AN ACT relating to days of observance; requiring the Governor annually to proclaim May 5 to be "Cinco de Mayo Day"; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law establishes certain days of observance in this State to commemorate certain persons or occasions or to publicize information regarding certain important topics. (NRS 236.018-236.085) This bill requires the Governor annually to proclaim May 5 to be "Cinco de Mayo Day" in the State of Nevada as a day to observe Mexican heritage and pride in Nevada.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 236 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

1. The Governor shall annually proclaim May 5 to be "Cinco de Mayo Day" in the State of Nevada as a day to observe Mexican heritage and pride in Nevada.

2. The proclamation must call upon the news media, educators and appropriate governmental officers to bring to the
