MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Seventy-Fifth Session May 30, 2009

Chair Arberry adjourned the meeting of May 29, 2009. The Chair indicated that the Committee would hear testimony regarding <u>S.B. 418 (R1)</u>.

Senate Bill 418 (1st Reprint): Reduces the period for bringing an action to enforce certain provisions relating to unclaimed property. (BDR S-1302)

John Sande, III, representing International Game Technology (IGT), stated that <u>S.B. 418 (R1)</u> was fairly easy to understand. The bill would reduce the statute of limitations for unclaimed property from ten years to seven years. Mr. Sande stated that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) had a three-year statute of



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limitations in place regarding audits. He believed that the bill would make it easier for businesses, because the businesses would know how long records must be maintained.

Cecilia Colling, Chief of Staff, State Treasurer's Office, stated that the Treasurer's Office was in agreement with the provisions of the bill. She said the Treasurer's Office believed it could function appropriately under the provisions, understanding that there was a caveat that in the event a person did not file a report, the statute would allow the Treasurer's Office to go beyond the seven-year limitation.

Chair Arberry asked whether there was further information to come before the Committee regarding <u>S.B. 418 (R1)</u>, and there being none, the Chair closed the hearing.

Chair Arberry asked Assemblywoman McClain to address S.B. 143 (R1).

Senate Bill 143 (1st Reprint): Creates the Legislative Committee for Federal Stimulus Oversight to oversee the use of money allocated to the State from the Federal Government to stimulate the economy. (BDR S-1034)

Assemblywoman McClain explained that the bill would not be processed, and the Interim Finance Committee (IFC) would appoint a subcommittee to provide oversight for the federal stimulus funding.

With no further business to come before the Committee, Chair Arberry declared the Committee in recess at 10:21 a.m.
