

SENATE BILL NO. 46—SENATOR MCGINNESS

FEBRUARY 10, 2005

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Referred to Committee on Finance

**SUMMARY**—Increases maximum assumed monthly wage of volunteer firefighters for purpose of contributions to Public Employees’ Retirement System. (BDR 23-822)

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AN ACT relating to the Public Employees’ Retirement System; increasing the maximum assumed monthly wage of a volunteer firefighter for the purpose of determining the contribution to be paid into the Public Employees’ Retirement Fund and the Public Employees’ Retirement Administrative Fund; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel’s Digest:**

1 Existing law authorizes fire department volunteers to become members of the  
2 Public Employees’ Retirement System. The local government that recognizes the  
3 volunteers is the public employer for this purpose and is required to collect and pay  
4 the employee’s share and is required to pay the employer’s share of the contribution  
5 to the Public Employees’ Retirement Fund and the Public Employees’ Retirement  
6 Administrative Fund. In determining the amount of contributions to be paid,  
7 volunteers are assumed to receive a wage of not less than \$150 nor more than \$750  
8 per month. (NRS 286.367)

9 This bill increases the maximum assumed wage to \$2,000 per month.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1       **Section 1.** NRS 286.367 is hereby amended to read as follows:  
2        286.367 1. The volunteers of a regularly organized and  
3        recognized fire department may, by the joint application of a  
4        majority of those volunteers addressed to the Board, become  
5        members of the System. A volunteer firefighter who joins a fire  
6        department of which all the volunteers have become members of the  
7        System becomes a member of the System. The volunteers of a  
8        participating fire department may withdraw from the System by the  
9        joint application of a majority of those volunteers addressed to the  
10      Board.

11       2. The city, town, county or district which recognizes the  
12      volunteers is the public employer and shall collect and pay over the  
13      employee's share and pay the employer's share of the contribution  
14      to the Public Employees' Retirement Fund and the Public  
15      Employees' Retirement Administrative Fund, in the manner  
16      prescribed in this chapter. The local government may, if so  
17      requested by the volunteers, further contribute any amount by which  
18      the sum receivable by each volunteer for any month is less than the  
19      amount of his required share of the contribution, but no further  
20      contributions may be placed in a volunteer's account with the  
21      System or refunded to a volunteer or his employer upon the  
22      volunteer's termination.

23       3. In determining the amount of contributions to be paid for the  
24      volunteers, they are assumed to be receiving a wage established by  
25      the local government which is not less than \$150 nor more than  
26      ~~\$750~~ \$2,000 per month.

27       4. Except as otherwise required as a result of NRS 286.535 or  
28      286.537, the average compensation for a volunteer firefighter is the  
29      weighted average of:

30           (a) The assumed wage as a volunteer firefighter; and  
31           (b) The average salary in other covered employment which, if  
32      the service in that employment exceeds 3 years, is calculated upon  
33      the 3 highest consecutive years.

34       → The weight given to the assumed wage and average salary,  
35      respectively, is proportionate to the length of service in each  
36      capacity. Except as otherwise required as a result of NRS 286.535 or  
37      286.537, average compensation is computed from the sum of the  
38      assumed wage and actual salary if a member is employed  
39      simultaneously as a volunteer firefighter and as a regular member.

40       5. Any dispute over the status of a person as a volunteer  
41      firefighter under this section must be conclusively determined by the  
42      Board.

1       6. A volunteer firefighter may purchase all previous service as  
2 a volunteer firefighter with any volunteer fire department which is a  
3 member of the System. To validate such service, the volunteer  
4 firefighter must pay the full cost as determined by the actuary. The  
5 employing agency may pay the employer's share of the cost but is  
6 not required to do so.

7       7. In addition to the purchase authorized pursuant to the  
8 provisions of subsection 6, a volunteer firefighter who has 5 years *of*  
9 creditable service as a volunteer firefighter may purchase up to 5  
10 years of service to add to his volunteer service. The member must  
11 pay the full actuarial cost of the service as determined by an actuary  
12 of the System.

13     **Sec. 2.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2005.
