Public Comment

Speakers must clearly spell their name and state their affiliation at the commencement of testimony.

Items on the agenda may be taken out of order at the discretion of the Chair.

During public comment, the Chair may limit testimony because of time considerations. Also, speakers are urged to avoid repetition of comments made by previous speakers.

During the meeting, the Committee may introduce bills and resolutions as well as discuss or take action on measures previously considered by the Committee.

All amendments must be submitted in writing at least 24 hours in advance and must include: (1) the name and contact information of the sponsor of the amendment; (2) a concise explanation of the intent of the amendment; and (3) suggested revised language.

The Committee's ability to videoconference and accommodate Power Point presentations is limited. Requests must be made at least 72 hours in advance and will be considered subject to availability.

Cellular telephones and laptop computers must be turned off or set to silent mode while in the committee room.
