Fiscal Effect of BDR 58-1014

Public Utilities Commission - 224-3920 Estimated Costs of \$180,171 for the Biennium Revised March 24, 2017

SUMMARY- Revises provisions governing the crew of certain freight trains.

The proposed statute will require the Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") to engage in the following activities:

Sections 1 and 2 would require the Commission to employ one additional full-time classified Safety Specialist, Railway - Operations Practices (11.543) position. Personnel and associated costs estimated at \$167,211 for the biennium. The Commission would be responsible for enforcing this statute and currently only has one Safety Specialist, Railway - Operations. Pursuant to Section 2, sub 1, the Safety Specialist, Railway - Operations Practices would be required to testify in court each time there was a violation, which would take away from conducting inspections. This would include in-state travel costs estimated at \$12,960 for the biennium.
