AN ACT relating to children; [providing for the establishment of a family home visiting system to provide support to new parents;] requiring the Legislative Committee on Child Welfare and Juvenile Justice to conduct a study concerning maternal, infant and early childhood home visitation services; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law imposes certain requirements to ensure maternal and child health. (Chapter 442 of NRS) This bill requires the [Division of Child and Family Services of the Department of Health and Human Services to establish and coordinate with other governmental entities to earry out a family home visiting system to provide for appropriately trained professionals to visit the homes of children during early childhood. This bill requires the family home visiting system to: (1) employ evidence based models that have demonstrated positive outcomes in certain areas; and (2) prioritize families to receive services based on risk factors known to impair childhood development. This bill also requires the Division to publish an annual report that contains certain information about the family home visiting system.] Legislative Committee on Child Welfare and Juvenile Justice to conduct a study during the 2019-2020 interim concerning maternal, infant and early childhood home visitation services.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. [Chapter 432 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

1. The Division shall establish by regulation and coordinate with other state and local governmental entities to carry out a family home visiting system to provide for appropriately trained professionals to visit the homes of children during early childhood. The system must:

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(a) Employ evidence-based models of home visitation that use comprehensive 2 standards based on peer-reviewed scientific research to ensure the delivery of 3 high-quality services. The evidence-based models must have demonstrated at least 4 two of the following: 5 (1) Improved prenatal, maternal, infant or child health outcomes; 6 (2) Improved safety and reduction in child abuse and neglect and other 7 iniuries to children: 8 (3) Improved economic security and self-sufficiency of families; and 9 (4) Enhanced early childhood development in the areas of social and 10 emotional development, language, cognition and physical health that improves 11 the readiness of the child for school. (b) Identify and refer families for home visitation before or soon after birth. 12 Such referrals must prioritize families to receive services based on risk factors 13 known to impair childhood development, including, without limitation: 14 15 (1) Parents who are less than 20 years of age; 16 (2) A history of prenatal drug or alcohol abuse; 17 (3) A history of child abuse or neglect, domestic violence or other 18 19 (4) Parents who are incarcerated: 20 (5) Parents who have reduced cognitive functioning or a significant 21 disability: (6) Insufficient financial resources to meet the needs of the family: 22 (7) A history of homelessness; and 23 (8) Any other risk factor identified by the Division. 24 On or before October 1 of each year, the Division shall post on an 25 Internet website maintained by the Division a report concerning the family home 26 visiting system established pursuant to subsection I. The report must include, without limitation: 27 28 29 (a) The number of families served by each evidence based model employed 30 by the program; 31 (b) Demographic data concerning the families served by the program; 32 (c) Data concerning the length of time that families are participating in the 33 program; 34 (d) Information concerning coordination with other state and local 35 governmental entities to earry out the program; and (c) Information concerning outcomes relating to prenatal, maternal, infant 36 37 and child health, occurrences of child abuse and neglect, family economic security, childhood development and school readiness. 38 3. As used in this section, "abuse" and "neglect" have the meanings ascribed to them in NRS 432B.330.] (Deleted by amendment.) 39 40 41 Sec. 1.5. 1. The Legislative Committee on Child Welfare and Juvenile 42 Justice shall: 43 (a) Conduct a study during the 2019-2020 interim concerning maternal, infant and early childhood home visitation services. The study must, without 44 45 limitation: 46 (1) Identify communities that demonstrate a high level of risk factors known to impair childhood development; 47 (2) Identify pregnant women who may benefit from receiving home 48 visitation services after the birth of the child; 49 50 (3) Identify existing programs in this State that provide maternal,

infant and early childhood home visitation services;

address needs and target resources; and

(4) Analyze past efforts in this State to use identified risk factors to
