SUMMARY—Establishes the crime of stolen valor. (BDR 15-1005)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: Increases or Newly Provides for Term of Imprisonment in County or City Jail or Detention Facility.

AN ACT relating to crimes; establishing the crime of stolen valor; providing a penalty; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 The federal Stolen Valor Act of 2005 prohibits a person from falsely representing himself
2 or herself, verbally or in writing, to have been awarded certain military decorations or awards.
3 A person who violates this provision may be fined, imprisoned for not more than 6 months or
4 both fined and imprisoned. (18 U.S.C. § 704(b)) The United States Court of Appeals for the
5 Ninth Circuit recently held that the Stolen Valor Act is facially invalid pursuant to the First
6 Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and is therefore unconstitutional. The
7 Ninth Circuit Court found that the Act as currently drafted restricts free speech rights, but the
8 Court suggested that the statute could be modified into a constitutional anti-fraud statute.
9 (*United States v. Alvarez*, 617 F.3d 1198, 1212, 1217 (9th Cir. 2010)) The Court noted that to
10 prove that a person is liable for fraud, it must be shown that the person knowingly made a
11 false representation of fact to intentionally mislead another person and successfully misled the
12 other person through such false representation. (*United States v. Alvarez*, 617 F.3d 1198, 1211
13 (9th Cir. 2010) (citing *Ill. ex rel. Madigan v. Telemarketing Assocs., Inc.*, 538 U.S. 600, 620
14 (2003)))

15 Existing Nevada law prohibits a person from willfully wearing the badge, button, insignia
16 or rosette of any military order or of any secret order or society, or from using any such item
17 to obtain aid, assistance or any other benefit or advantage, if the person is not entitled to wear
18 or use any such items. (NRS 205.410) This bill repeals existing Nevada law and provides that
19 a person commits the crime of stolen valor if the person knowingly, with the intent to mislead
20 or defraud and with the intent to obtain **some benefit or** something of value, misleads or
21 defrauds another person by **committing various acts concerning the** **making any** false
22 representation of **himself or herself with relation to his or her** military service **and** **obtains something of value.** **If the amount of the loss caused by the violation: (1) is less**
23 **than \$2,500, the person who committed the violation is guilty of a gross misdemeanor;**
24 **and (2) is \$2,500 or more, the person who committed the violation is guilty of a category**
25 **E felony.**

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Chapter 205 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new
2 section to read as follows:

3 **1. A person [shall not] is guilty of the crime of stolen valor if the person
4 knowingly, with the intent to mislead or defraud:**

5 **(a) [Make] Makes any false representation of military service, including,
6 without limitation, falsely representing his or her current or former military
7 status, claiming that he or she served in the Armed Forces of the United States, a
8 reserve component thereof or the National Guard, or that he or she served in a
9 combat zone;**

10 **(b) [Make] Makes any such false representation with the intent to obtain
11 employment, be elected or appointed to public office or obtain] something of
12 value; and**

13 **(c) [Mislead] Misleads or [defraud] defrauds another person through such
14 false representation and [obtain] employment, be elected or appointed to public
15 office or obtain] obtains something of value.**

16 **2. [A person shall not knowingly, with the intent to mislead or defraud:**

17 **(a) Falsely represent himself or herself by wearing any military decoration or
18 medal authorized by Congress for the Armed Forces of the United States, any
19 service medal or badge awarded to members of such forces, any ribbon, button or
20 rosette of any such badge, decoration or medal, or any colorable imitation of
21 such items;**

22 **(b) Make such false representation with the intent to obtain something of
23 value; and**

24 **(c) Mislead or defraud another person through such false representation and
25 obtain something of value.**

26 **3. A person shall not knowingly, with the intent to mislead or defraud:**

27 **(a) Falsely represent himself or herself, verbally or in writing, to have been
28 awarded any military decoration or medal authorized by Congress for the Armed
29 Forces of the United States, any service medal or badge awarded to members of
30 such forces, any ribbon, button or rosette of any such badge, decoration or
31 medal, or any colorable imitation of such items;**

32 **(b) Make such false representation with the intent to obtain something of
33 value; and**

34 **(c) Mislead or defraud another person through such false representation and
35 obtain something of value.**

36 **4. A person shall not knowingly, with the intent to mislead or defraud:**

37 **(a) Falsely claim, verbally or in writing, to be or to have been a member of
38 any elite United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) of the Armed
39 Forces of the United States, any of its component units or the predecessors of any
40 such units by wearing or displaying the distinctive emblem, badge or pin thereof;**

41 **(b) Make such false claims with the intent to obtain something of value; and**

42 **(c) Mislead or defraud another person through such false claims and obtain
43 something of value.**

44 **5. A person shall not knowingly, with the intent to mislead or defraud:**

45 **(a) Forge, counterfeit or falsely alter any military document of any military
46 service of the United States, including, without limitation, a certificate of
47 discharge or a military identification card or badge;**

48 **(b) Use for any purpose, unlawfully possess, display or exhibit any such false
49 document with the intent to obtain something of value; and**

1 (c) ~~Mislead or defraud another person through the use of any such false~~
2 ~~document and obtain something of value.~~
3 6. A person who violates any provision of this section is guilty of the crime
4 ~~of stolen valor. A person who violates:~~
5 (a) Subsection 1 is guilty of a misdemeanor;
6 (b) Subsection 2, except as otherwise provided in subsection 7 or 8, is guilty
7 ~~of a misdemeanor;~~
8 (c) Subsection 3, except as otherwise provided in subsection 7 or 8, is guilty
9 ~~of a misdemeanor;~~
10 (d) Subsection 4 is guilty of a misdemeanor;
11 (e) Subsection 5 is guilty of a gross misdemeanor;
12 7. A person who violates subsection 2 or 3 by wearing or falsely
13 ~~representing himself or herself to have been awarded a Distinguished Service~~
14 ~~Cross, Navy Cross, Air Force Cross, Silver Star or Purple Heart, or any~~
15 ~~replacement or duplicate medal for any such medal as authorized by law, is guilty~~

17 8. A person who violates subsection 2 or 3 by wearing or falsely
18 ~~representing himself or herself to have been awarded a Medal of Honor is guilty~~
19 ~~of a category E felony and shall be punished as provided in NRS 193.130.] If the~~

21 (a) Is less than \$2,500, the person who committed the violation is guilty of a
22 ~~gross misdemeanor.~~

TEXT OF REPEALED SECTION

205.410 Improper use of insignia.

Every person who shall willfully wear the badge, button, insigne or rosette of any military order or of any secret order or society, or any similitude thereof; or who shall use any such badge, button, insigne or rosette to obtain aid or assistance, or any other benefit or advantage, unless the person shall be entitled to so wear or use the same under the constitution, bylaws, rules and regulations of such order or society, shall be fined not more than \$500.
