MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Eightieth Session May 6, 2019

The Senate Committee on Health and Human Services was called to order by Chair Julia Ratti at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, May 6, 2019, in Room 2135 of the Legislative Building, Carson City, Nevada. The meeting was videoconferenced to Room 4412E of the Grant Sawyer State Office Building, 555 East Washington Avenue, Las Vegas, Nevada. Exhibit A is the Agenda. Exhibit B is the Attendance Roster. CHAIR RATTI:

I will open the hearing on Assembly Bill (A.B.) 133.

ASSEMBLY BILL 133 (1st Reprint): Sets forth legislative findings and declarations concerning homeless youth. (BDR S-399)

ASSEMBLYWOMAN TERESA BENITEZ-THOMPSON (Assembly District No. 27): I am here today to present A.B. 133 for your consideration.

This bill is essentially a one-section bill with the purpose of stating a legislative finding that homeless youth are indeed part of the homeless population. This bill comes from conversations with Eddy House which is a drop-in center for homeless youth in Reno. In 2018, they served 682 homeless youth from the ages of 18 to 24. Of these 682 youth, 71 percent were from Washoe County with 8 percent from rural Nevada.

We have specific groups in the State that work around homeless youth. We are hoping to make a declaration that we see this population as a population that is different, has different needs and receives services in different ways from our adult homeless population. This includes funding pathways from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development when they are looking at their continuum of care and count days specific to homeless youth.

It is fitting and appropriate that we make an acknowledgment of this population within the present Nevada statutes.

I have submitted information on the 2018 HUD Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance Programs ($\underbrace{\text{Exhibit C}}_{\text{Count Results}}$ and $\underbrace{\text{Exhibit D}}_{\text{Count Results}}$) and the 2018 Washoe County Homeless Youth PIT Count Results ($\underbrace{\text{Exhibit E}}_{\text{Count}}$).

JEFFREY KINDER, P.E. (Deputy Administrator, Division of Environmental Protection, Department of Conservation & Natural Resources):

I am here to present <u>A.B. 353</u> and the proposed amendment (<u>Exhibit F</u>) at the request of the bill sponsor Assemblywoman Heidi Swank, Assembly District No. 16, and testify in support of the bill. I will read from my prepared testimony (<u>Exhibit G</u>).

KYLE DAVIS (Nevada Conservation League):

The Nevada Conservation League supports A.B. 353. We are happy to see that a bill has been brought forward that has to do with protecting our environment. We do believe this bill will increase the rate of recycling in Nevada and lead to our State government leading by example and increasing our rate of recycling to extend beyond paper products.

ALEXIS MOTAREX (Nevada Chapter Associated General Contractors): The Nevada Chapter Associated General Contractors supports A.B. 353.


