

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 136—COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

(ON BEHALF OF THE ADVISORY COMMISSION

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing credits for offenders sentenced for certain crimes. (BDR 16-634)

AN ACT relating to offenders; revising provisions governing credits for offenders sentenced for certain crimes; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 Existing law provides that certain credits to the sentence of an offender
2 convicted of certain category C, D or E felonies must be deducted from the
3 minimum term imposed by the sentence until the offender becomes eligible for
4 parole and from the maximum term imposed by the sentence. (NRS 209.4465) This
5 bill provides that an offender convicted of certain category B felonies also qualifies
6 to have certain credits deducted from the minimum term imposed by the sentence
7 until the offender becomes eligible for parole and from the maximum term imposed
8 by the sentence.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** NRS 209.4465 is hereby amended to read as
2 follows:

3 209.4465 1. An offender who is sentenced to prison for a
4 crime committed on or after July 17, 1997, who has no serious
5 infraction of the regulations of the Department, the terms and
6 conditions of his or her residential confinement or the laws of the
7 State recorded against the offender, and who performs in a faithful,



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1 orderly and peaceable manner the duties assigned to the offender,
2 must be allowed:

3 (a) For the period the offender is actually incarcerated pursuant
4 to his or her sentence;

5 (b) For the period the offender is in residential confinement; and
6 (c) For the period the offender is in the custody of the Division
7 of Parole and Probation of the Department of Public Safety pursuant
8 to NRS 209.4886 or 209.4888,

9 → a deduction of 20 days from his or her sentence for each month
10 the offender serves.

11 2. In addition to the credits allowed pursuant to subsection 1,
12 the Director may allow not more than 10 days of credit each month
13 for an offender whose diligence in labor and study merits such
14 credits. In addition to the credits allowed pursuant to this subsection,
15 an offender is entitled to the following credits for educational
16 achievement:

17 (a) For earning a general educational development certificate, 60
18 days.

19 (b) For earning a high school diploma, 90 days.

20 (c) For earning his or her first associate degree, 120 days.

21 3. The Director may, in his or her discretion, authorize an
22 offender to receive a maximum of 90 days of credit for each
23 additional degree of higher education earned by the offender.

24 4. The Director may allow not more than 10 days of credit each
25 month for an offender who participates in a diligent and responsible
26 manner in a center for the purpose of making restitution, program
27 for reentry of offenders and parolees into the community,
28 conservation camp, program of work release or another program
29 conducted outside of the prison. An offender who earns credit
30 pursuant to this subsection is eligible to earn the entire 30 days of
31 credit each month that is allowed pursuant to subsections 1 and 2.

32 5. The Director may allow not more than 90 days of credit each
33 year for an offender who engages in exceptional meritorious service.

34 6. The Board shall adopt regulations governing the award,
35 forfeiture and restoration of credits pursuant to this section.

36 7. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 8, credits earned
37 pursuant to this section:

38 (a) Must be deducted from the maximum term imposed by the
39 sentence; and

40 (b) Apply to eligibility for parole unless the offender was
41 sentenced pursuant to a statute which specifies a minimum sentence
42 that must be served before a person becomes eligible for parole.

43 8. Credits earned pursuant to this section by an offender who
44 has not been convicted of:



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1 (a) Any crime that is punishable as a felony involving the use or
2 threatened use of force or violence against the victim;
3 (b) A sexual offense that is punishable as a felony;
4 (c) A violation of NRS 484C.110, 484C.120, 484C.130 or
5 484C.430 that is punishable as a felony; or
6 (d) A category A ~~or B~~ felony,
7 → apply to eligibility for parole and must be deducted from the
8 minimum term imposed by the sentence until the offender becomes
9 eligible for parole and must be deducted from the maximum term
10 imposed by the sentence.

11 **Sec. 2.** For the purpose of calculating the credits earned by an
12 offender pursuant to NRS 209.4465, the amendatory provisions of
13 section 1 of this act must be applied:

14 1. Retroactively to October 1, 2004, to reduce the minimum
15 term of imprisonment of an offender described in subsection 8 of
16 NRS 209.4465, as amended by section 1 of this act, who was placed
17 in the custody of the Department of Corrections before October 1,
18 2011, and who remains in such custody on October 1, 2011.

19 2. Retroactively to October 1, 2010, to reduce the maximum
20 term of imprisonment of an offender who was placed on parole
21 before October 1, 2011.

22 3. In the manner set forth in NRS 209.4465 for all offenders in
23 the custody of the Department of Corrections commencing on
24 October 1, 2011, and for all offenders who are on parole
25 commencing on October 1, 2011.
