

SENATE BILL NO. 164—SENATORS PARKS, SPEARMAN, WOODHOUSE, KIHUEN, SEGERBLOM; ATKINSON, DENIS, FORD, JONES, MANENDO, ROBERSON, SETTELMAYER AND SMITH

FEBRUARY 18, 2013

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing safe and respectful learning environments in public schools. (BDR 34-454)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.
Effect on the State: Yes.

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets ~~omitted material~~ is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; requiring the State Board of Education and the board of trustees of each school district, in their respective annual reports of accountability, to provide information about the number of reported instances of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation; requiring each public school to disseminate information annually on bullying; revising the definition of “bullying”; revising provisions governing training in the prevention, identification and reporting of bullying and similar conduct; requiring training for administrators in preventing and responding to violence and suicide associated with bullying; requiring notice to the parent or guardian of any pupil allegedly involved in a reported incident of bullying or similar conduct; requiring that certain annual reports submitted to the Attorney General also be provided to the Governor and the Legislature; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.



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Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law provides for a safe and respectful learning environment in public schools and prohibits bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation. (NRS 388.121-388.139) Existing law requires that any instance of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation involving a school employee or pupil be reported to and investigated by the school's principal or his or her designee. (NRS 388.1351) If such an investigation confirms that a violation has occurred, existing law provides for the imposition of discipline and requires that statistical information about incidents resulting in the suspension or expulsion of a pupil be included in the annual reports of accountability prepared by the State Board of Education and the board of trustees of each school district. (NRS 385.3469, 385.347, 388.1351) **Sections 1 and 2** of this bill require that the annual reports of accountability include information about all reported instances of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation, regardless of whether they result in the suspension or expulsion of a pupil.

Section 3 of this bill requires each public school to disseminate information on bullying and the facilitation of positive relations among pupils during the annual "Week of Respect" proclaimed by the Governor.

Section 4.5 of this bill revises the definition of bullying to include: (1) only repeated acts or conduct; and (2) acts or conduct that exploit an imbalance in power.

Sections 5-7 of this bill revise various provisions governing the training of all administrators, principals, teachers and other school employees on the subject of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment and intimidation. Existing law requires the Department of Education to prescribe a policy for such training. (NRS 388.133)

Section 5 requires the policy to encompass members of the boards of trustees of school districts and provide for training in methods to prevent, identify and report incidents of bullying and similar conduct. Existing law also requires the board of trustees of each school district to adopt the training policy prescribed by the Department and provide the appropriate training to employees of the district. (NRS 388.134) **Section 6** requires the members of the board of trustees to receive this training and requires that newly elected trustees and new employees of the school district receive the training within 180 days after the beginning of their term of office or their employment, as applicable. Existing law requires the Department to recommend certain programs of training in this area for members of the boards of trustees of school districts and school employees. (NRS 388.1342) **Section 7** requires the Department to establish these programs and a program to train administrators in the prevention of and response to violence and suicide associated with bullying and similar conduct. **Section 7** also requires each administrator to complete this training: (1) within 90 days after becoming an administrator; (2) at least once during any school year in which the training is revised or updated; and (3) at least once every 3 years otherwise.

Section 8 of this bill provides that a principal, or his or her designee, who receives a report of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation must give notice of the report to the parent or legal guardian of each pupil involved in the incident that is the subject of the report.

Existing law requires the principal of each public school to report to the board of trustees of the school district concerning the number of reports of bullying and similar conduct received during the preceding semester. The reports of each principal are compiled by the board of trustees and submitted to the Department. The Superintendent of Public Instruction, in turn, compiles the reports received from the various school districts and annually submits the compilation to the Attorney General. (NRS 388.1353, 388.1355) **Section 9** of this bill clarifies that a reported violation must be included in the principal's report to the board of trustees, regardless of the outcome of the investigation into the incident. **Section 10** of this



bill requires that the Superintendent's compilation also be submitted to the Governor and to the Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau for transmittal to the Legislature, or to the Legislative Committee on Education if the Legislature is not in regular session.

Existing law provides immunity from liability for a pupil, school employee or volunteer who reports an incident of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation unless he or she acts with malice, intentional misconduct, gross negligence, or intentional or knowing violation of the law. (NRS 388.137) Where such a malicious, intentional or grossly negligent report is made, **section 11** of this bill authorizes disciplinary action against the pupil or other person making the report.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. NRS 385.3469 is hereby amended to read as follows:

385.3469 1. The State Board shall prepare an annual report of accountability that includes, without limitation:

(a) Information on the achievement of all pupils based upon the results of the examinations administered pursuant to NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(b) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, pupil achievement, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the following groups of pupils:

(1) Pupils who are economically disadvantaged, as defined by the State Board;

(2) Pupils from major racial and ethnic groups, as defined by the State Board;

(3) Pupils with disabilities;

(4) Pupils who are limited English proficient; and

(5) Pupils who are migratory children, as defined by the State Board.

(c) A comparison of the achievement of pupils in each group identified in paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 385.361 with the annual measurable objectives of the State Board.

(d) The percentage of all pupils who were not tested, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, the percentage of pupils who were not tested, reported separately by gender and reported separately for the groups identified in paragraph (b).

(f) The most recent 3-year trend in the achievement of pupils in each subject area tested and each grade level tested pursuant to



1 NRS 389.015 and 389.550, reported for each school district,
2 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
3 for this State as a whole, which may include information regarding
4 the trend in the achievement of pupils for more than 3 years, if such
5 information is available.

6 (g) Information on whether each school district has made
7 adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation, the name of
8 each school district, if any, designated as demonstrating need for
9 improvement pursuant to NRS 385.377 and the number of
10 consecutive years that the school district has carried that
11 designation.

12 (h) Information on whether each public school, including,
13 without limitation, each charter school, has made:

14 (1) Adequate yearly progress, including, without limitation,
15 the name of each public school, if any, designated as demonstrating
16 need for improvement pursuant to NRS 385.3623 and the number of
17 consecutive years that the school has carried that designation.

18 (2) Progress based upon the model adopted by the
19 Department pursuant to NRS 385.3595, if applicable for the grade
20 level of pupils enrolled at the school.

21 (i) Information on the results of pupils who participated in the
22 examinations of the National Assessment of Educational Progress
23 required pursuant to NRS 389.012.

24 (j) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each
25 grade level for all elementary schools, reported for each school
26 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
27 district, and for this State as a whole, and the average class size for
28 each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each
29 secondary school, reported for each school district and for this State
30 as a whole.

31 (k) The total number of persons employed by each school
32 district in this State, including without limitation, each charter
33 school in the district. Each such person must be reported as either an
34 administrator, a teacher or other staff and must not be reported in
35 more than one category. In addition to the total number of persons
36 employed by each school district in each category, the report must
37 include the number of employees in each of the three categories
38 expressed as a percentage of the total number of persons employed
39 by the school district. As used in this paragraph:

40 (1) "Administrator" means a person who spends at least 50
41 percent of his or her work year supervising other staff or licensed
42 personnel, or both, and who is not classified by the board of trustees
43 of a school district as a professional-technical employee.

44 (2) "Other staff" means all persons who are not reported as
45 administrators or teachers, including, without limitation:



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(I) School counselors, school nurses and other employees who spend at least 50 percent of their work year providing emotional support, noninstructional guidance or medical support to pupils;

(II) Noninstructional support staff, including, without limitation, janitors, school police officers and maintenance staff; and

(III) Persons classified by the board of trustees of a school district as professional-technical employees, including, without limitation, technical employees and employees on the professional-technical pay scale.

(3) "Teacher" means a person licensed pursuant to chapter 391 of NRS who is classified by the board of trustees of a school district:

(I) As a teacher and who spends at least 50 percent of his or her work year providing instruction or discipline to pupils; or

(II) As instructional support staff, who does not hold a supervisory position and who spends not more than 50 percent of his or her work year providing instruction to pupils. Such instructional support staff includes, without limitation, librarians and persons who provide instructional support.

(I) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, information on the professional qualifications of teachers employed by the school districts and charter schools, including, without limitation:

(1) The percentage of teachers who are:

(I) Providing instruction pursuant to NRS 391.125;

(II) Providing instruction pursuant to a waiver of the requirements for licensure for the grade level or subject area in which the teachers are employed; or

(III) Otherwise providing instruction without an endorsement for the subject area in which the teachers are employed;

(2) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by highly qualified teachers;

(3) The percentage of classes in the core academic subjects, as set forth in NRS 389.018, in this State that are not taught by highly qualified teachers, in the aggregate and disaggregated by high-poverty compared to low-poverty schools, which for the purposes of this subparagraph means schools in the top quartile of poverty and the bottom quartile of poverty in this State;

(4) For each middle school, junior high school and high school:



(I) The number of persons employed as substitute teachers for 20 consecutive days or more in the same classroom or assignment, designated as long-term substitute teachers, including the total number of days long-term substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by grade level and subject area; and

(II) The number of persons employed as substitute teachers for less than 20 consecutive days, designated as short-term substitute teachers, including the total number of days short-term substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by grade level and subject area; and

(5) For each elementary school:

(I) The number of persons employed as substitute teachers for 20 consecutive days or more in the same classroom or assignment, designated as long-term substitute teachers, including the total number of days long-term substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by grade level; and

(II) The number of persons employed as substitute teachers for less than 20 consecutive days, designated as short-term substitute teachers, including the total number of days short-term substitute teachers were employed at each school, identified by grade level.

(m) The total expenditure per pupil for each school district in this State, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

(n) The total statewide expenditure per pupil. If this State has a financial analysis program that is designed to track educational expenditures and revenues to individual schools, the State Board shall use that statewide program in complying with this paragraph. If a statewide program is not available, the State Board shall use the Department's own financial analysis program in complying with this paragraph.

(o) For all elementary schools, junior high schools and middle schools, the rate of attendance, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(p) The annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grade 8 and a separate reporting of the annual rate of pupils who drop out of school in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and



1 for this State as a whole. The reporting for pupils in grades 9 to 12,
2 inclusive, excludes pupils who:

3 (1) Provide proof to the school district of successful
4 completion of the examinations of general educational development.

5 (2) Are enrolled in courses that are approved by the
6 Department as meeting the requirements for an adult standard
7 diploma.

8 (3) Withdraw from school to attend another school.

9 (q) The attendance of teachers who provide instruction, reported
10 for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
11 school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

12 (r) Incidents involving weapons or violence, reported for each
13 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
14 the district, and for this State as a whole.

15 (s) Incidents involving the use or possession of alcoholic
16 beverages or controlled substances, reported for each school district,
17 including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and
18 for this State as a whole.

19 (t) The suspension and expulsion of pupils required or
20 authorized pursuant to NRS 392.466 and 392.467, reported for each
21 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
22 the district, and for this State as a whole.

23 (u) The number of pupils who are deemed habitual disciplinary
24 problems pursuant to NRS 392.4655, reported for each school
25 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
26 district, and for this State as a whole.

27 (v) The number of pupils in each grade who are retained in the
28 same grade pursuant to NRS 392.033 or 392.125, reported for each
29 school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in
30 the district, and for this State as a whole.

31 (w) The transiency rate of pupils, reported for each school
32 district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the
33 district, and for this State as a whole. For the purposes of this
34 paragraph, a pupil is not a transient if the pupil is transferred to a
35 different school within the school district as a result of a change in
36 the zone of attendance by the board of trustees of the school district
37 pursuant to NRS 388.040.

38 (x) Each source of funding for this State to be used for the
39 system of public education.

40 (y) A compilation of the programs of remedial study purchased
41 in whole or in part with money received from this State that are used
42 in each school district, including, without limitation, each charter
43 school in the district. The compilation must include:

44 (1) The amount and sources of money received for programs
45 of remedial study.



(2) An identification of each program of remedial study, listed by subject area.

(z) The percentage of pupils who graduated from a high school or charter school in the immediately preceding year and enrolled in remedial courses in reading, writing or mathematics at a university, state college or community college within the Nevada System of Higher Education, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(aa) The technological facilities and equipment available for educational purposes, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(bb) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of pupils who received:

(1) A standard high school diploma, reported separately for pupils who received the diploma pursuant to:

(I) Paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805; and

(II) Paragraph (b) of subsection 1 of NRS 389.805.

(2) An adult diploma.

(3) An adjusted diploma.

(4) A certificate of attendance.

(cc) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of pupils who failed to pass the high school proficiency examination.

(dd) The number of habitual truants who are reported to a school police officer or local law enforcement agency pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144 and the number of habitual truants who are referred to an advisory board to review school attendance pursuant to paragraph (b) of subsection 2 of NRS 392.144, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole.

(ee) Information on the paraprofessionals employed at public schools in this State, including, without limitation, the charter schools in this State. The information must include:

(1) The number of paraprofessionals employed, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole; and

(2) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for this State as a whole, the number and percentage of all paraprofessionals who do not satisfy the qualifications set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 6319(c). The reporting



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requirements of this subparagraph apply to paraprofessionals who are employed in programs supported with Title I money and to paraprofessionals who are not employed in programs supported with Title I money.

(ff) An identification of appropriations made by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils and programs approved by the Legislature to improve the academic achievement of pupils.

(gg) A compilation of the special programs available for pupils at individual schools, listed by school and by school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district.

(hh) For each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district and for this State as a whole, information on pupils enrolled in career and technical education, including, without limitation:

(1) The number of pupils enrolled in a course of career and technical education;

(2) The number of pupils who completed a course of career and technical education;

(3) The average daily attendance of pupils who are enrolled in a program of career and technical education;

(4) The annual rate of pupils who dropped out of school and were enrolled in a program of career and technical education before dropping out;

(5) The number and percentage of pupils who completed a program of career and technical education and who received a standard high school diploma, an adjusted diploma or a certificate of attendance; and

(6) The number and percentage of pupils who completed a program of career and technical education and who did not receive a high school diploma because the pupils failed to pass the high school proficiency examination.

(ii) *The number of violations of NRS 388.135 reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for the State as a whole.*

(jj) The number of incidents resulting in suspension or expulsion for bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment or intimidation, reported for each school district, including, without limitation, each charter school in the district, and for the State as a whole.

2. A separate reporting for a group of pupils must not be made pursuant to this section if the number of pupils in that group is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual pupil. The State Board shall prescribe a mechanism for determining



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1 the minimum number of pupils that must be in a group for that
2 group to yield statistically reliable information.

3 3. The annual report of accountability must:

4 (a) Comply with 20 U.S.C. § 6311(h)(1) and the regulations
5 adopted pursuant thereto;

6 (b) Be prepared in a concise manner; and

7 (c) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and,
8 to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can
9 understand.

10 4. On or before October 15 of each year, the State Board shall:

11 (a) Provide for public dissemination of the annual report of
12 accountability by posting a copy of the report on the Internet
13 website maintained by the Department; and

14 (b) Provide written notice that the report is available on the
15 Internet website maintained by the Department. The written notice
16 must be provided to the:

17 (1) Governor;

18 (2) Committee;

19 (3) Bureau;

20 (4) Board of Regents of the University of Nevada;

21 (5) Board of trustees of each school district; and

22 (6) Governing body of each charter school.

23 5. Upon the request of the Governor, an entity described in
24 paragraph (b) of subsection 4 or a member of the general public, the
25 State Board shall provide a portion or portions of the annual report
26 of accountability.

27 6. As used in this section:

28 (a) "Bullying" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 388.122.

29 (b) "Cyber-bullying" has the meaning ascribed to it in
30 NRS 388.123.

31 (c) "Harassment" has the meaning ascribed to it in
32 NRS 388.125.

33 (d) "Highly qualified" has the meaning ascribed to it in 20
34 U.S.C. § 7801(23).

35 (e) "Intimidation" has the meaning ascribed to it in
36 NRS 388.129.

37 (f) "Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it in
38 NRS 391.008.

39 **Sec. 2.** NRS 385.347 is hereby amended to read as follows:

40 385.347 1. The board of trustees of each school district in
41 this State, in cooperation with associations recognized by the State
42 Board as representing licensed educational personnel in the district,
43 shall adopt a program providing for the accountability of the school
44 district to the residents of the district and to the State Board for the
45 quality of the schools and the educational achievement of the pupils

3 trustees of each school district shall report the information required
4 by subsection 2 for each charter school sponsored by the school

The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.

(9) For each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district, information that compares the results of pupils in the school with the results of pupils throughout the school district and throughout this State. The information required by this subparagraph must be provided in consultation with the Department to ensure the accuracy of the comparison.

(10) Information on whether each school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district, has made progress based upon the model adopted by the Department pursuant to NRS 385.3595.

➤ A separate reporting for a group of pupils must not be made pursuant to this paragraph if the number of pupils in that group is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual pupil. The State Board shall prescribe the mechanism for determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a group for that group to yield statistically reliable information.

(c) The ratio of pupils to teachers in kindergarten and at each grade level for each elementary school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district, and the average class size for each core academic subject, as set forth in NRS 389.018, for each secondary school in the district and the district as a whole, including, without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district.

(d) The total number of persons employed for each elementary school, middle school or junior high school, and high school in the district, including, without limitation, each charter school sponsored by the district. 8 reported violation of NRS 388.135 may appeal a disciplinary
9 decision of the principal or his or her designee, made against the
10 pupil as a result of the violation, in accordance with the policy
11 governing disciplinary action adopted by the board of trustees of the
12 school district.

13 **Sec. 9.** NRS 388.1353 is hereby amended to read as follows:

14 388.1353 1. On or before January 1 and June 30 of each year,
15 the principal of each public school shall submit to the board of
16 trustees of the school district a report on the *number of* violations of
17 NRS 388.135 ~~{which are}~~ reported during the previous school
18 semester ~~H~~ , *regardless of the outcome of the investigation*
19 *conducted pursuant to NRS 388.1351.* The report must include,
20 without limitation:

21 (a) The number of violations of NRS 388.135 occurring at the
22 school or otherwise involving a pupil enrolled at the school which
23 are reported during that period; and

24 (b) Any actions taken at the school to reduce the number of
25 incidents of bullying, cyber-bullying, harassment and intimidation,
26 including, without limitation, training that was offered or other
27 policies, practices and programs that were implemented.

28 2. The board of trustees of each school district shall review and
29 compile the reports submitted pursuant to subsection 1 and, on or
30 before August 1, submit a compilation of the reports to the
31 Department.

33 388.1355 The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall:

34 1. Compile the reports submitted pursuant to NRS 388.1353
35 and prepare a written report of the compilation.

36 2. On or before October 1 of each year, submit the written
37 compilation to the :

38 (a) *Governor;*

39 (b) *Attorney General H; and*

40 (c) *Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau for transmittal*
41 *to the Legislature, or to the Legislative Committee on Education*
42 *created pursuant to NRS 218E.605 when the Legislature is not in*

Sec. 11. NRS 388.137 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.137 **1.** No cause of action may be brought against a pupil or an employee or volunteer of a school who reports a violation of NRS 388.135 unless the person who made the report acted with malice, intentional misconduct, gross negligence, or intentional or knowing violation of the law.

2. *If a principal determines that a report of a violation of NRS 388.135 is false and that the person who made the report acted with malice, intentional misconduct, gross negligence, or intentional or knowing violation of the law, the principal may recommend the imposition of disciplinary action or other measures against the person in accordance with the policy governing disciplinary action adopted by the board of trustees of the school district.*

Sec. 12. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2013.
