SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing orders for protection against domestic violence. (BDR 3-967)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact. Effect on the State: Yes.

AN ACT relating to orders for protection; increasing the time within which an extended order for protection expires; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law sets forth certain unlawful acts which constitute domestic violence when committed against certain specified persons. (NRS 33.018) Existing law authorizes a court to issue a temporary or extended order for protection to protect a person listed in that statute from domestic violence. (NRS 33.020, 33.030) Under existing law, certain temporary orders expire within 30 days and extended orders expire within 1 year, as the court fixes. Existing law also authorizes a court to convert a temporary order into an extended order effective for not more than 1 year. (NRS 33.080) This bill increases from 1 year to 3 years the time within which: (1) an extended order expires; and (2) a temporary order which has been converted into an extended order expires.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. NRS 33.080 is hereby amended to read as follows: 33.080 1. A temporary order expires within such time, not to exceed 30 days, as the court fixes. If an application for an extended order is filed within the period of a temporary order or at the same time that an application for a temporary order is filed, the temporary order remains in effect until the hearing on the extended order is held.

- 2. On 2 days' notice to the party who obtained the temporary order, the adverse party may appear and move its dissolution or modification, and in that event the court shall proceed to hear and determine such motion as expeditiously as the ends of justice require.
- 3. An extended order expires within such time, not to exceed [1 year,] 3 years, as the court fixes. A temporary order may be converted by the court, upon notice to the adverse party and a hearing, into an extended order effective for not more than [1 year.] 3 years.
 - **Sec. 2.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2017.
