SENATE BILL NO. 244—SENATOR CANNIZZARO

SUMMARY—Provides a criminal penalty for violation of a stay away order issued by a court. (BDR 15-924)

AN ACT relating to crimes; providing a criminal penalty for violation of a stay away order issued by a court; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law provides that persons who commit certain acts constituting contempt of court are guilty of criminal contempt, which is punishable as a misdemeanor. (NRS 199.340) Existing law also: (1) deems certain acts or omissions to constitute contempt, including disobedience of the order or direction of the court made pending the trial of an action; and (2) provides that a person found guilty of contempt may be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned for not more than 25 days, or both. (NRS 22.010, 22.100)

This bill provides that a person who violates a stay away order is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill defines a stay away order as an order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction that requires a person to do any or all of the following: (1) stay away from the home, school, business or place of employment of the victim of the alleged crime and any other location specifically named by the court; or (2) refrain from contacting, intimidating, threatening or otherwise interfering with the victim of the alleged crime and any other person named in the order, including, without limitation, a member of the family or the household of the victim of the alleged crime.





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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** Chapter 199 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:
- 1. In addition to any other sanction the court may issue or other action the court may take pursuant to specific statute against a person who violates an order of the court, any person who violates a stay away order is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 2. As used in this section, "stay away order" means an order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction that requires a person to do any or all of the following:
- (a) Stay away from the home, school, business or place of employment of the victim of the alleged crime and any other location specifically named by the court.
- (b) Refrain from contacting, intimidating, threatening or otherwise interfering with the victim of the alleged crime and any other person named in the order, including, without limitation, a member of the family or the household of the victim of the alleged crime.
