**SUMMARY**—Revises provisions governing the Governor Quinn Millennium Scholarship Program. (BDR 34-1097)

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AN ACT relating to education; revising provisions governing the Governor Quinn Millennium Scholarship Program; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

1 Existing law creates the Governor Quinn Millennium Scholarship Program and  
2 prescribes the eligibility requirements for the Millennium Scholarship, including a  
3 requirement that a student must have graduated from a public or private high school  
4 in this State not more than 6 years before he applies for the Millennium  
5 Scholarship. Existing law also authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of  
6 Nevada to establish criteria with respect to certain students who have been on  
7 active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States to exempt such  
8 students from the 6-year limitation on applications for the Millennium Scholarship.  
9 (NRS 396.926, 396.930) This bill requires the Board of Regents to establish criteria  
10 with respect to students who actively served or participated in a charitable, religious  
11 or public service assignment or mission to exempt such students from the 6-year  
12 limitation on applications for the Millennium Scholarship.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1      **Section 1.** NRS 396.930 is hereby amended to read as follows:  
2            396.930    1. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 2 and  
3        3, a student may apply to the Board of Regents for a Millennium  
4        Scholarship if he:  
5            (a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (e) of subsection  
6        2, has been a resident of this State for at least 2 years before he  
7        applies for the Millennium Scholarship;



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1       (b) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c), graduated  
2 from a public or private high school in this State:

3           (1) After May 1, 2000, but not later than May 1, 2003; or

4           (2) After May 1, 2003, and, except as otherwise provided in  
5 ~~paragraph (e)~~ **paragraphs (c), (d) and (f)** of subsection 2, not more  
6 than 6 years before he applies for the Millennium Scholarship;

7           (c) Does not satisfy the requirements of paragraph (b) and:

8           (1) Was enrolled as a pupil in a public or private high school  
9 in this State with a class of pupils who were regularly scheduled to  
10 graduate after May 1, 2000;

11           (2) Received his high school diploma within 4 years after he  
12 was regularly scheduled to graduate; and

13           (3) Applies for the Millennium Scholarship not more than 6  
14 years after he was regularly scheduled to graduate from high school;

15           (d) Maintained in high school in the courses designated by the  
16 Board of Regents pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2, at least:

17           (1) A 3.00 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he  
18 was a member of the graduating class of 2003 or 2004;

19           (2) A 3.10 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he  
20 was a member of the graduating class of 2005 or 2006; or

21           (3) A 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 grading scale, if he  
22 was a member of the graduating class of 2007 or a later graduating  
23 class; and

24           (e) Is enrolled in at least:

25           (1) Six semester credit hours in a community college within  
26 the System; or

27           (2) Twelve semester credit hours in another eligible  
28 institution.

29       2. The Board of Regents:

30           (a) Shall define the core curriculum that a student must complete  
31 in high school to be eligible for a Millennium Scholarship.

32           (b) Shall designate the courses in which a student must earn the  
33 minimum grade point averages set forth in paragraph (d) of  
34 subsection 1.

35           (c) May establish criteria with respect to students who have been  
36 on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States to  
37 exempt such students from the 6-year limitation on applications that  
38 is set forth in subparagraph (2) of paragraph (b) of subsection 1.

39           (d) Shall establish criteria with respect to students who have a  
40 documented physical or mental disability or who were previously  
41 subject to an individualized education program under the  
42 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. §§ 1400 et  
43 seq., or a plan under Title V of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29  
44 U.S.C. §§ 791 et seq. The criteria must provide an exemption for  
45 those students from:



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1                   (1) The 6-year limitation on applications that is set forth in  
2 subparagraph (2) of paragraph (b) of subsection 1 and subparagraph  
3 (3) of paragraph (c) of subsection 1 and any limitation applicable to  
4 students who are eligible pursuant to subparagraph (1) of paragraph  
5 (b) of subsection 1.

6                   (2) The minimum number of credits prescribed in paragraph  
7 (e) of subsection 1.

8                   (e) Shall establish criteria with respect to students who have a  
9 parent or legal guardian on active duty in the Armed Forces of  
10 the United States to exempt such students from the residency  
11 requirement set forth in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 or  
12 subsection 3.

13                   (f) *Shall establish criteria with respect to students who have  
14 been actively serving or participating in a charitable, religious or  
15 public service assignment or mission to exempt such students from  
16 the 6-year limitation on applications that is set forth in  
17 subparagraph (2) of paragraph (b) of subsection 1.*

18                   3. Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c) of subsection  
19 1, for students who did not graduate from a public or private high  
20 school in this State and who, except as otherwise provided in  
21 paragraph (e) of subsection 2, have been residents of this State for at  
22 least 2 years, the Board of Regents shall establish:

23                   (a) The minimum score on a standardized test that such students  
24 must receive; or

25                   (b) Other criteria that students must meet,  
26 ➔ to be eligible for Millennium Scholarships.

27                   4. In awarding Millennium Scholarships, the Board of Regents  
28 shall enhance its outreach to students who:

29                   (a) Are pursuing a career in education or health care;

30                   (b) Come from families who lack sufficient financial resources  
31 to pay for the costs of sending their children to an eligible  
32 institution; or

33                   (c) Substantially participated in an antismoking, antidrug or  
34 antialcohol program during high school.

35                   5. The Board of Regents shall establish a procedure by which  
36 an applicant for a Millennium Scholarship is required to execute an  
37 affidavit declaring his eligibility for a Millennium Scholarship  
38 pursuant to the requirements of this section. The affidavit must  
39 include a declaration that the applicant is a citizen of the United  
40 States or has lawful immigration status, or that the applicant has  
41 filed an application to legalize his immigration status or will file an  
42 application to legalize his immigration status as soon as he is  
43 eligible to do so.



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1       **Sec. 2.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2009.

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
