A.B. No. 139—Requires collection and reporting of certain information concerning employers of applicants for Medicaid or Children’s Health Insurance Program.

**If this amendment is adopted, the Legislative
Counsel's Digest will be changed to read as follows:**

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law requires the Department of Human Resources to administer all state public welfare programs, including Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. (NRS 422.270)

This bill requires each applicant for Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program to disclose the name and business address of his employer in the application for assistance. If the applicant is the dependent of another person, he must disclose the name and business address of the employer of each person who claims the applicant as a dependent.

This bill requires the Department of Human Resources to prepare biennial reports for submission to the Governor and to the Legislature. The reports must include: (1) a listing of the 25 employers that were identified in the applications for assistance as employing the greatest number of employees who received assistance for themselves or for their dependents; and (2) the cost to the State of providing such assistance. The reports must be made available for public inspection, but must not include identifying information related to any particular applicant for or recipient of assistance.
