

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 17—COMMITTEE ON  
LEGISLATIVE OPERATIONS AND ELECTIONS

APRIL 11, 2005

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Referred to Committee on Legislative Operations and Elections

**SUMMARY**—Requires Legislative Committee on Health Care to conduct interim study of policies related to pain management. (BDR R-255)

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EXPLANATION – Matter in ***bolded italics*** is new; matter between brackets **[omitted material]** is material to be omitted.

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SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION—Requiring the Legislative Committee on Health Care to conduct an interim study of policies related to pain management.

1 WHEREAS, Pain suffered as the result of a chronic illness poses a  
2 major health problem in the United States and can trigger emotions  
3 of fear, anxiety, sadness, confusion, depression and helplessness;  
4 and

5 WHEREAS, Unmanaged pain can interfere with a person's ability  
6 to complete daily activities and diminishes the physical and  
7 psychological well-being of a person and the ability of a person to  
8 interact appropriately with others; and

9 WHEREAS, It is estimated that more than one-half of people who  
10 are diagnosed with chronic illness experience uncontrolled pain  
11 during their illness; and

12 WHEREAS, It is estimated that chronic pain among employees  
13 causes businesses and industries in the United States to lose  
14 approximately \$90 billion annually from the use of sick time,  
15 reduced productivity and direct medical and other benefit costs; and

16 WHEREAS, Misunderstandings concerning certain  
17 pharmaceuticals such as opiates, a class of federally controlled  
18 substances, contribute to the dilemma in appropriately addressing  
19 pain management; and

20 WHEREAS, There is a compelling need to study pain  
21 management policies in this State to ensure that patients have access  
22 to necessary and appropriate treatment for their pain; and

1        WHEREAS, Educating patients, caregivers and the medical  
2 community about effective methods of managing pain is essential to  
3 improving pain management policies and reducing barriers to  
4 effective pain management; and

5        WHEREAS, Such education must support prevention of the abuse  
6 of controlled substances and consider the interests of law  
7 enforcement and the health care and patient advocate communities;  
8 now, therefore, be it

9        RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, THE  
10 ASSEMBLY CONCURRING, That the Legislative Committee on  
11 Health Care is hereby directed to conduct an interim study of pain  
12 management policies in the State of Nevada; and be it further

13        RESOLVED, That a subcommittee must be appointed for the  
14 study consisting of one Legislator appointed by the Majority Leader  
15 of the Senate, one Legislator appointed by the Minority Leader of  
16 the Senate, one Legislator appointed by the Speaker of the  
17 Assembly and one Legislator appointed by the Minority Leader of  
18 the Assembly, all of whom must have served on the Senate Standing  
19 Committee on Human Resources and Facilities or the Assembly  
20 Committee on Health and Human Services during the 2005  
21 Legislative Session; and be it further

22        RESOLVED, That the Legislative Committee on Health Care  
23 shall appoint one person who is a consumer health care advocate,  
24 one person who is a representative of the law enforcement, and one  
25 representative each from the Board of Medical Examiners, the State  
26 Board of Nursing and the State Board of Pharmacy to serve on the  
27 subcommittee as nonvoting members; and be it further

28        RESOLVED, That the Legislative Committee on Health Care  
29 shall appoint a Chairman of the subcommittee from among the  
30 members of the subcommittee; and be it further

31        RESOLVED, That the study must include, without limitation:

32            1. An analysis of available information relating to access to  
33 pain management in the State of Nevada;

34            2. An evaluation of the current pain management policies in  
35 this State that may create barriers to access to pain management by  
36 patients;

37            3. The identification of existing resources in this State that may  
38 be available for use in programs relating to pain management;

39            4. The identification of programs and practices relating to pain  
40 management that have been established in the State of Nevada and  
41 in other states which could be implemented in Nevada;

42            5. Recommendations for programs to increase public  
43 awareness regarding pain management and pharmaceuticals  
44 available for pain management;



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1       6. Recommendations for specific programs directed at access  
2 to pain management and the elimination of barriers to pain  
3 management;

4       7. Recommendations for policies and practices which increase  
5 access to quality care, including coverage for pain medication, and  
6 which ensure that all people have access to appropriate pain  
7 management regardless of race, ethnicity, age, gender, employment  
8 status, the presence of preexisting conditions or the ability to pay;  
9 and

10      8. Any other proposal for legislation relating to pain  
11 management that the Committee may receive or develop; and be it  
12 further

13      RESOLVED, That any recommended legislation proposed by the  
14 subcommittee must be approved by a majority of the members of  
15 the Senate and a majority of the members of the Assembly  
16 appointed to the subcommittee; and be it further

17      RESOLVED, That the Legislative Committee on Health Care  
18 shall submit a report of the results of the study and any  
19 recommendations for legislation to the 74th Session of the Nevada  
20 Legislature.

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
