BDR 40-239 makes changes relating to prescription monitoring for certain controlled substances. As written, the bill indicates that both the State Board of Pharmacy and the Investigation Division must cooperatively track and monitor prescription activity. The Investigation Division does not operate the automated Prescription Monitoring Program. That is solely under the care and control of the Pharmacy Board. The Investigation Division can access the program for investigative purposes and would continue to do so. The Bill's new language could be interpreted as to require the Investigation Division to engage in monitoring and tabulation activities beyond the division's program access capabilities. In conversations with the Pharmacy Board, if the Bill became law, the Investigation Division understands that the Pharmacy Board would actually do the monitoring and tabulation functions (to the extent the system capabilities permit). Given this information, the Investigation Division does not anticipate a fiscal impact as a result of this bill. This is part of a joint response with Board of Pharmacy.
