SPEARMAN; MANENDO AND WOODHOUSE (BY REQUEST)

SUMMARY—Authorizes a local law enforcement agency to establish or utilize an electronic reporting system to receive information relating to purchases of scrap metal. (BDR 54-869)

AN ACT relating to scrap metal; authorizing a local law enforcement agency to establish or utilize an electronic reporting system to receive information relating to purchases of scrap metal; requiring, under certain circumstances, a scrap metal processor to submit to a local law enforcement agency electronically certain information relating to certain purchases of scrap metal; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 Existing law provides certain restrictions on the sale and purchase of scrap
2 metal in this State and requires scrap metal processors to maintain certain records
3 of purchases of scrap metal. (NRS 647.092-647.098) **Section 1** of this bill
4 authorizes a local law enforcement agency to establish an electronic reporting
5 system or utilize an existing electronic reporting system to receive certain
6 information relating to scrap metal purchases within the jurisdiction of the law
7 enforcement agency. **Section 1** requires that the system be electronically secure and
8 accessible only to a scrap metal processor for the purpose of submitting certain
9 information and to an officer of the local law enforcement agency. If a local law
10 enforcement agency establishes an electronic reporting system or utilizes an
11 existing electronic reporting system, **section 1** requires a scrap metal processor to



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12 submit electronically to the local law enforcement agency certain information
13 relating to each purchase of scrap metal from certain persons.

14 **Section 2** of this bill specifies that the record of purchase maintained by a scrap
15 metal processor must include a copy of the seller's valid: (1) personal identification
16 card issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles; (2) driver's license issued by this
17 State or another state or territory of the United States; or (3) United States military
18 identification card.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Chapter 647 of NRS is hereby amended by adding
2 thereto a new section to read as follows:

3 *1. A local law enforcement agency may establish an
4 electronic reporting system or utilize an existing electronic
5 reporting system to receive information relating to the purchase of
6 scrap metal by a scrap metal processor that transacts business
7 within the jurisdiction of the local law enforcement agency. An
8 electronic reporting system established or utilized pursuant to this
9 subsection must:*

10 *(a) Be electronically secure and accessible only to:*

11 *(1) A scrap metal processor for the purpose of submitting
12 the information required by subsection 2; and*

13 *(2) An officer of the local law enforcement agency.*

14 *(b) Provide for the electronic submission of information by a
15 scrap metal processor.*

16 *2. If a local law enforcement agency establishes an electronic
17 reporting system or utilizes an existing electronic reporting system
18 pursuant to subsection 1, each scrap metal processor that
19 transacts business within the jurisdiction of the local law
20 enforcement agency shall, before 12 p.m. of each day, submit
21 electronically to the local law enforcement agency the following
22 information regarding each purchase of scrap metal conducted on
23 the preceding day from a person who sold the scrap metal in his or
24 her individual capacity:*

25 *(a) The name of the seller;*

26 *(b) The date of the purchase;*

27 *(c) The name of the person or employee who conducted the
28 transaction on behalf of the scrap metal processor;*

29 *(d) The name, street, house number and date of birth listed on
30 the identification provided pursuant to paragraph (c) of subsection
31 1 of NRS 647.094 and a physical description of the seller,
32 including the seller's gender, height, eye color and hair color;*

33 *(e) The license number and general description of any vehicle
34 that delivered the scrap metal;*



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1 (f) The description of the scrap metal recorded pursuant to
2 paragraph (h) of subsection 1 of NRS 647.094; and

3 (g) The amount, in weight, of scrap metal purchased.

4 3. If a scrap metal processor is required to submit
5 information to a local law enforcement agency electronically
6 pursuant to subsection 2, the scrap metal processor shall display
7 prominently at the point of purchase a public notice, in a form
8 approved by the local law enforcement agency, describing the
9 information that the scrap metal processor is required to submit
10 electronically to the local law enforcement agency.

11 4. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to limit or
12 otherwise abrogate any duty of a scrap metal processor to
13 maintain a book or other permanent record of information
14 pursuant to NRS 647.094.

15 5. If a local law enforcement agency establishes an electronic
16 reporting system or utilizes an existing electronic reporting system
17 to receive information pursuant to this section, the local law
18 enforcement agency shall, on or before January 15 of each odd-
19 numbered year, submit to the Director of the Legislative Counsel
20 Bureau for transmittal to the Legislature a report regarding the
21 effect of the electronic reporting system on the incidence of crime
22 which relates to the sale or purchase of scrap metal within the
23 jurisdiction of the law enforcement agency.

24 Sec. 2. NRS 647.094 is hereby amended to read as follows:

25 647.094 1. Every scrap metal processor shall maintain in his
26 or her place of business a book or other permanent record in which
27 must be made, at the time of each purchase of scrap metal, a record
28 of the purchase that contains:

29 (a) The date of the purchase.

30 (b) The name or other identification of the person or employee
31 conducting the transaction on behalf of the scrap metal processor.

32 (c) A copy of the seller's valid ~~personal~~ :

33 (1) Personal identification card ~~or valid driver's~~ issued by
34 this State;

35 (2) Driver's license issued by ~~or~~ this State or any other state
36 or territory of the United States; or ~~a copy of the seller's valid~~

37 (3) United States military identification card.

38 (d) The name, street, house number and date of birth listed on
39 the identification provided pursuant to paragraph (c) and a physical
40 description of the seller, including the seller's gender, height, eye
41 color and hair color.

42 (e) A photograph, video record or digital record of the seller.

43 (f) The fingerprint of the right index finger of the seller. If the
44 seller's right index finger is not available, the scrap metal processor



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1 must obtain the fingerprint of one of the seller's remaining fingers
2 and thumbs.

3 (g) The license number and general description of the vehicle
4 delivering the scrap metal that is being purchased.

5 (h) A description of the scrap metal that is being purchased
6 which is consistent with the standards published and commonly
7 applied in the scrap metal industry.

8 (i) The price paid by the scrap metal processor for the scrap
9 metal.

10 2. All records kept pursuant to subsection 1 must be legibly
11 written in the English language, if applicable.

12 3. A scrap metal processor shall document each purchase of
13 scrap metal with a photograph or video recording which must be
14 retained on-site for not less than 60 days after the date of the
15 purchase.

16 4. All scrap metal purchased by the scrap metal processor and
17 the records created in accordance with subsection 1, including, but
18 not limited to, any photographs or video recordings, must at all
19 times during ordinary hours of business be open to the inspection of
20 a prosecuting attorney or any peace officer.

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
