

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 98—ASSEMBLYMAN SEGERBLOM

PREFILED JANUARY 26, 2011

SUMMARY—Enacts the Uniform Emergency Volunteer Health Practitioners Act. (BDR 36-56)

AN ACT relating to emergencies; enacting the Uniform Emergency Volunteer Health Practitioners Act, which allows a participating state to establish a system whereby medical and veterinary service providers from other states may register to provide volunteer medical and veterinary services in that state in the event of an emergency; allowing a participating state to determine how various licensing, liability and certain other state laws will apply to registered medical and veterinary service providers who provide such volunteer services in a state in which they are not licensed to practice; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

1 Under existing law, the Division of Emergency Management of the Department  
2 of Public Safety is required to implement a program for emergency management in  
3 this State to be used during an emergency. (NRS 414.040) This bill enacts the  
4 Uniform Emergency Volunteer Health Practitioners Act, and **section 22** of this bill  
5 authorizes the Division to designate a registration system whereby health care  
6 practitioners from other states may register to provide volunteer health care and  
7 veterinary services in this State in certain emergency situations. **Section 21** of this  
8 bill authorizes the Division to limit, restrict and regulate the activities of such  
9 registered volunteers during such an emergency. **Section 23** of this bill provides  
10 that such registered volunteers may only provide volunteer health care or veterinary  
11 services if they are licensed and in good standing in their home state. **Section 25** of  
12 this bill limits the practice in this State by such a registered volunteer to only those  
13 services within the volunteer's scope of practice, unless specifically authorized to  
14 practice outside that scope by the Division. **Section 25** also authorizes licensing  
15 boards or other disciplinary authorities in this State to impose administrative  
16 sanctions upon such registered volunteers for certain conduct, to report such



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sanctions to the state in which the volunteer is licensed and to impose administrative sanctions upon a health practitioner licensed in this State for certain conduct in another state if the practitioner was volunteering in that state under this Uniform Act. **Section 27** of this bill authorizes the Division to adopt regulations to carry out this Uniform Act.

Existing law sets forth that health care providers licensed in this State who render emergency care or assistance in certain emergencies are not liable for civil damages for any act or omission unless that act or omission rises to the level of gross negligence. (NRS 41.504, 41.505) Under existing law, certain volunteers who work with a state or local public organization are considered, for the purposes of eligibility for benefits under industrial insurance, to be employees of that organization at a wage of \$100 per month. (NRS 616A.130) **Section 28** of this bill limits the liability of registered volunteer health practitioners volunteering in this State to only those acts or omissions in the provision of health care or veterinary services that rise to the level of gross negligence. **Section 29** of this bill makes such registered volunteers eligible, in certain circumstances, for the same industrial insurance benefits as other volunteers in this State, and for the same occupational disease benefits as employees of this State.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Title 36 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new chapter to consist of the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act.

**Sec. 2.** *Sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act may be cited as the Uniform Emergency Volunteer Health Practitioners Act.*

**Sec. 3.** *As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in sections 4 to 19, inclusive, of this act have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.*

**Sec. 4.** *“Disaster relief organization” means an entity which provides emergency or disaster relief services that include health or veterinary services provided by volunteer health practitioners and which:*

*1. Is designated or recognized as a provider of those services pursuant to a disaster response and recovery plan adopted by an agency of the Federal Government, the Governor or the Division; or*

*2. Regularly plans and conducts its activities in coordination with an agency of the Federal Government or the Division.*

**Sec. 5.** *“Division” means the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety.*

**Sec. 6.** *“Emergency” means an event or condition that is proclaimed an emergency or disaster pursuant to NRS 414.070.*



1     **Sec. 7.** *“Emergency declaration” means a declaration of*  
2 *emergency issued by a person or entity authorized to do so*  
3 *pursuant to the laws of this State.*

4     **Sec. 8.** *“Emergency Management Assistance Compact”*  
5 *means the interstate compact approved by Congress by Public Law*  
6 *104-321, 110 Stat. 3877, and codified as NRS 415.010.*

7     **Sec. 9.** *“Entity” means a person other than an individual.*

8     **Sec. 10.** *“Health facility” means an entity licensed under the*  
9 *laws of this or another state to provide health or veterinary*  
10 *services.*

11     **Sec. 11.** *“Health practitioner” means an individual licensed*  
12 *under the laws of this or another state to provide health or*  
13 *veterinary services.*

14     **Sec. 12.** *“Health services” means treatment, care, advice or*  
15 *guidance, or other services or supplies, related to the health or*  
16 *death of individuals or human populations, to the extent necessary*  
17 *to respond to an emergency, including, without limitation:*

18     1. *The following, concerning the physical or mental condition*  
19 *or functional status of an individual or affecting the structure or*  
20 *function of the body:*

21     (a) *Preventive, diagnostic, therapeutic, rehabilitative,*  
22 *maintenance or palliative care; and*

23     (b) *Counseling, assessment, procedures or other services;*

24     2. *The sale or dispensing of a drug, a device, equipment or*  
25 *another item to an individual in accordance with a prescription;*  
26 *and*

27     3. *Funeral, cremation, cemetery or other mortuary services.*

28     **Sec. 13.** *“Host entity” means an entity operating in this State*  
29 *which uses volunteer health practitioners to respond to an*  
30 *emergency.*

31     **Sec. 14.** *“License” means authorization by a state to engage*  
32 *in the provision of health or veterinary services that would be*  
33 *unlawful to provide without the authorization. The term includes*  
34 *authorization under the laws of this State for an individual to*  
35 *provide health or veterinary services based upon a national*  
36 *certification issued by a public or private entity.*

37     **Sec. 15.** *“Person” means an individual, corporation,*  
38 *business trust, trust, partnership, limited-liability company,*  
39 *association, joint venture, public corporation, government or*  
40 *governmental subdivision, agency, instrumentality or any other*  
41 *legal or commercial entity.*

42     **Sec. 16.** *“Scope of practice” means the extent of the*  
43 *authorization to provide health or veterinary services granted to a*  
44 *health practitioner by a license issued to the practitioner in the*  
45 *state in which the principal part of the practitioner’s services are*



1 rendered, including, without limitation, any conditions imposed by  
2 the relevant licensing authority.

3 **Sec. 17.** “State” means a state of the United States, the  
4 District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin  
5 Islands or any territory or insular possession subject to the  
6 jurisdiction of the United States.

7 **Sec. 18.** “Veterinary services” means treatment, care, advice  
8 or guidance, or other services or supplies, related to the health or  
9 death of an animal or animal populations, to the extent necessary  
10 to respond to an emergency, including, without limitation:

11 1. Diagnosis, treatment or prevention of an animal’s disease,  
12 injury or other physical or mental condition by the prescription,  
13 administration or dispensing of vaccine, medicine, surgery or  
14 therapy;

15 2. Use of a procedure for reproductive management; and

16 3. Monitoring and treatment of animal populations for  
17 diseases that have spread or demonstrate the potential to spread to  
18 humans.

19 **Sec. 19.** “Volunteer health practitioner” means a health  
20 practitioner who provides health or veterinary services, whether or  
21 not the practitioner receives compensation for those services. The  
22 term does not include a practitioner who receives compensation  
23 pursuant to a preexisting employment relationship with a host  
24 entity or affiliate which requires the practitioner to provide health  
25 services in this State, unless the practitioner is not a resident of  
26 this State and is employed by a disaster relief organization  
27 providing services in this State while an emergency declaration is  
28 in effect.

29 **Sec. 20.** Sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act apply to  
30 volunteer health practitioners who are registered with a  
31 registration system that complies with section 22 of this act and  
32 who provide health or veterinary services in this State for a host  
33 entity while an emergency declaration is in effect.

34 **Sec. 21.** 1. While an emergency declaration is in effect, the  
35 Division may by order limit, restrict or otherwise regulate:

36 (a) The duration of practice by volunteer health practitioners;

37 (b) The geographical areas in which volunteer health  
38 practitioners may practice;

39 (c) The types of volunteer health practitioners who may  
40 practice; and

41 (d) Any other matters necessary to coordinate effectively the  
42 provision of health or veterinary services during the emergency.

43 2. An order issued pursuant to subsection 1 may take effect  
44 immediately, without prior notice or comment, and is not a  
45 regulation for the purposes of chapter 233B of NRS.



1       3. A host entity that uses volunteer health practitioners to  
2 provide health or veterinary services in this State shall:

3       (a) Consult with and coordinate its activities with the Division  
4 to the extent practicable to provide for the efficient and effective  
5 use of those volunteer health practitioners; and

6       (b) Comply with any laws other than sections 2 to 30,  
7 inclusive, of this act relating to the management of emergency  
8 health or veterinary services, including, without limitation, the  
9 provisions of chapter 414 of NRS.

10      **Sec. 22.** 1. To qualify as a registration system for volunteer  
11 health practitioners, a system must:

12       (a) Accept applications for the registration of volunteer health  
13 practitioners before or during an emergency;

14       (b) Include information about the licensure and standing of  
15 health practitioners which is accessible by authorized persons;

16       (c) Be capable of confirming the accuracy of information  
17 concerning whether a health practitioner is licensed and in good  
18 standing before the practitioner provides health services or  
19 veterinary services pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this  
20 act; and

21       (d) Meet one of the following conditions:

22       (1) Be an emergency system for advance registration of  
23 volunteer health care practitioners established by a state and  
24 funded through the United States Department of Health and  
25 Human Services under Section 319I of the Public Health Service  
26 Act, 42 U.S.C. § 247d-7b, as amended;

27       (2) Be a local unit consisting of trained and equipped  
28 emergency response, public health and medical personnel formed  
29 pursuant to Section 2801 of the Public Health Service Act, 42  
30 U.S.C. § 300hh, as amended;

31       (3) Be operated by a:

32           (I) Disaster relief organization;

33           (II) Licensing board;

34           (III) National or regional association of licensing  
35 boards or health practitioners;

36           (IV) Health facility that provides comprehensive  
37 inpatient and outpatient health care services, including, without  
38 limitation, a hospital; or

39           (V) Governmental entity; or

40       (4) Be designated by the Division as a registration system  
41 for the purposes of sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act.

42       2. While an emergency declaration is in effect, the Division, a  
43 person authorized to act on behalf of the Division or a host entity  
44 may confirm whether volunteer health practitioners utilized in this  
45 State are registered with a registration system that complies with



1 *subsection 1. Confirmation is limited to obtaining identities of the*  
2 *practitioners from the system and determining whether the system*  
3 *indicates that the practitioners are licensed and in good standing.*

4 3. Upon the request of a person or entity in this State  
5 authorized to do so pursuant to subsection 2, or a similarly  
6 authorized person or entity in another state, a registration system  
7 located in this State must notify the person or entity of the  
8 identities of volunteer health practitioners and whether the  
9 practitioners are licensed and in good standing.

10 4. A host entity is not required to use the services of a  
11 volunteer health practitioner even if the practitioner is registered  
12 with a registration system which indicates that the practitioner is  
13 licensed and in good standing.

14 **Sec. 23.** 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
15 while an emergency declaration is in effect, a volunteer health  
16 practitioner who is registered with a registration system that  
17 complies with section 22 of this act and who is licensed and in  
18 good standing in the state upon which the practitioner's  
19 registration is based may practice in this State to the extent  
20 authorized by sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act, as though the  
21 practitioner were licensed in this State.

22 2. A volunteer health practitioner qualified under subsection  
23 1 is not entitled to the protections of sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of  
24 this act if the practitioner is licensed in more than one state and  
25 any license of the practitioner is suspended, revoked or subject to  
26 an agency order limiting or restricting practice privileges, or has  
27 been voluntarily terminated under threat of sanction.

28 **Sec. 24.** 1. Sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act do not  
29 affect credentialing or privileging standards of a health facility  
30 and do not preclude a health facility from waiving or modifying  
31 those standards while an emergency declaration is in effect.

32 2. As used in this section:

33 (a) "Credentialing" means obtaining, verifying and assessing  
34 the qualifications of a health practitioner to provide treatment,  
35 care or services in or for a health facility.

36 (b) "Privileging" means the authorizing by an appropriate  
37 authority, such as a governing body, of a health practitioner to  
38 provide specific treatment, care or services at a health facility  
39 subject to limits based on factors that include, without limitation,  
40 the practitioner's license, education, training, experience,  
41 competence, health status and specialized skill.

42 **Sec. 25.** 1. Subject to subsections 2 and 3, a volunteer  
43 health practitioner shall adhere to the scope of practice for a  
44 similarly licensed practitioner established by the licensing  
45 provisions, practice acts or other laws of this State.



2. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act do not authorize a volunteer health practitioner to provide services that are outside the practitioner's scope of practice, even if a similarly licensed practitioner in this State would be allowed to provide the services.

3. The Division may modify or restrict the health or veterinary services that volunteer health practitioners may provide pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act. An order under this subsection may take effect immediately, without prior notice or comment, and is not a regulation for the purposes of chapter 233B of NRS.

4. A host entity may restrict the health or veterinary services that a volunteer health practitioner is allowed to provide pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act.

5. A volunteer health practitioner does not engage in unauthorized practice unless the practitioner has reason to know of any limitation, modification or restriction under this section or that a similarly licensed practitioner in this State would not be allowed to provide the services. A volunteer health practitioner has reason to know of a limitation, modification or restriction or that a similarly licensed practitioner in this State would not be allowed to provide a service if:

(a) The practitioner actually knows that the limitation, modification or restriction exists or that a similarly licensed practitioner in this State would not be allowed to provide the service; or

(b) From all the facts and circumstances known to the practitioner at the relevant time, a reasonable person would conclude that the limitation, modification or restriction exists or that a similarly licensed practitioner in this State would not be allowed to provide the service.

6. In addition to the authority granted by the laws of this State other than sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act to regulate the conduct of health practitioners, a licensing board or other disciplinary authority in this State:

(a) May impose administrative sanctions upon a health practitioner licensed in this State for conduct outside of this State in response to an out-of-state emergency;

(b) May impose administrative sanctions upon a practitioner not licensed in this State for conduct in this State in response to an in-state emergency; and

(c) Shall report any administrative sanctions imposed upon a practitioner licensed in another state to the appropriate licensing board or other disciplinary authority in any other state in which the practitioner is known to be licensed.





7. *In determining whether to impose administrative sanctions pursuant to subsection 6, a licensing board or other disciplinary authority shall consider the circumstances in which the conduct took place, including, without limitation, any exigent circumstances and the practitioner's scope of practice, education, training, experience and specialized skill.*

**Sec. 26.** *1. Sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act do not limit any rights, privileges or immunities provided to volunteer health practitioners by laws other than sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act do not affect requirements for the use of health practitioners pursuant to the Emergency Management Assistance Compact.*

*2. The Division, pursuant to the Emergency Management Assistance Compact, may incorporate into the emergency personnel of this State volunteer health practitioners who are not officers or employees of this State, a political subdivision of this State or a municipality or other local government within this State.*

**Sec. 27.** *The Division may adopt regulations to carry out sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act. In doing so, the Division shall consult with the Governor and consider any pertinent rules or regulations promulgated by similarly empowered agencies in other states to promote uniformity in the application of sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act and make the emergency response systems in the various states reasonably compatible.*

**Sec. 28.** *1. Subject to subsection 3, a volunteer health practitioner who provides health or veterinary services pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act is not liable for damages for an act or omission of the practitioner in providing those services.*

*2. No person is vicariously liable for damages for an act or omission of a volunteer health practitioner if the practitioner is not liable for the damages under subsection 1.*

*3. This section does not limit the liability of a volunteer health practitioner for:*

*(a) Willful misconduct or wanton, grossly negligent, reckless or criminal conduct;*

*(b) An intentional tort;*

*(c) Breach of contract;*

*(d) A claim asserted by a host entity or by an entity located in this or another state which employs or uses the services of the practitioner; or*

*(e) An act or omission relating to the operation of a motor vehicle, vessel, aircraft or other vehicle.*

*4. A person who, pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act, operates, uses or relies upon information provided by a*





1 *volunteer health practitioner registration system is not liable for*  
2 *damages for an act or omission relating to that operation, use or*  
3 *reliance unless the act or omission constitutes an intentional tort,*  
4 *willful misconduct, or wanton, grossly negligent, reckless or*  
5 *criminal conduct.*

6 *5. In addition to the protections set forth in subsection 1, a*  
7 *volunteer health practitioner who provides health or veterinary*  
8 *services pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act is*  
9 *entitled to all the rights, privileges or immunities provided by the*  
10 *laws of this State.*

11 **Sec. 29.** *1. A volunteer health practitioner who dies or is*  
12 *injured as a result of providing health or veterinary services*  
13 *pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act is deemed to be*  
14 *an employee as defined in NRS 616A.130 for the purposes of*  
15 *receiving benefits for the death or injury pursuant to chapters*  
16 *616A to 616D, inclusive, of NRS if:*

17 *(a) The practitioner is not otherwise eligible for such benefits*  
18 *for the injury or death under the laws of this or another state; and*

19 *(b) The practitioner or, in the case of death, the practitioner's*  
20 *personal representative, elects coverage under chapters 616A to*  
21 *616D, inclusive, of NRS by making a claim pursuant to those*  
22 *chapters.*

23 *2. A volunteer health practitioner who dies or is injured as*  
24 *the result of an occupational disease arising from the provision of*  
25 *health or veterinary services pursuant to sections 2 to 30,*  
26 *inclusive, of this act is deemed to be an employee, as defined in*  
27 *NRS 617.070, for the purposes of receiving benefits for the death*  
28 *or injury under chapter 617 of NRS if:*

29 *(a) The practitioner is not otherwise eligible for such benefits*  
30 *for the injury or death under the laws of this or another state; and*

31 *(b) The practitioner or, in the case of death, the practitioner's*  
32 *personal representative, elects coverage under chapter 617 of NRS*  
33 *by making a claim pursuant to that chapter.*

34 *3. The Division of Industrial Relations of the Department of*  
35 *Business and Industry may adopt regulations, enter into*  
36 *agreements with other states, or take other measures to facilitate*  
37 *the receipt of benefits for injury or death under chapters 616A to*  
38 *617, inclusive, of NRS by volunteer health practitioners who*  
39 *reside in other states and may waive or modify requirements for*  
40 *filing, processing and paying claims that unreasonably burden the*  
41 *practitioners. To promote uniformity in the application of sections*  
42 *2 to 30, inclusive, of this act with other states that enact similar*  
43 *legislation, the Division of Industrial Relations shall consult with,*  
44 *and consider the practices for filing, processing and paying claims*  
45 *by, agencies having similar authority in other states.*



1     **4. As used in this section, "injury" means a physical or**  
2     **mental injury or disease for which an employee of this State who**  
3     **is injured or contracts the disease in the course of the employee's**  
4     **employment would be entitled to benefits under chapters 616A to**  
5     **617, inclusive, of NRS.**

6     **Sec. 30. In applying and construing this Uniform Act,**  
7     **consideration must be given to the need to promote uniformity of**  
8     **the law with respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.**

9     **Sec. 31.** NRS 414.040 is hereby amended to read as follows:

10    414.040 1. A Division of Emergency Management is hereby  
11    created within the Department of Public Safety. The Chief of  
12    the Division is appointed by and holds office at the pleasure of the  
13    Director of the Department of Public Safety. The Division is the  
14    State Agency for Emergency Management and the State Agency for  
15    Civil Defense for the purposes of the Compact ratified by the  
16    Legislature pursuant to NRS 415.010. The Chief is the State's  
17    Director of Emergency Management and the State's Director of  
18    Civil Defense for the purposes of that Compact.

19    2. The Chief may employ technical, clerical, stenographic and  
20    other personnel as may be required, and may make such  
21    expenditures therefor and for other expenses of his or her office  
22    within the appropriation therefor, or from other money made  
23    available to him or her for purposes of emergency management, as  
24    may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

25    3. The Chief, subject to the direction and control of the  
26    Director, shall carry out the program for emergency management in  
27    this state. The Chief shall coordinate the activities of all  
28    organizations for emergency management within the State, maintain  
29    liaison with and cooperate with agencies and organizations of other  
30    states and of the Federal Government for emergency management  
31    and carry out such additional duties as may be prescribed by the  
32    Director.

33    4. The Chief shall assist in the development of comprehensive,  
34    coordinated plans for emergency management by adopting an  
35    integrated process, using the partnership of governmental entities,  
36    business and industry, volunteer organizations and other interested  
37    persons, for the mitigation of, preparation for, response to and  
38    recovery from emergencies or disasters. In adopting this process, the  
39    Chief shall conduct activities designed to:

40    (a) Eliminate or reduce the probability that an emergency will  
41    occur or to reduce the effects of unavoidable disasters;

42    (b) Prepare state and local governmental agencies, private  
43    organizations and other persons to be capable of responding  
44    appropriately if an emergency or disaster occurs by fostering the  
45    adoption of plans for emergency operations, conducting exercises to



1 test those plans, training necessary personnel and acquiring  
2 necessary resources;

3 (c) Test periodically plans for emergency operations to ensure  
4 that the activities of state and local governmental agencies, private  
5 organizations and other persons are coordinated;

6 (d) Provide assistance to victims, prevent further injury or  
7 damage to persons or property and increase the effectiveness of  
8 recovery operations; and

9 (e) Restore the operation of vital community life-support  
10 systems and return persons and property affected by an emergency  
11 or disaster to a condition that is comparable to or better than what  
12 existed before the emergency or disaster occurred.

13 5. *The Division shall perform the duties required pursuant to*  
14 *sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act.*

15 6. The Division shall perform the duties required pursuant to  
16 NRS 353.2753 at the request of a state agency or local government.

17 **Sec. 32.** NRS 616A.130 is hereby amended to read as follows:

18 616A.130 Persons who perform volunteer work in any formal  
19 program which is being conducted:

- 20 1. Within a state or local public organization;  
21 2. By a federally assisted organization; ~~for~~  
22 3. *Pursuant to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act; or*  
23 4. By a private, incorporated, nonprofit organization which  
24 provides services to the general community,  
25 ➤ and who are not specifically covered by any other provisions of  
26 chapters 616A to 616D, inclusive, of NRS, while engaged in such  
27 volunteer work, may be deemed by an insurer, for the purposes of  
28 those chapters, as employees of that organization at a wage of \$100  
29 per month. Such persons are entitled to the benefits of those  
30 chapters when the organization approves coverage and complies  
31 with the provisions of those chapters and regulations adopted  
32 pursuant to them.

33 **Sec. 33.** NRS 617.070 is hereby amended to read as follows:

34 617.070 "Employee" and "worker" are used interchangeably in  
35 this chapter and mean every person in the service of an employer  
36 under any appointment or contract of hire or apprenticeship, express  
37 or implied, oral or written, whether lawfully or unlawfully  
38 employed, and include, but not exclusively:

- 39 1. Aliens and minors.  
40 2. All elected and appointed paid public officers.  
41 3. Members of boards of directors of quasi-public or private  
42 corporations while rendering actual service for such corporations for  
43 pay.



1       4. Volunteer firefighters entitled to the benefits of chapters  
2 616A to 616D, inclusive, of NRS pursuant to the provisions of  
3 NRS 616A.145.

4       5. Musicians providing music for hire, including members of  
5 local supporting bands and orchestras commonly known as house  
6 bands.

7       6. *Volunteer health practitioners, as defined in section 19 of*  
8 *this act, who are providing health or veterinary services pursuant*  
9 *to sections 2 to 30, inclusive, of this act and are entitled to the*  
10 *benefits of chapters 616A to 616D, inclusive, of NRS pursuant to*  
11 *the provisions of section 29 of this act.*

12       **Sec. 34.** This act becomes effective upon passage and approval  
13 for the purpose of adopting regulations and on October 1, 2011, for  
14 all other purposes.
