SUMMARY—Designates the month of May of each year as Archeological Awareness and Historic Preservation Month in Nevada. (BDR 19-213)

AN ACT relating to periods of observance; designating the month of May of each year as Archeological Awareness and Historic Preservation Month in this State; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel’s Digest:

- 1 Under existing law, various days and weeks of observance are recognized in
- 2 this State. (NRS 236.018-236.065) This bill designates the month of May of each
- 3 year as Archeological Awareness and Historic Preservation Month in this State and
- 4 requires the Governor to issue annually a proclamation encouraging the observance
- 5 of Archeological Awareness and Historic Preservation Month.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 **Section 1.** Chapter 236 of NRS is hereby amended by adding
- 2 thereto a new section to read as follows:
- 3 ***1. The month of May of each year is designated as***
- 4 ***Archeological Awareness and Historic Preservation Month in this***
- 5 ***State.***

1 2. The Governor shall issue annually a proclamation
2 encouraging the observance of Archeological Awareness and
3 Historic Preservation Month. The proclamation may, without
4 limitation:

5 (a) Call upon state and local officers, private nonprofit groups
6 and foundations, schools, businesses and other public and private
7 entities to work toward the goal of preserving the irreplaceable
8 historic, archeological and cultural resources of this State;

9 (b) Recognize the important contributions of many cultures to
10 the history of this State; and

11 (c) Recognize the importance of specific historic, archeological
12 and cultural sites in this State, including, without limitation:

13 (1) Tule Springs in southern Nevada as an area well known
14 in the scientific community as one of the best Pleistocene
15 paleontologic sites in the western United States and in which the
16 fossil remains of several extinct animals have been found,
17 including ground sloths, mammoths, prehistoric horses and
18 American camels; and

19 (2) Other specific historic, archeological and cultural sites
20 located throughout this State in both urban and rural areas,
21 regardless of whether those sites are listed in the National Register
22 of Historic Places.

23 Sec. 2. This act becomes effective upon passage and approval.
