

## SENATE BILL NO. 347—SENATOR DENIS

MARCH 21, 2011

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Referred to Committee on Judiciary

**SUMMARY**—Confers the powers of a peace officer upon certain employees of the Aging and Disability Services Division of the Department of Health and Human Services for certain purposes. (BDR 23-1075)

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AN ACT relating to older persons; conferring the powers of a peace officer upon certain employees of the Aging and Disability Services Division of the Department of Health and Human Services for certain purposes; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

1 Existing law requires certain persons who have reasonable cause to believe that  
2 an older person has been abused, neglected, exploited or isolated to report the  
3 abuse, neglect, exploitation or isolation of the older person to the Aging and  
4 Disability Services Division of the Department of Health and Human Services, or a  
5 local office thereof, a police department, sheriff's office or a county's office for  
6 protective services. (NRS 200.5093) The exploitation of an older person consists of  
7 wrongfully depriving the older person of the ownership, use, benefit or possession  
8 of his or her money, assets or property. (NRS 200.5092) **Section 4** of this bill  
9 confers upon employees of the Division, as designated by the Administrator of the  
10 Division, the powers of a peace officer when performing duties relating to  
11 investigations of reports of abuse, neglect, exploitation or isolation of older persons  
12 or vulnerable persons.

13 **Section 5** of this bill designates as category II peace officers employees of the  
14 Division, as designated by the Administrator of the Division, when performing  
15 duties relating to investigations of reports of abuse, neglect, exploitation or  
16 isolation of older persons or vulnerable persons.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

4      **Sec. 4.** NRS 289.240 is hereby amended to read as follows:

5      289.240 **1.** Forensic technicians and correctional officers  
6 employed by the Division of Mental Health and Developmental  
7 Services of the Department of Health and Human Services at  
8 facilities for offenders with mental disorders have the powers of  
9 peace officers when performing duties prescribed by the  
10 Administrator of the Division.

11     **2. Employees of the Aging and Disability Services Division of  
the Department of Health and Human Services, as designated by  
the Administrator of the Division, have the powers of peace  
officers when performing duties pursuant to NRS 200.5091 to  
200.50995, inclusive.**

12     **Sec. 5.** NRS 289.470 is hereby amended to read as follows:

13     289.470 "Category II peace officer" means:

14     1. The Bailiff of the Supreme Court;

15     2. The bailiffs of the district courts, justice courts and  
16 municipal courts whose duties require them to carry weapons and  
make arrests;

17     3. Constables and their deputies whose official duties require  
them to carry weapons and make arrests;

18     4. Inspectors employed by the Nevada Transportation  
19 Authority who exercise those powers of enforcement conferred by  
20 chapters 706 and 712 of NRS;

21     5. Parole and probation officers;

22     6. Special investigators who are employed full-time by the  
23 office of any district attorney or the Attorney General;

24     7. Investigators of arson for fire departments who are specially  
25 designated by the appointing authority;

26     8. The assistant and deputies of the State Fire Marshal;

27     9. The brand inspectors of the State Department of Agriculture  
28 who exercise the powers of enforcement conferred by chapter 565  
of NRS;

29     10. The field agents and inspectors of the State Department of  
30 Agriculture who exercise the powers of enforcement conferred by  
31 NRS 561.225;

32     11. Investigators for the State Forester Firewarden who are  
33 specially designated by the State Forester Firewarden and whose  
34 primary duties are related to the investigation of arson;



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1       12. School police officers employed by the board of trustees of  
2 any county school district;

3       13. Agents of the State Gaming Control Board who exercise  
4 the powers of enforcement specified in NRS 289.360, 463.140 or  
5 463.1405, except those agents whose duties relate primarily to  
6 auditing, accounting, the collection of taxes or license fees, or the  
7 investigation of applicants for licenses;

8       14. Investigators and administrators of the Division of  
9 Compliance Enforcement of the Department of Motor Vehicles who  
10 perform the duties specified in subsection 2 of NRS 481.048;

11      15. Officers and investigators of the Section for the Control of  
12 Emissions From Vehicles and the Enforcement of Matters Related  
13 to the Use of Special Fuel of the Department of Motor Vehicles who  
14 perform the duties specified in subsection 3 of NRS 481.0481;

15      16. Legislative police officers of the State of Nevada;

16      17. The personnel of the Capitol Police Division of the  
17 Department of Public Safety appointed pursuant to subsection 2 of  
18 NRS 331.140;

19      18. Parole counselors of the Division of Child and Family  
20 Services of the Department of Health and Human Services;

21      19. Juvenile probation officers and deputy juvenile probation  
22 officers employed by the various judicial districts in the State of  
23 Nevada or by a department of juvenile justice services established  
24 by ordinance pursuant to NRS 62G.210 whose official duties require  
25 them to enforce court orders on juvenile offenders and make arrests;

26      20. Field investigators of the Taxicab Authority;

27      21. Security officers employed full-time by a city or county  
28 whose official duties require them to carry weapons and make  
29 arrests;

30      22. The chief of a department of alternative sentencing created  
31 pursuant to NRS 211A.080 and the assistant alternative sentencing  
32 officers employed by that department;

33      23. Criminal investigators who are employed by the Secretary  
34 of State; ~~and~~

35      24. The Inspector General of the Department of Corrections  
36 and any person employed by the Department as a criminal  
37 investigator ~~;~~; ~~and~~

38      25. *Employees of the Aging and Disability Services Division  
39 of the Department of Health and Human Services, as designated  
40 by the Administrator of the Division, when performing duties  
41 pursuant to NRS 200.5091 to 200.50995, inclusive.*
