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, the percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the subgroups identified in subparagraph (4);

(8) The most recent 3-year trend in pupil achievement in each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, which may include information regarding the trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such information is available;

(9) Information that compares the results of pupils in the school district, including, without limitation, pupils enrolled in charter schools in the district, with the results of pupils throughout this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison; and

(10) For each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, information that compares the results of pupils in the school with the results of pupils throughout the school district and throughout this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.

➤ A separate reporting for a subgroup of pupils must not be made pursuant to this paragraph if the number of pupils in that subgroup is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual pupil. The State Board shall prescribe the mechanism for determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a subgroup for that subgroup to yield statistically reliable information.

(c) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each grade level for each elementary school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and the average class size for each core academic subject, as



1 set forth in NRS 389.018, for each secondary school in the district
2 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each
3 charter school in the district.

4 (d) Information on the professional qualifications of teachers
5 employed by each school in the district and the district as a whole,
6 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The
7 information must include, without limitation:

8 (1) The percentage of teachers who are:

9 (I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;

10 (II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the
11 requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in
12 which the teachers are employed; or

13 (III) Otherwise providing instruction without an
14 endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are
15 employed;

16 (2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,
17 as set forth in NRS 389.018, that are not taught by highly qualified
18 teachers; and

19 (3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects,
20 as set forth in NRS 389.018, that are not taught by highly qualified
21 teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by high-poverty

23 subparagraph, means schools in the top quartile of poverty and the
24 bottom quartile of poverty in this State.

25 (e) The total expenditure per pupil for each school in the district
26 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each
27 charter school in the district. If this State has a financial analysis
28 program that is designed to track educational expenditures and
29 revenues to individual schools, each school district shall use that
30 statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide
31 program is not available, each school district shall use its own
32 financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

33 (f) The curriculum used by the school district, including:

34 (1) Any special programs for pupils at an individual school;
35 and

36 (2) The curriculum used by each charter school in the
37 district.

38 (g) Records of the attendance and truancy of pupils in all grades,
39 including, without limitation:

40 (1) The average daily attendance of pupils, for each school in
41 the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation,
42 each charter school in the district.

43 (2) For each elementary school, middle school and junior
44 high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter
45 school in the district that provides instruction to pupils enrolled in a



1 grade level other than high school, information that compares the
2 attendance of the pupils enrolled in the school with the attendance of
3 pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The
4 information required by this subparagraph must be provided in
5 consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the
6 comparison.

7 (h) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grades 9
8 to 12, inclusive, for each such grade, for each school in the district
9 and for the district as a whole, excluding pupils who:

10 (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful
11 completion of the examinations of general educational development.

12 (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the
13 Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard
14 diploma.

15 (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.

16 (i) Records of attendance of teachers who provide instruction,
17 for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including,
18 without limitation, each charter school in the district.

19 (j) Efforts made by the school district and by each school in the
20 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
21 district, to increase:

22 (1) Communication with the parents of pupils in the district;
23 and

24 (2) The participation of parents in the educational process
25 and activities relating to the school district and each school,
26 including, without limitation, the existence of parent organizations
27 and school advisory committees.

28 (k) Records of incidents involving weapons or violence for each
29 school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter
30 school in the district.

31 (l) Records of incidents involving the use or possession of
32 alcoholic beverages or controlled substances for each school in the
33 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
34 district.

35 (m) Records of the suspension and expulsion of pupils required
36 or authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467.

37 (n) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary
38 problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, for each school in the district
39 and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each
40 charter school in the district.

41 (o) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the
42 same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, for each school in
43 the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation,
44 each charter school in the district.



(p) The transiency rate of pupils for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. For the purposes of this paragraph, a pupil is not transient if he is transferred to a different school within the school district as a result of a change in the zone of attendance by the board of trustees of the school district pursuant to NRS 388.040.

(q) Each source of funding for the school district.

(r) The amount and sources of money received for remedial education for each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.

(s) For each high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the percentage of pupils who graduated from that high school or charter school in the immediately preceding year and enrolled in remedial courses in reading, writing or mathematics at a university or community college within the University and Community College System of Nevada.

(t) The technological facilities and equipment available at each school, including, without limitation, each charter school, and the district's plan to incorporate educational technology at each school.

(u) For each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the number and percentage of pupils who received:

(1) A standard high school diploma.

(2) *A Career and Technical Education Advanced Diploma.*

(3) An adjusted diploma.

~~(3)~~ (4) A certificate of attendance.

(v) For each school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the number and percentage of pupils who did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils failed to pass the high school proficiency examination.

(w) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, for each school in the district and for the district as a whole.

(x) The amount and sources of money received for the training and professional development of teachers and other educational personnel for each school in the district and for the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.



(y) Whether the school district has made adequate yearly progress. If the school district has been designated as demonstrating need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377, the report must include a statement indicating the number of consecutive years the school district has carried that designation.

(z) Information on whether each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, has made adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation:

(1) The number and percentage of schools in the district, if any, that have been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623; and

(2) The name of each school, if any, in the district that has been designated as needing improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.

(aa) Information on the paraprofessionals employed by each public school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. The information must include:

(1) The number of paraprofessionals employed at the school; and

(2) The number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in positions supported with Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in positions supported with Title I money.

(bb) For each high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school that operates as a high school, information that provides a comparison of the rate of graduation of pupils enrolled in the high school with the rate of graduation of pupils throughout the district and throughout this State. The information required by this paragraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.

(cc) An identification of the appropriations made by the Legislature that are available to the school district or the schools within the district and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.

(dd) Such other information as is directed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

3. The records of attendance maintained by a school for purposes of paragraph (i) of subsection 2 must include the number of teachers who are in attendance at school and the number of teachers who are absent from school. A teacher shall be deemed in attendance if the teacher is excused from being present in the



1 classroom by the school in which he is employed for one of the
2 following reasons:

3 (a) Acquisition of knowledge or skills relating to the
4 professional development of the teacher; or

5 (b) Assignment of the teacher to perform duties for cocurricular
6 or extracurricular activities of pupils.

7 4. The annual report of accountability prepared pursuant to
8 subsection 2 must:

9 (a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(2) and the regulations
10 adopted pursuant thereto; and

11 (b) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and to
12 the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can
13 understand.

14 5. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall:

15 (a) Prescribe forms for the reports required pursuant to
16 subsection 2 and provide the forms to the respective school districts.

17 (b) Provide statistical information and technical assistance to the
18 school districts to ensure that the reports provide comparable
19 information with respect to each school in each district and among
20 the districts throughout this State.

21 (c) Consult with a representative of the:

22 (1) Nevada State Education Association;

23 (2) Nevada Association of School Boards;

24 (3) Nevada Association of School Administrators;

25 (4) Nevada Parent Teacher Association;

26 (5) Budget Division of the Department of Administration;

27 and

28 (6) Legislative Counsel Bureau,

29 ➡ concerning the program and consider any advice or
30 recommendations submitted by the representatives with respect to
31 the program.

32 6. The Superintendent of Public Instruction may consult with
33 representatives of parent groups other than the Nevada Parent
34 Teacher Association concerning the program and consider any
35 advice or recommendations submitted by the representatives with
36 respect to the program.

37 7. On or before ~~April 1~~ **August 15** of each year, the board of
38 trustees of each school district shall submit to:

39 (a) Each advisory board to review school attendance created in
40 the county pursuant to NRS 392.126 the information required in
41 paragraph (g) of subsection 2.

42 (b) The Commission on Educational Technology created by
43 NRS 388.790 the information prepared by the board of trustees
44 pursuant to paragraph (t) of subsection 2.



8. On or before August 15 of each year, the board of trustees of each school district shall:

(a) Submit the report required pursuant to subsection 2 to the:

- (1) Governor;
- (2) State Board;
- (3) Department;
- (4) Committee; and
- (5) Bureau.

(b) Provide for public dissemination of the annual report of accountability prepared pursuant to subsection 2 in the manner set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(2)(E) to the schools in the school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, the residents of the district, and the parents and guardians of pupils enrolled in schools in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.

9. As used in this section:

(a) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20 U.S.C. § 7801(23).

(b) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 391.008.

Sec. 3. NRS 387.050 is hereby amended to read as follows:

387.050 1. The State of Nevada accepts the provisions of, and all of the money provided by, the Vocational Education Act of 1963, and any amendments thereof or supplements thereto.

2. In addition to the provisions of subsection 1, the State Board for Occupational Education may accept, and adopt regulations or establish policies for the disbursement of, money appropriated by any Act of Congress and apportioned to the State of Nevada for use in connection with the program for ~~occupational~~ **career and technical** education.

3. In accepting the benefits of the Acts of Congress referred to in subsections 1 and 2, the State of Nevada agrees to comply with all of their provisions and to observe all of their requirements.

4. The State Treasurer is designated custodian of all money received by the State of Nevada from the appropriations made by the Acts of Congress referred to in subsections 1 and 2, and he may receive and provide for the proper custody thereof and make disbursements therefrom in the manner provided in the acts and for the purposes therein specified on warrants of the State Controller issued upon the order of the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education.

5. On warrants of the State Controller issued upon the order of the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education pursuant to regulations or policies of the Board, the State Treasurer

3 **Sec. 4.** Chapter 388 of NRS is hereby amended by adding

(d) Satisfy any other criteria prescribed by the State Board for Occupational Education.

Sec. 5. NRS 388.340 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.340 1. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall serve as Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education.

2. The Executive Officer shall:

(a) Employ personnel for such positions as are approved by the State Board for Occupational Education and necessary to carry out properly the provisions of this title relating to ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education.

(b) Carry into effect the regulations of the State Board for Occupational Education.

(c) Maintain an office for the Board.

(d) Keep all records of the Board in the office of the Board.

Sec. 6. NRS 388.360 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.360 The State Board for Occupational Education may:

1. Cooperate with any federal agency, board or department designated to administer the Acts of Congress apportioning federal money to the State of Nevada for ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education.

2. Establish policies and adopt regulations for the administration of any legislation enacted pursuant thereto by the State of Nevada.

3. Establish policies and adopt regulations for the administration of money provided by the Federal Government and the State of Nevada for the promotion, extension and improvement of ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education in Nevada.

4. Establish policies or regulations and formulate plans for the promotion of ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education in such subjects as are an essential and integral part of the system of public education in the State of Nevada.

5. Establish policies to provide for the preparation of teachers of such programs and subjects.

6. Approve positions for such persons as may be necessary to administer the federal act and provisions of this title enacted pursuant thereto for the State of Nevada.

7. Direct its Executive Officer to make studies and investigations relating to ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education.

8. Establish policies to promote and aid in the establishment by local communities of schools, departments or classes giving training in ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* subjects.

9. Cooperate with local communities in the maintenance of such schools, departments or classes.



10. Prescribe qualifications for the teachers, directors and supervisors of ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* subjects.

11. Provide for the certification of such teachers, directors and supervisors.

12. Establish policies or regulations to cooperate in the maintenance of classes supported and controlled by the public for the preparation of the teachers, directors and supervisors of ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* subjects, or maintain such classes under its own direction and control.

13. Establish by regulation the qualifications required for persons engaged in the training of ~~occupational teachers.~~ *teachers for career and technical education.*

Sec. 7. NRS 388.365 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.365 1. All gifts of money which the State Board for Occupational Education is authorized to accept must be deposited in a permanent trust fund in the State Treasury designated as the Gift Fund for ~~Occupational~~ *Career and Technical* Education.

2. The money available in the Fund must be used only for the purpose specified by the donor, within the scope of the Board's powers and duties. The Board may adopt regulations or establish policies for the disbursement of money from the Fund in accordance with the terms of the gift or bequest on warrants of the State Controller issued upon the orders of the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education. Any expenditures pursuant to this section may include matching state and federal money available for ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education.

3. If all or part of the money accepted by the Board from a donor is not expended before the end of the fiscal year in which the gift was accepted, the remaining balance of the amount donated must remain in the Fund until needed for the purpose specified by the donor.

Sec. 8. NRS 388.380 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.380 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the board of trustees of ~~a~~ *each* school district ~~in a county whose population is 100,000 or more shall and any other board of trustees of a school district may;~~ *shall:*

(a) Establish and maintain ~~occupational schools or classes giving~~ *, in accordance with the program prescribed pursuant to section 4 of this act, a program of career and technical education that offers* instruction in the subjects approved by the State Board for Occupational Education.

(b) Raise and expend money for the establishment and maintenance of ~~occupational schools or classes.~~ *career and technical education.*



2. *The board of trustees of a school district may submit to the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education a request for a waiver from the requirements of subsection 1. The Executive Officer shall grant a waiver if the board of trustees of the school district demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Executive Officer that a waiver is warranted based upon the circumstances in that school district which prohibit the district from carrying out the requirements of subsection 1.*

3. A charter school may:

(a) *Establish and maintain, in accordance with the program prescribed pursuant to section 4 of this act, a program of career and technical education that offers instruction in the subjects approved by the State Board for Occupational Education.*

(b) *Raise and expend money for the establishment and maintenance of career and technical education.*

4. The board of trustees of each school district shall incorporate into the curriculum:

(a) ~~{Occupational guidance}~~ *Guidance* and counseling *in career and technical education* in accordance with NRS 389.180; and

(b) Technology.

Sec. 9. NRS 388.390 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.390 If the board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a charter school organizes a ~~{school or classes for occupational}~~ *program of career and technical* education in accordance with the ~~{regulations adopted}~~ *program prescribed* by the State Board for Occupational Education *pursuant to section 4 of this act* and the ~~{school or classes have}~~ *program has* been approved by the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education, the school district or the charter school is entitled to share in federal and state money available for the promotion of ~~{occupational}~~ *career and technical* education in the amount determined by the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education, in accordance with the regulations and policies of the Board.

Sec. 10. NRS 388.400 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.400 1. The money for ~~{occupational}~~ *career and technical* education must be provided for and raised in the manner specified in NRS 387.050 and 388.330 to 388.400, inclusive ~~{H}~~ , *and section 4 of this act.*

2. The State Treasurer is the custodian of the money and shall make disbursements therefrom on warrants of the State Controller issued upon the order of the Executive Officer of the State Board for Occupational Education.



Sec. 11. NRS 388.537 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.537 1. The board of trustees of a school district may, subject to the approval of the State Board, operate an alternative program for the education of pupils at risk of dropping out of high school, including pupils who:

(a) Because of extenuating circumstances, such as their being pregnant, parents, chronically ill or self-supporting, are not able to attend the classes of instruction regularly provided in high school;

(b) Are deficient in the amount of academic credit necessary to graduate with pupils their same age;

(c) Are chronically absent from high school; or

(d) Require instruction on a more personal basis than that regularly provided in high school.

2. An alternative program may include:

(a) A shorter school day, and an opportunity for pupils to attend a longer school day, than that regularly provided in high school.

(c) A comprehensive curriculum that includes elective classes of instruction and ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education.

(d) An opportunity for pupils to obtain academic credit through experience gained at work or while engaged in other activities.

(e) An opportunity for pupils to satisfy either:

(1) The requirements for a regular high school diploma; or

(2) The requirements for a high school diploma for adults.

(f) The provision of child care for the children of pupils.

(g) The transportation of pupils to and from classes of instruction.

(h) The temporary placement of pupils for independent study, if there are extenuating circumstances which prevent those pupils from attending the alternative program on a daily basis.

3. The board of trustees of a school district may operate an alternative program pursuant to this section through a program of distance education pursuant to NRS 388.820 to 388.874, inclusive.

Sec. 12. NRS 388.575 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.575 1. The Department of Education, after consulting with the Department of Corrections, shall:

(a) Adopt regulations that establish a statewide program of education for incarcerated persons; and

(b) Coordinate with and assist school districts in operating programs of education for incarcerated persons.

2. The statewide program may include courses of study for:

(a) A high school diploma;

(b) Basic literacy;

(c) English as a second language;



- (d) General educational development;
- (e) Life skills;
- (f) ~~Occupational~~ *Career and technical* education; and
- (g) Postsecondary education.

3. The statewide program does not include the programs of general education, vocational education and training established by the Board of State Prison Commissioners pursuant to NRS 209.389.

4. The statewide program must establish:

(a) Standards for each course of study that set forth the:

- (1) Curriculum;
- (2) Qualifications for entry; and
- (3) Evaluation of incarcerated persons for placement; and

(b) Procedures to ensure that an incarcerated person who earns credits in a program of education for incarcerated persons operated by a school district at a facility or institution shall, if transferred to a different facility or institution, transfer those credits to the program operated by a school district at that facility or institution.

5. As used in this section, "general educational development" means preparation for and administration of the standardized examinations that enable persons who have not graduated from high school to demonstrate that they have achieved an educational level which denotes competency in core curriculum. The term includes programs for obtaining a general educational development certificate.

Sec. 13. NRS 388.635 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.635 Each center shall provide:

1. Counseling services specifically designed for the counseling of a displaced homemaker with respect to appropriate employment, including:

2. The Department shall review the pamphlet on an annual basis and make such revisions to the pamphlet as it considers necessary to ensure that pupils and their parents or legal guardians fully understand the examination.

3. On or before September 1, the Department shall provide a copy of the pamphlet or revised pamphlet to the board of trustees of each school district and the governing body of each charter school that includes pupils enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school grade level.

4. The board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each junior high, middle school or high school within the school district for posting. The governing body of each charter school shall ensure that a copy of the pamphlet is posted at the charter school. Each principal of a junior high, middle school, high school or charter school shall ensure that the teachers, counselors and administrators employed at the school fully understand the contents of the pamphlet.

5. On or before January 15, the:

(a) Board of trustees of each school district shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in a junior high, middle school or high school of the school district and to the parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.

(b) Governing body of each charter school shall provide a copy of the pamphlet to each pupil who is enrolled in the charter school at a junior high, middle school or high school grade level and to the parents or legal guardians of such a pupil.

Sec. 15. NRS 392.455 is hereby amended to read as follows:

392.455 1. If a school district or a charter school has established classes in ~~occupational~~ *career and technical* education, the teachers and pupils in those classes must wear devices provided by the school district or the charter school which are designed to protect their eyes while they are using power tools, torches or other dangerous equipment or machinery.

2. The teachers and pupils in classes in science must wear devices provided by the school district which are designed to protect their eyes when chemicals or toxic substances are used in those classes.

Sec. 16. 1. There is hereby appropriated from the State General Fund to the Department of Education the following sums
