AN ACT relating to traffic laws; authorizing a peace officer to issue a traffic citation that is prepared electronically; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel’s Digest:**

- 1 Existing law allows peace officers, under most circumstances, to issue citations  
2 that are prepared manually or electronically. (NRS 171.1773, 171.1774, 171.17785,  
3 484.799) However, peace officers issuing traffic citations may only prepare such  
4 citations manually. (NRS 484.807)  
5 This bill allows peace officers to issue traffic citations that are prepared  
6 electronically as well as manually.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 **Section 1.** NRS 484.807 is hereby amended to read as follows:  
2 484.807 1. It is unlawful for ~~any~~ *a* person to violate his  
3 written promise to appear given to a peace officer upon the issuance  
4 of a traffic citation prepared manually ~~or~~ *or electronically*,  
5 regardless of the disposition of the charge for which the citation was  
6 originally issued.  
7 2. A person may comply with a written promise to appear in  
8 court by an appearance by counsel.



1        3. A warrant may issue upon a violation of a written promise to  
2 appear.
