The problematic part of the legislation is the provision that would require a city to take over the operations and maintenance of certain cemeteries. The first year costs for irrigation, salaries and wages, supplies and equipment purchases would be \$400,000 if the City had to take over the operations and maintenance of the cemetery. At the time of this fiscal note there has not been an amendment to the bill. However, in discussions with the bill sponsor it was indicated that the intent was not to have cities take over cemeteries. If that provision is amended out this fiscal note would be moot.
