

SENATE BILL NO. 365—SENATOR NOLAN

MARCH 25, 2005

Referred to Committee on Transportation and Homeland Security

SUMMARY—Establishes and encourages use of certain systems and programs relating to public safety.
(BDR 40-286)

AN ACT relating to public safety; requiring the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security to establish a statewide mapping system for the public buildings in this State to the extent money is available for a system; encouraging retail establishments doing business in this State to adopt the “Code Adam” program; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 **Section 1.** 1. To the extent money is made available, the
- 2 Commission shall, after consultation with the State Public Works
- 3 Board, establish a statewide mapping system for the public
- 4 buildings in this State for use by response agencies that are called to
- 5 respond to an act of terrorism or related emergency.
- 6 2. The statewide mapping system must include, without
- 7 limitation:
 - 8 (a) The type of information that must be included within the
 - 9 software program that comprises the system, including, without
 - 10 limitation, floor plans, fire protection information, building
 - 11 evacuation plans, utility information, known hazards and
 - 12 information on how to contact emergency personnel;



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1 (b) The manner by which the information prescribed pursuant to
2 paragraph (a) must be transferred to the system from the state
3 agencies and the political subdivisions that participate in the system;

4 (c) Standards for the software that must be used by the state
5 agencies and political subdivisions that participate in the system;

6 (d) Conditions for use of the system by response agencies;

7 (e) Guidelines for:

8 (1) The accessibility and confidentiality of information
9 contained within the system; and

10 (2) The incorporation, in connection with the use of the
11 system, of the items described in paragraph (b) of subsection 3;

12 (f) In accordance with information obtained by the Commission,
13 determine the priority for distribution of any money that may be
14 available for the state agencies and political subdivisions to
15 participate in the system; and

16 (g) Guidelines recommended by the Commission for the training
17 of persons employed by response agencies concerning the use of the
18 system.

19 3. To the extent money is made available, the state agencies
20 and political subdivisions shall:

21 (a) Participate in the statewide mapping system; and

22 (b) Incorporate into their use of the system, without limitation:

23 (1) Evacuation routes and strategies for evacuation;

24 (2) Alarms and other signals or means of notification;

25 (3) Plans for sheltering in place; and

26 (4) Training and strategies for prevention in connection with
27 attacks involving violence.

28 → If a state agency or a political subdivision uses its own building
29 mapping system before the Commission establishes a statewide
30 mapping system, the state agency or political subdivision may
31 continue to use its system unless money is made available for the
32 state agency or political subdivision to update or modify its system
33 as necessary for inclusion in the statewide system.

34 4. The Commission:

35 (a) Shall pursue any money that may be available from the
36 Federal Government for the development and operation of a
37 statewide mapping system for public buildings and for the
38 distribution of grants to the state agencies and political subdivisions
39 that participate in the system.

40 (b) May accept gifts, grants and contributions for the
41 development and operation of a statewide mapping system and for
42 the distribution of grants to the state agencies and political
43 subdivisions that participate in the system.

44 5. Each state agency and political subdivision that participates
45 in the system shall, on or before July 1, 2006, and on or before



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1 July 1 of each year thereafter, submit to the Commission a progress
2 report setting forth, in accordance with regulations adopted by the
3 Commission, the experience of the agency or political subdivision,
4 as applicable, with respect to its participation in the system. The
5 Commission shall receive and process such progress reports and
6 provide to the Legislative Commission a summarized overview of
7 the system on or before October 1, 2006, and on or before October 1
8 of each year thereafter.

9 6. After the statewide mapping system is established pursuant
10 to this section, each state agency and political subdivision that
11 participates in the system shall submit to the Commission any initial
12 or final plan for a public work.

13 7. As used in this section:

14 (a) "Act of terrorism" has the meaning ascribed to it in
15 NRS 239C.030.

16 (b) "Commission" means the Nevada Commission on Homeland
17 Security created by NRS 239C.120.

18 (c) "Political subdivision" has the meaning ascribed to it in
19 NRS 239C.070.

20 (d) "Response agency" has the meaning ascribed to it in
21 NRS 239C.080.

22 (e) "Sheltering in place" means to remain inside a building,
23 room, structure or other location during an emergency when egress
24 may be impossible or when egress may present a more substantial
25 risk than remaining inside the building, room, structure or other
26 location, as applicable.

27 **Sec. 2.** The Legislature hereby encourages retail
28 establishments doing business in this State to adopt and carry out
29 the "Code Adam" program as soon as practicable after July 1, 2005.
30 The "Code Adam" program, which was created in 1994 and is
31 currently used in more than 45,000 establishments throughout the
32 United States, is an important tool that promotes the safety of
33 children because:

34 1. A swift and effective response is critical to ensure the safe
35 recovery of a child who is abducted;

36 2. The program prescribes training for employees of retail
37 establishments that is designed to prevent the abduction of children
38 and to respond efficiently in situations of suspected child abductions
39 from those establishments;

40 3. The United States Department of Justice reports that almost
41 2,200 children are reported missing every day and the program helps
42 to improve the chances of a safe recovery of these children;

43 4. Since its implementation, the program has proven successful
44 in thwarting attempted abductions; and



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1 5. A retail establishment that has undertaken the commitment
2 to carry out the program provides its patrons with a sense of security
3 while shopping at that establishment.

4 **Sec. 3.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2005, and expires
5 by limitation on October 1, 2009.

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
