INTRODUCTION, FIRST READING AND REFERENCE

Senate Bill No. 124—AN ACT relating to public assistance; revising provisions relating to the eligibility of certain convicted persons for public assistance; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Ratti moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services.

Motion carried.

By Senator Settelmeyer:

Senate Bill No. 125—AN ACT relating to wildlife; requiring a person who wishes to transport, possess or use a golden eagle in falconry to obtain a falconry license; requiring such a person to prove that he or she complies with certain requirements before he or she is issued a falconry license; authorizing persons who have been issued a falconry license to take, transport, possess or use golden eagles in falconry; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Settelmeyer moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Natural Resources.

Motion carried.

By Senators Dondero Loop and Lange:

Senate Bill No. 126—AN ACT relating to education; requiring each public school in a school district in certain larger counties and each large charter school in certain larger counties to establish and maintain a school library that meets certain standards; requiring the State Board of Education to adopt regulations prescribing the minimum standards for a school library; prescribing requirements and exceptions for employing a teacher librarian in a public school; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Dondero Loop moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Education.

Motion carried.

By Senator Hardy:

Senate Bill No. 127—AN ACT relating to the City of Mesquite; revising the process for appointing the City Manager and City Attorney; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Hardy moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Government Affairs.

Motion carried.

By Senators Denis, Kieckhefer, Donate, Dondero Loop; Assemblymen Bilbray-Axelrod, Flores, González, Martinez, Marzola and Torres:

Senate Bill No. 128—AN ACT relating to higher education; directing the State Treasurer to conduct a study concerning the effectiveness of publicly

funded scholarship and grant programs in this State; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Denis moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Legislative Operations and Elections.

Motion carried.

By Senator Hammond:

Senate Bill No. 129—AN ACT relating to pest control; creating a limited license for certain applicators of pesticides or to use restricted-use pesticides without first passing the applicable examination; requiring certain service containers to be labeled; providing that certain application devices are not required to bear certain labels; revising provisions relating to the imposition of a fine for the violation of a provision governing the custom application of pesticides; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Senator Hammond moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Natural Resources.

Motion carried.

Today is a sad day for me. A great and influential American passed away today, the talk-radio host, Rush Limbaugh. He received the Presidential Medal of Freedom and had an estimated 50-million people in his radio audience. He was a great entertainer and a highly-influential political commentator for over 30 years. He had a personal influence on my own life, and because of his influence, I was able to be a radio, talk-show host on KOH Radio for six years. Whether you loved him or hated him, for many people he was influential for over three decades. He had been having a valiant fight against a terrible cancer, and today, he passed away. He was one of the greatest and influential Americans of both the 20th and 21st centuries, and many of us were fortunate to have been able to listen to him argue and debate. He was loved by many people, including myself, and he had an influence on the United States of America. I am thankful I was able to listen to him and participate in the great American process we call the "political arena."
