

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 444—ASSEMBLYWOMAN BACKUS

MARCH 27, 2023

Referred to Committee on Judiciary

SUMMARY—Revises provisions concerning child welfare.
(BDR 11-614)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.
Effect on the State: Yes.

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets ~~omitted material~~ is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to child welfare; establishing various provisions governing proceedings relating to the custody, adoption or protection of Indian children or the termination of parental rights; requiring the Division of Child and Family Services of the Department of Health and Human Services to adopt various regulations; requiring an agency which provides child welfare services to provide certain training for its personnel; requiring the Division and the Court Administrator to submit certain reports to the Chairs of the Senate and Assembly Standing Committees on Judiciary; authorizing the Nevada Supreme Court and the Court Administrator to adopt certain rules; repealing certain unnecessary provisions; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel’s Digest:

1 The federal Indian Child Welfare Act, 25 U.S.C. §§ 1901 et seq., was enacted
2 in 1978 to protect Indian children from the removal from their homes and families
3 and gives Indian tribes jurisdiction over the Indian children within their tribe.
4 Existing Nevada law recognizes the jurisdiction of Indian tribes in various
5 proceedings relating to the custody, adoption or protection of Indian children or the
6 termination of parental rights. (NRS 3.223, 62D.210, 125A.215, 127.010, 127.018,
7 128.020, 128.023, 432B.410, 432B.425) This bill establishes various provisions
8 governing proceedings relating to the custody, adoption or protection of Indian
9 children or the termination of parental rights to provide additional protections for
10 Indian children in state law.

11 **Sections 2-38** of this bill establish provisions concerning proceedings in which
12 the legal or physical custody of an Indian child is an issue. **Section 2** of this bill
13 explains the legislative intent of **sections 2-38**. **Sections 3.5-17** of this bill define



14 terms for the purposes of **sections 2-38**. **Section 17.5** of this bill provides that the
15 provisions of **sections 2-38** do not apply if: (1) in certain circumstances, a parent of
16 an Indian child is voluntarily terminating his or her parental rights and an extended
17 family member of the Indian child is subsequently adopting the Indian child upon
18 the termination of the parental rights of the parent; (2) a family member related
19 within the third degree of consanguinity to an Indian child is adopting the Indian
20 child; (3) an Indian child who was conceived by means of assisted reproduction is
21 being adopted; or (4) an Indian child is being adopted by a stepparent or other
22 nonbiological parent in a confirmatory adoption.

23 **Section 18** of this bill provides that a person has custody of an Indian child if
24 the person has physical or legal custody of the Indian child under any applicable
25 tribal law, tribal custom or state law.

26 **Section 20** of this bill requires a court to consider certain factors, in
27 consultation with the Indian child's tribe, when making a determination regarding
28 the best interests of the Indian child in a child custody proceeding. **Section 21** of
29 this bill establishes the order of priority for the domicile of an Indian child.

30 **Section 22** of this bill requires the appropriate agency which provides child
31 welfare services to: (1) provide assistance with enrolling an Indian child who is a
32 child in need of protection or who may be in need of protection in a tribe with
33 which the child is eligible for enrollment unless the Indian child's parent objects;
34 and (2) notify the Indian child's parent of his or her right to object to such
35 assistance from the agency.

36 **Section 23** of this bill sets forth the manner in which the tribe of an Indian child
37 is determined for purposes of a child custody proceeding involving the Indian child
38 and, if the Indian child is a member of or eligible for membership with more than
39 one tribe, requires the court to designate the tribe with which the Indian child has
40 the more significant contacts by considering certain factors.

41 **Section 24** of this bill requires a court to: (1) determine, in any child custody
42 proceeding involving an Indian child, the residence and domicile of the Indian child
43 and whether he or she is a ward of a tribal court; and (2) communicate with any
44 tribal courts to the extent necessary to make such determinations.

45 **Section 25** of this bill requires agencies which provide child welfare services to
46 make a good faith effort to enter into a tribal-state agreement with any Indian tribe
47 in Nevada and authorizes such agencies to enter into a tribal-state agreement with
48 any Indian tribe outside of Nevada if the tribe has significant numbers of Indian
49 children who reside in Nevada and are members of or eligible for membership with
50 the tribe. **Section 25** also establishes provisions concerning the contents of and
51 requirements regarding such tribal-state agreements.

52 **Section 26** of this bill provides that the jurisdiction of a court in a child custody
53 proceeding involving an Indian child is concurrent with the jurisdiction of the tribe
54 of the Indian child. **Section 26** also establishes the circumstances in which the tribe
55 of an Indian child has exclusive jurisdiction in such cases.

56 **Section 27** of this bill requires, in general, a court to transfer a child custody
57 proceeding involving an Indian child if the parent, Indian custodian or tribe of the
58 Indian child petitions the court to transfer the proceeding to tribal court. **Section 27**
59 also establishes various other provisions regarding such a transfer and the denial of
60 such a transfer by the court. **Section 28** of this bill sets forth the actions that a court
61 is required to take upon granting a transfer motion under **section 27**.

62 **Section 30** of this bill requires a court to ask each party in a child custody
63 proceeding, at the commencement of the proceeding, whether the party knows or
64 has reason to know that the child is an Indian child. **Section 30** establishes the
65 circumstances in which a court has reason to know that a child is an Indian child
66 and imposes certain requirements on a court if there is reason to know that a child
67 is an Indian child but the court does not have sufficient evidence to determine
68 whether the child is an Indian child.



69 **Section 31** of this bill requires the person taking a child into protective custody
70 in an emergency proceeding to make a good faith effort to determine whether there
71 is reason to know that the child is an Indian child and, if there is reason to know
72 that the child is an Indian child, the appropriate agency which provides child
73 welfare services is required, if the nature of the emergency allows, to notify any
74 tribe of which the child is or may be a member and provide certain information,
75 including a statement that the tribe has a right to participate in the proceeding as a
76 party or in an advisory capacity. **Section 31** also imposes certain requirements
77 relating to: (1) the provision of notice of a child custody proceeding if there is
78 reason to know that a child alleged to be within the court's jurisdiction is an Indian
79 child; and (2) the hearing regarding the proceeding.

80 **Section 32** of this bill provides that if a court finds at a hearing in a child
81 custody proceeding that a child is an Indian child, at least one qualified expert
82 witness must testify regarding certain information. If a qualified witness is required
83 to testify, **section 32** requires the petitioner in the proceeding to contact the tribe of
84 the Indian child and request that the tribe identify one or more persons who can
85 testify as a qualified witness. Additionally, **section 32** authorizes a court to hear
86 supplemental testimony from certain professionals.

87 **Section 33** of this bill provides that if a child in a child custody proceeding is
88 an Indian child and active efforts, which are efforts that are affirmative, active,
89 thorough, timely and intended to maintain or reunite an Indian child with the Indian
90 child's family, are required, the court is required to determine whether active
91 efforts have been made to prevent the breakup of or to reunite the family. **Section**
92 **33** establishes requirements relating to active efforts.

93 **Section 34** of this bill authorizes a tribe that is a party to a proceeding to be
94 represented by any person, regardless of whether the person is licensed to practice
95 law. **Section 34** also authorizes an attorney who is not barred from practicing law in
96 Nevada to appear in any proceeding involving an Indian child without associating
97 with local counsel if the attorney establishes to the satisfaction of the State Bar of
98 Nevada that certain requirements are met.

99 **Section 35** of this bill provides that in a proceeding involving a child who is or
100 may be in need of protection, if the child is an Indian child, the court is required to
101 appoint counsel to represent the Indian child and, in certain circumstances, also
102 appoint counsel to represent the Indian child's parent or Indian custodian. **Section**
103 **35** also authorizes an attorney who is appointed to represent an Indian child to
104 inspect certain records of the Indian child without the consent of the Indian child or
105 his or her parent or Indian custodian.

106 **Section 36** of this bill authorizes each party in a child custody proceeding in
107 which the child is an Indian child to timely examine all reports and documents held
108 by an agency which provides child welfare services that are not otherwise subject to
109 a discovery exception or precluded under state or federal law.

110 **Section 37** of this bill establishes requirements concerning the: (1) least
111 restrictive setting in which an Indian child must be placed if the parental rights of
112 the Indian child's parents have not been terminated and the Indian child is in need
113 of placement or continuation in substitute care; and (2) placement of an Indian child
114 if the parental rights of the Indian child's parents have been terminated and the
115 Indian child is in need of an adoptive placement. **Section 37** also authorizes the
116 alternative placement of an Indian child in certain circumstances.

117 **Section 38** of this bill authorizes certain persons to file a petition to vacate an
118 order or a judgment involving an Indian child regarding jurisdiction, placement,
119 guardianship or the termination of parental rights in a pending child custody
120 proceeding under **sections 2-38** or, if no proceeding is pending, in any court with
121 jurisdiction over the matter. **Section 38** requires the court to vacate an order or
122 judgment regarding jurisdiction, placement, guardianship or the termination of



123 parental rights if certain provisions of **sections 2-38** have been violated and the
124 court determines that vacating the order or judgment is proper.

125 **Sections 42-50** of this bill establish provisions specifically relating to the
126 adoption of Indian children. **Section 42** of this bill provides that a petition for
127 adoption of a child must include certain contents concerning whether there is
128 reason to know that the child who is the subject of the petition is an Indian child
129 and requires a petitioner who has reason to know that the child is an Indian child to
130 serve copies of the petition on certain persons and file with the court a declaration
131 of compliance concerning such notice. **Section 43** of this bill: (1) requires written
132 consent to the adoption of an Indian child to be given by the Indian child's parents
133 unless their parental rights have been terminated; (2) establishes requirements
134 concerning such consent; and (3) authorizes the withdrawal of such consent.

135 **Section 45** of this bill establishes provisions concerning the entry of a judgment
136 for the adoption of a child, including certain requirements relating to the adoption
137 of an Indian child. **Section 46** of this bill authorizes the filing of a petition to vacate
138 a judgment of adoption of an Indian child and requires the court to vacate the
139 judgment if the petition is timely filed and the court finds by clear and convincing
140 evidence that the consent of a parent to the adoption was obtained through fraud or
141 duress. **Section 47** of this bill requires a court to provide notice to certain persons
142 and the appropriate agency which provides child welfare services if a judgment of
143 adoption of an Indian child is vacated and, unless the return of custody of the
144 Indian child to a former parent or prior Indian custodian or the restoration of
145 parental rights is not in the best interests of the child, return custody of the Indian
146 child to the former parent or prior Indian custodian or restore parental rights.

147 **Section 48** of this bill requires that access to the adoption records of an Indian
148 child be given to the Indian child's tribe or the United States Secretary of the
149 Interior not later than 14 days after the request for such records.

150 **Section 49** of this bill requires the appropriate agency which provides child
151 welfare services to file with the court in a proceeding for the adoption of a minor
152 child a written compliance report that reflects the agency's review of the petition
153 for adoption and advises the court on whether the petitioner submitted complete
154 and sufficient documentation relating to the petitioner's compliance with the notice
155 requirements and placement preferences. **Section 49** requires the Division of Child
156 and Family Services of the Department of Health and Human Services (hereinafter
157 "Division") to adopt regulations providing a nonexhaustive description of the
158 documentation that may be submitted to the court as evidence of such compliance
159 and any other regulations for the preparation of such compliance reports that are
160 necessary for agencies which provide child welfare services to carry out their
161 duties. **Section 49** also authorizes the Court Administrator to prepare and make
162 available to the public certain forms and information to assist petitioners and to
163 design and offer trainings to courts having jurisdiction over adoption matters.

164 **Section 50** of this bill establishes provisions governing tribal customary
165 adoption, which is the adoption of an Indian child by and through the tribal custom,
166 traditions or law of the child's tribe without the termination of parental rights.

167 **Section 50** requires the Division to adopt certain regulations concerning tribal
168 customary adoption and authorizes: (1) the Supreme Court to adopt rules necessary
169 for the court processes to implement the provisions relating to tribal customary
170 adoption; and (2) the Court Administrator to prepare necessary forms for the
171 implementation of the provisions relating to tribal customary adoption. **Section 73**
172 of this bill requires the Division to submit a report to the Chairs of the Senate and
173 Assembly Standing Committees on Judiciary describing the implementation of
174 tribal customary adoption as an alternative permanency option for wards who are
175 Indian children and the Division's recommendation for proposed legislation to
176 improve the tribal customary adoption process.



177 **Section 41.5** of this bill provides that the provisions of **sections 42-50** do not
178 apply if: (1) in certain circumstances, a parent of an Indian child is voluntarily
179 terminating his or her parental rights and an extended family member of the Indian
180 child is subsequently adopting the Indian child upon the termination of the parental
181 rights of the parent; (2) a family member within the third degree of consanguinity
182 of an Indian child is adopting the Indian child; (3) an Indian child who was
183 conceived by means of assisted reproduction is being adopted; or (4) an Indian
184 child is being adopted by a stepparent or other nonbiological parent in a
185 confirmatory adoption. **Section 57** of this bill similarly provides that provisions
186 relating to proceedings that otherwise concern the termination of parental rights of
187 the parent of an Indian child do not apply in certain circumstances if a parent of an
188 Indian child is voluntarily terminating his or her parental rights and an extended
189 family member of the Indian child is subsequently adopting the Indian child upon
190 the termination of the parental rights of the parent.

191 **Section 65** of this bill requires the Division to adopt regulations necessary for
192 the implementation of **sections 2-38 and 42-50**.

193 **Section 67** of this bill requires an agency which provides child welfare services
194 to provide training for its personnel regarding the requirements of **sections 2-38**
195 **and 42-50**.

196 **Sections 40, 51-62 and 64-70** of this bill make conforming changes to
197 provisions of existing law to reflect the changes made in **sections 2-38**. **Section 78**
198 of this bill repeals certain provisions of existing law that are no longer necessary
199 because of the provisions of **sections 2-38**.

200 **Section 72** of this bill requires the Division and the Court Administrator to
201 submit biennial reports to the Chairs of the Senate and Assembly Standing
202 Committees on Judiciary containing certain data relating to Indian children in
203 dependency proceedings. **Section 76** of this bill authorizes the Court Administrator
204 to adopt any rules necessary to implement **sections 2-38 and 42-50**.

1 WHEREAS, Current research shows that family, culture and
2 community promote resiliency and health development in Indian
3 children; and

4 WHEREAS, Congress, working with tribal nations, tribal
5 leadership and advocates for Indian children, passed the Indian
6 Child Welfare Act, 25 U.S.C. §§ 1901 et seq., in 1978 to stop the
7 removal of Indian children from their homes, families and
8 communities; and

9 WHEREAS, At the time Congress passed the Indian Child
10 Welfare Act, Indian children were being removed by public and
11 private agencies at rates as high as 25 percent to 35 percent; and

12 WHEREAS, Indian children continue to be removed from their
13 homes at rates higher than other non-Indian children; and

14 WHEREAS, Despite requirements under the Indian Child Welfare
15 Act, application of the Indian Child Welfare Act in Nevada courts is
16 inconsistent; and

17 WHEREAS, Clearly addressing in state law the coordination
18 between and respective roles of the state and tribes regarding the
19 provision of child welfare services to Indian children will provide
20 uniform and consistent direction to state courts, tribes and



1 practitioners to prevent unlawful removals of Indian children from
2 their families and promote the stable placement of Indian children in
3 loving, permanent homes that are connected to family and culture;
4 now, therefore,
5

6 THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
7 SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:
8

9 **Section 1.** Title 11 of NRS is hereby amended by adding
10 thereto a new chapter to consist of the provisions set forth as
11 sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act.

12 **Sec. 2. 1.** *The Legislature hereby finds that the United*
13 *States Congress recognizes the special legal status of Indian tribes*
14 *and their members. It is the policy of this State to protect the*
15 *health and safety of Indian children and the stability and security*
16 *of Indian tribes and families by promoting practices designed to*
17 *prevent the removal of Indian children from their families and, if*
18 *removal is necessary and lawful, to prioritize the placement of an*
19 *Indian child with the Indian child's extended family and tribal*
20 *community.*

21 **2.** *This State recognizes the inherent jurisdiction of Indian*
22 *tribes to make decisions regarding the custody of Indian children*
23 *and also recognizes the importance of ensuring that Indian*
24 *children and Indian families receive appropriate services to*
25 *obviate the need to remove an Indian child from the Indian child's*
26 *home and, if removal is necessary and lawful, to effect the child's*
27 *safe return home.*

28 **3.** *Sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act create additional*
29 *safeguards for Indian children to address disproportionate rates of*
30 *removal, to improve the treatment of and services provided to*
31 *Indian children and Indian families in the child welfare system*
32 *and to ensure that Indian children who must be removed are*
33 *placed with Indian families, communities and cultures.*

34 **Sec. 3.** *As used in sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act, the*
35 *words and terms defined in sections 3.5 to 17, inclusive, of this act*
36 *have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.*

37 **Sec. 3.5.** *"Agency" means an agency which provides child*
38 *welfare services, as defined in NRS 432B.030.*

39 **Sec. 4.** *"Child custody proceeding" means a matter in which*
40 *the legal custody or physical custody of a child is an issue,*
41 *including, without limitation, a matter arising under chapter*
42 *125A, 127, 128 or 432B of NRS. The term does not include an*
43 *emergency proceeding.*

44 **Sec. 5.** *"Division" means the Division of Child and Family*
45 *Services of the Department of Health and Human Services.*



1 **Sec. 6.** *“Emergency proceeding” means any court action that*
2 *involves the emergency removal or emergency placement of an*
3 *Indian child, with or without a protective custody order.*

4 **Sec. 7.** *“Extended family member” has the meaning given*
5 *that term by the law or custom of an Indian child’s tribe or, if that*
6 *meaning cannot be determined, means a person who has attained*
7 *18 years of age and who is the Indian child’s grandparent, aunt,*
8 *uncle, brother, sister, sister-in-law, brother-in-law, niece, nephew,*
9 *first cousin, second cousin, stepparent or another person*
10 *determined by the Indian child’s tribe, clan or band member.*

11 **Sec. 8.** *“Indian” means a person who is a member of an*
12 *Indian tribe or who is an Alaska Native and a member of a*
13 *regional corporation as defined in section 7 of the Alaska Native*
14 *Claims Settlement Act, 43 U.S.C. § 1606.*

15 **Sec. 9.** *“Indian child” means any unmarried person who has*
16 *not attained 18 years of age and is:*

17 1. *A member or citizen of an Indian tribe; or*

18 2. *Eligible for membership or citizenship in an Indian tribe*
19 *and is the biological child of a member of an Indian tribe.*

20 **Sec. 10.** *“Indian custodian” means an Indian, other than the*
21 *Indian child’s parent, who has custody, as described in subsection*
22 *1 of section 18 of this act, of the Indian child, or to whom*
23 *temporary physical care, custody and control has been transferred*
24 *by the Indian child’s parent.*

25 **Sec. 11.** *“Indian tribe” or “tribe” means any Indian tribe,*
26 *band, nation or other organized group or community of Indians*
27 *federally recognized as eligible for the services provided to Indians*
28 *by the United States Secretary of the Interior because of their*
29 *status as Indians, including any Alaska Native village as defined*
30 *in 43 U.S.C. § 1602(c).*

31 **Sec. 12.** *“Juvenile court” has the meaning ascribed to it in*
32 *NRS 62A.180.*

33 **Sec. 13.** *“Member” or “membership” means a determination*
34 *by an Indian tribe that a person is a member or citizen in that*
35 *Indian tribe.*

36 **Sec. 14.** *“Parent” means:*

37 1. *A biological parent of an Indian child;*

38 2. *An Indian who has lawfully adopted an Indian child,*
39 *including adoptions made under tribal law or custom; or*

40 3. *A person who has established a parent and child*
41 *relationship with an Indian child pursuant to the laws of this*
42 *State.*

43 **Sec. 15.** *“Party” means a party to a proceeding.*

44 **Sec. 16.** *“Reservation” means Indian country as defined in*
45 *18 U.S.C. § 1151 and any lands not covered under that section, the*



1 *title to which is held by the United States in trust for the benefit of*
2 *an Indian tribe or person or held by an Indian tribe or person*
3 *subject to a restriction by the United States against alienation.*

4 **Sec. 17.** *“Tribal court” means a court with jurisdiction over*
5 *child custody proceedings involving an Indian child that is either a*
6 *Court of Indian Offenses, a court established and operated under*
7 *the code or custom of an Indian tribe or any other administrative*
8 *body of a tribe that is vested with authority over child custody*
9 *proceedings involving an Indian child.*

10 **Sec. 17.5. 1.** *Notwithstanding any other provision of law,*
11 *the provisions of sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act do not apply*
12 *if:*

13 (a) *A parent of an Indian child is voluntarily terminating his*
14 *or her parental rights and the provisions of chapter 432B of NRS*
15 *do not apply, and an extended family member of the Indian child*
16 *is subsequently adopting the Indian child upon the termination of*
17 *the parental rights of the parent of the Indian child;*

18 (b) *A family member related within the third degree of*
19 *consanguinity to an Indian child is adopting the Indian child;*

20 (c) *An Indian child who was conceived by means of assisted*
21 *reproduction is being adopted; or*

22 (d) *An Indian child is being adopted by a stepparent or other*
23 *nonbiological parent in a confirmatory adoption.*

24 **2.** *As used in this section:*

25 (a) *“Assisted reproduction” has the meaning ascribed to it in*
26 *NRS 126.510.*

27 (b) *“Confirmatory adoption” means an adoption in which a*
28 *nonbiological parent of a child, including, without limitation, a*
29 *stepparent, co-parent or second parent, adopts the child to confirm*
30 *the parental rights of the nonbiological parent.*

31 **Sec. 18. 1.** *A person has custody of an Indian child under*
32 *sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act if the person has physical*
33 *custody or legal custody of the Indian child under any applicable*
34 *tribal law, tribal custom or state law.*

35 **2.** *An Indian child’s parent has continued custody of the*
36 *Indian child if the parent currently has, or previously had, custody*
37 *of the Indian child.*

38 **Sec. 19.** (Deleted by amendment.)

39 **Sec. 20.** *In a child custody proceeding involving an Indian*
40 *child, when making a determination regarding the best interests of*
41 *the child in accordance with sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act,*
42 *chapter 125A, 127, 128 or 432B of NRS, the Indian Child Welfare*
43 *Act, 25 U.S.C. §§ 1901 et seq., or any applicable regulations or*
44 *rules regarding sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act, chapter*
45 *125A, 127, 128 or 432B of NRS or the Indian Child Welfare Act,*



1 *the court shall, in consultation with the Indian child's tribe,*
2 *consider the following:*

3 *1. The protection of the safety, well-being, development and*
4 *stability of the Indian child;*

5 *2. The prevention of unnecessary out-of-home placement of*
6 *the Indian child;*

7 *3. The prioritization of placement of the Indian child in*
8 *accordance with the placement preferences under section 37 of*
9 *this act;*

10 *4. The value to the Indian child of establishing, developing or*
11 *maintaining a political, cultural, social and spiritual relationship*
12 *with the Indian child's tribe and tribal community; and*

13 *5. The importance to the Indian child of the Indian tribe's*
14 *ability to maintain the tribe's existence and integrity in promotion*
15 *of the stability and security of Indian children and families.*

16 **Sec. 21.** *For purposes of sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this*
17 *act:*

18 *1. A person's domicile is the place the person regards as*
19 *home, where the person intends to remain or to which, if absent,*
20 *the person intends to return.*

21 *2. An Indian child's domicile is, in order of priority, the*
22 *domicile of:*

23 *(a) The Indian child's parents or, if the Indian child's parents*
24 *do not have the same domicile, the Indian child's parent who has*
25 *physical custody of the Indian child;*

26 *(b) The Indian child's Indian custodian; or*

27 *(c) The Indian child's guardian.*

28 **Sec. 22.** *1. Unless an Indian child's parent objects, the*
29 *appropriate agency shall provide assistance with enrolling an*
30 *Indian child within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court under*
31 *NRS 432B.410 in a tribe with which the child is eligible for*
32 *enrollment.*

33 *2. In any child custody proceeding under chapter 432B of*
34 *NRS involving an Indian child, if the appropriate agency*
35 *reasonably believes that the Indian child is eligible for enrollment*
36 *in a tribe, the agency shall notify the Indian child's parents of*
37 *their right to object to the agency's assistance under subsection 1.*
38 *The provision of notice pursuant to this subsection is deemed to be*
39 *satisfied by sending the notice to the last known mailing address of*
40 *each of the Indian child's parents.*

41 **Sec. 23.** *1. In a child custody proceeding in which an*
42 *Indian child is alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the court,*
43 *the Indian child's tribe is:*



1 (a) *If the Indian child is a member of or is eligible for*
2 *membership in only one tribe, the tribe of which the Indian child*
3 *is a member or eligible for membership.*

4 (b) *If the Indian child is a member of one tribe but is eligible*
5 *for membership in one or more other tribes, the tribe of which the*
6 *Indian child is a member.*

7 (c) *If the Indian child is a member of more than one tribe or if*
8 *the Indian child is not a member of any tribe but is eligible for*
9 *membership with more than one tribe:*

10 (1) *The tribe designated by agreement between the tribes of*
11 *which the Indian child is a member or in which the Indian child is*
12 *eligible for membership; or*

13 (2) *If the tribes are unable to agree on the designation of*
14 *the Indian child's tribe, the tribe designated by the court.*

15 2. *When designating an Indian child's tribe under*
16 *subparagraph (2) of paragraph (c) of subsection 1, the court shall,*
17 *after a hearing, designate the tribe with which the Indian child*
18 *has the more significant contacts, taking into consideration the*
19 *following:*

20 (a) *The preference of the Indian child's parent;*

21 (b) *The duration of the Indian child's current or prior*
22 *domicile or residence on or near the reservation of each tribe;*

23 (c) *The tribal membership of the Indian child's custodial*
24 *parent or Indian custodian;*

25 (d) *The interests asserted by each tribe;*

26 (e) *Whether a tribe has previously adjudicated a case involving*
27 *the Indian child; and*

28 (f) *If the court determines that the Indian child is of sufficient*
29 *age and capacity to meaningfully self-identify, the self-*
30 *identification of the Indian child.*

31 3. *If an Indian child is a member of or is eligible for*
32 *membership in more than one tribe, the court may, in its*
33 *discretion, permit a tribe, in addition to the Indian child's tribe, to*
34 *participate in a proceeding under chapter 432B of NRS involving*
35 *the Indian child in an advisory capacity or as a party.*

36 **Sec. 24.** *In any child custody proceeding involving an Indian*
37 *child that is based on allegations that the Indian child is within the*
38 *jurisdiction of the court, the court must determine the residence*
39 *and domicile of the Indian child and whether the Indian child is a*
40 *ward of tribal court. The court shall communicate with any tribal*
41 *courts to the extent necessary to make a determination under this*
42 *section.*

43 **Sec. 25. 1.** *Agencies shall make a good faith effort to enter*
44 *into a tribal-state agreement with any Indian tribe within the*
45 *borders of this State. Agencies may also enter into a tribal-state*



1 *agreement with any Indian tribe outside of this State having*
2 *significant numbers of member children or membership-eligible*
3 *children residing in this State.*

4 *2. The purposes of a tribal-state agreement are to promote the*
5 *continued existence and integrity of the Indian tribe as a political*
6 *entity and to protect the vital interests of Indian children in*
7 *securing and maintaining political, cultural and social*
8 *relationships with their tribe.*

9 *3. A tribal-state agreement may include agreements*
10 *regarding default jurisdiction over cases in which the state courts*
11 *and tribal courts have concurrent jurisdiction, the transfer of*
12 *cases between state courts and tribal courts, the assessment,*
13 *removal, placement, custody and adoption of Indian children and*
14 *any other child welfare services provided to Indian children.*

15 *4. A tribal-state agreement must:*

16 *(a) Provide for the cooperative delivery of child welfare*
17 *services to Indian children in this State, including, without*
18 *limitation, the utilization, to the extent available, of services*
19 *provided by the tribe or an organization whose mission is to serve*
20 *the American Indian or Alaska Native population to implement*
21 *the terms of the tribal-state agreement; and*

22 *(b) If services provided by the tribe or an organization whose*
23 *mission is to serve the American Indian or Alaska Native*
24 *population are unavailable, provide for an agency's use of*
25 *community services and resources developed specifically for*
26 *Indian families that have the demonstrated experience and*
27 *capacity to provide culturally relevant and effective services to*
28 *Indian children.*

29 **Sec. 26.** *1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the*
30 *court's jurisdiction in a child custody proceeding involving an*
31 *Indian child is concurrent with the Indian child's tribe.*

32 *2. The tribe has exclusive jurisdiction in a child custody*
33 *proceeding involving an Indian child if:*

34 *(a) The Indian child is a ward of a tribal court of the tribe; or*

35 *(b) The Indian child resides or is domiciled within the*
36 *reservation of the tribe.*

37 *3. Communications between the court and a tribal court*
38 *regarding calendars, court records and similar matters may occur*
39 *without informing the parties or creating a record of the*
40 *communications.*

41 *4. Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the juvenile*
42 *court has temporary exclusive jurisdiction over an Indian child*
43 *who is placed in protective custody pursuant to chapter 432B of*
44 *NRS.*



1 5. *As used in this section, "record" means information that is*
2 *inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or*
3 *other medium and is retrievable in perceivable form.*

4 **Sec. 27. 1.** *Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4,*
5 *the court shall transfer a child custody proceeding involving an*
6 *Indian child if, at any time during the proceeding, the Indian*
7 *child's parent, Indian custodian or tribe petitions the court to*
8 *transfer the proceeding to the tribal court.*

9 2. *Upon receipt of a transfer motion, the court shall contact*
10 *the Indian child's tribe and request a timely response regarding*
11 *whether the tribe intends to decline the transfer.*

12 3. *If a party objects to the transfer motion for good cause, the*
13 *court shall fix the time for hearing on objections to the motion. At*
14 *the hearing, the objecting party has the burden of proof of*
15 *establishing by clear and convincing evidence that good cause*
16 *exists to deny the transfer. If the Indian child's tribe contests the*
17 *assertion that good cause exists to deny the transfer, the court*
18 *shall give the tribe's argument substantial weight. When making a*
19 *determination whether good cause exists to deny the transfer*
20 *motion, the court may not consider:*

21 (a) *Whether the proceeding is at an advanced stage;*

22 (b) *Whether there has been a prior proceeding involving the*
23 *Indian child in which a transfer motion was not filed;*

24 (c) *Whether the transfer could affect the placement of the*
25 *Indian child;*

26 (d) *The cultural connections of the Indian child with the tribe*
27 *or the tribe's reservation; or*

28 (e) *The socioeconomic conditions of the Indian child's tribe or*
29 *any negative perception of tribal or United States Bureau of*
30 *Indian Affairs' social services or judicial systems.*

31 4. *The court shall deny the transfer motion if:*

32 (a) *The tribe declines the transfer orally on the record or in*
33 *writing;*

34 (b) *The Indian child's parent objects to the transfer; or*

35 (c) *The court finds by clear and convincing evidence, after*
36 *hearing, that good cause exists to deny the transfer.*

37 5. *Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of subsection 4, the*
38 *objection of the Indian child's parent does not preclude the*
39 *transfer if:*

40 (a) *The objecting parent dies or the objecting parent's parental*
41 *rights are terminated and have not been restored; and*

42 (b) *The Indian child's remaining parent, Indian custodian or*
43 *tribe files a new transfer motion subsequent to the death of the*
44 *objecting parent or the termination of the parental rights of the*
45 *objecting parent.*



1 6. *If the court denies a transfer under this section, the court*
2 *shall document the basis for the denial in a written order.*

3 **Sec. 28.** *Upon granting a transfer motion under section 27 of*
4 *this act, the court shall expeditiously:*

5 1. *Notify the tribal court of the pending dismissal of the child*
6 *custody proceeding;*

7 2. *Transfer all information regarding the proceeding,*
8 *including, without limitation, pleadings and court records, to the*
9 *tribal court;*

10 3. *If the Indian child is alleged to be within the jurisdiction of*
11 *the juvenile court under NRS 432B.410, direct the appropriate*
12 *agency to:*

13 (a) *Coordinate with the tribal court and the Indian child's*
14 *tribe to ensure that the transfer of the proceeding and the transfer*
15 *of custody of the Indian child is accomplished with minimal*
16 *disruption of services to the Indian child and the Indian child's*
17 *family; and*

18 (b) *Provide the Indian child's tribe with documentation related*
19 *to the Indian child's eligibility for state and federal assistance and*
20 *information related to the Indian child's social history, treatment*
21 *diagnosis and services and other relevant case and service related*
22 *data; and*

23 4. *Dismiss the proceeding upon confirmation from the tribal*
24 *court that the tribal court received the transferred information.*

25 **Sec. 29.** (Deleted by amendment.)

26 **Sec. 30.** 1. *At the commencement of any child custody*
27 *proceeding, the court must ask each party whether the party*
28 *knows or has reason to know that the child is an Indian child. All*
29 *responses to such an inquiry must be made on the record. The*
30 *court must instruct the parties to inform the court if they*
31 *subsequently receive information that provides reason to know the*
32 *child is an Indian child.*

33 2. *If there is reason to know that a child in a child custody*
34 *proceeding is an Indian child but the court does not have*
35 *sufficient evidence to determine whether the child is an Indian*
36 *child, the court must:*

37 (a) *Confirm, by way of a report, declaration or testimony*
38 *included in the record that an agency or party used due diligence*
39 *to identify and work with all of the tribes of which there is*
40 *reason to know the child may be a member or is eligible for*
41 *membership to verify whether the child is a member or the child's*
42 *parent is a member and the child is eligible for membership; and*

43 (b) *Treat the child as an Indian child, unless and until it is*
44 *determined on the record that the child is not an Indian child.*



1 3. A court, upon conducting the inquiry required pursuant to
2 subsection 1, has reason to know that a child in a child custody
3 proceeding is an Indian child if:

4 (a) Any party, officer of the court involved in the proceeding,
5 Indian tribe, Indian organization or agency informs the court that
6 the child is an Indian child;

7 (b) Any party, officer of the court involved in the proceeding,
8 Indian tribe, Indian organization or agency informs the court that
9 it has discovered information indicating that the child is an Indian
10 child;

11 (c) The child who is the subject of the proceeding gives the
12 court reason to know that the child is an Indian child;

13 (d) The court is informed that the domicile or residence of the
14 child, the child's parent or the child's Indian custodian is on a
15 reservation or in an Alaska Native village;

16 (e) The court is informed that the child is or has been a ward
17 of a tribal court; or

18 (f) The court is informed that the child or the child's parent
19 possesses an identification card indicating membership in an
20 Indian tribe.

21 4. In seeking verification of a child's status in a child custody
22 proceeding in which there is a consenting parent who evidences,
23 by written request or statement in the record, a desire for
24 anonymity, the court must keep relevant documents pertaining to
25 the inquiry required under this section confidential and under
26 seal. A request for anonymity does not relieve the court, an agency
27 or any party from any duty of compliance with the Indian Child
28 Welfare Act, 25 U.S.C. §§ 1901 et seq., including, without
29 limitation, the duty to verify whether the child is an Indian child.
30 A tribe receiving information related to this inquiry must keep
31 documents and information confidential.

32 **Sec. 31. 1.** In an emergency proceeding, the person taking
33 a child into protective custody must make a good faith effort to
34 determine whether there is reason to know that the child is an
35 Indian child and, if there is reason to know that the child is an
36 Indian child and the nature of the emergency allows, the
37 appropriate agency shall notify by telephone, electronic mail,
38 facsimile or other means of immediate communication any tribe of
39 which the child is or may be a member. Notification under this
40 subsection must include the basis for the child's removal, the time,
41 date and place of the initial hearing and a statement that the tribe
42 has the right to participate in the proceeding as a party or in an
43 advisory capacity.

44 2. Except as provided in subsection 1, if there is reason to
45 know that a child in a child custody proceeding who is alleged to



1 *be within the court's jurisdiction is an Indian child and notice is*
2 *required, the party providing notice shall:*

3 *(a) Promptly send notice of the proceeding as described in*
4 *subsection 3; and*

5 *(b) File a copy of each notice sent pursuant to this section with*
6 *the court, together with any return receipts or other proof of*
7 *service.*

8 **3. Notice under subsection 2 must be:**

9 **(a) Sent to:**

10 **(1) Each tribe of which the child may be a member or of**
11 **which the Indian child may be eligible for membership; or**

12 **(2) The appropriate Regional Director of the United States**
13 **Bureau of Indian Affairs listed in 25 C.F.R. § 23.11(b), if the**
14 **identity or location of the child's tribe cannot be ascertained.**

15 **(b) Sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt**
16 **requested.**

17 **(c) In clear and understandable language and include the**
18 **following:**

19 **(1) The child's name, date of birth and, if known, place of**
20 **birth;**

21 **(2) To the extent known:**

22 **(I) All names, including maiden, married and former**
23 **names or aliases, of the child's parents, the places of birth of the**
24 **child's parents' and tribal enrollment numbers; and**

25 **(II) The names, dates of birth, places of birth and tribal**
26 **enrollment information of other direct lineal ancestors of the**
27 **child;**

28 **(3) The name of each Indian tribe of which the child is a**
29 **member or in which the Indian child may be eligible for**
30 **membership;**

31 **(4) If notice is required to be sent to the appropriate**
32 **Regional Director of the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs**
33 **under subparagraph (2) of paragraph (a), to the extent known,**
34 **information regarding the child's direct lineal ancestors, an**
35 **ancestral chart for each biological parent, and the child's tribal**
36 **affiliations and blood quantum;**

37 **(5) In a child custody proceeding, a copy of the petition or**
38 **motion initiating the proceeding and, if a hearing has been**
39 **scheduled, information on the date, time and location of the**
40 **hearing;**

41 **(6) The name of the petitioner and the name and address of**
42 **the attorney of the petitioner;**

43 **(7) In a proceeding under chapter 432B of NRS:**



1 (I) A statement that the child's parent or Indian
2 custodian has the right to participate in the proceeding as a party
3 to the proceeding;

4 (II) A statement that the child's tribe has the right to
5 participate in the proceeding as a party or in an advisory capacity;

6 (III) A statement that if the court determines that the
7 child's parent or Indian custodian is unable to afford counsel, the
8 parent or Indian custodian has the right to court-appointed
9 counsel; and

10 (IV) A statement that the child's parent, Indian
11 custodian or tribe has the right, upon request, to up to 20
12 additional days to prepare for the proceeding;

13 (8) A statement that the child's parent, Indian custodian or
14 tribe has the right to petition the court to transfer the child custody
15 proceeding to the tribal court;

16 (9) A statement describing the potential legal consequences
17 of the proceeding on the future parental and custodial rights of
18 the parent or Indian custodian;

19 (10) The mailing addresses and telephone numbers of the
20 court and contact information for all parties to the proceeding;
21 and

22 (11) A statement that the information contained in the
23 notice is confidential and that the notice should not be shared with
24 any person not needing the information to exercise rights under
25 sections 2 to 38, inclusive, of this act.

26 4. If there is a reason to know that the Indian child's parent
27 or Indian custodian has limited English proficiency, the court
28 must provide language access services as required by Title VI of
29 the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. §§ 2000d et seq., and other
30 applicable federal and state laws. If the court is unable to secure
31 translation or interpretation support, the court shall contact or
32 direct a party to contact the Indian child's tribe or the local office
33 of the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs for assistance
34 identifying a qualified translator or interpreter.

35 5. If a child is known to be an Indian child, a hearing may
36 not be held until at least 10 days after the receipt of the notice by
37 the Indian child's tribe or, if applicable, the United States Bureau
38 of Indian Affairs. Upon request, the court shall grant the Indian
39 child's parent, Indian custodian or tribe up to 20 additional days
40 from the date upon which notice was received by the tribe to
41 prepare for participation in the hearing. Nothing in this
42 subsection prevents a court at an emergency proceeding before the
43 expiration of the waiting period described in this subsection from
44 reviewing the removal of an Indian child from the Indian child's
45 parent or Indian custodian to determine whether the removal or



1 *placement is no longer necessary to prevent imminent physical*
2 *damage or harm to the Indian child.*

3 **Sec. 32.** 1. *In any child custody proceeding involving an*
4 *Indian child that requires the testimony of a qualified expert*
5 *witness, the petitioner shall contact the Indian child's tribe and*
6 *request that the tribe identify one or more persons meeting the*
7 *criteria described in subsection 3 or 4. The petitioner may also*
8 *request the assistance of the United States Bureau of Indian*
9 *Affairs in locating persons meeting the criteria described in*
10 *subsection 3 or 4.*

11 2. *At a hearing in a child custody proceeding, if the court has*
12 *found that a child is an Indian child, at least one qualified expert*
13 *witness must testify regarding whether the continued custody of*
14 *the Indian child by the child's parent or custody by the child's*
15 *Indian custodian is likely to result in serious emotional or physical*
16 *damage to the Indian child.*

17 3. *A person is a qualified expert witness under this section if*
18 *the Indian child's tribe has designated the person as being*
19 *qualified to testify to the prevailing social and cultural standards*
20 *of the tribe.*

21 4. *If the Indian child's tribe has not identified a qualified*
22 *expert witness, the following persons, in order of priority, may*
23 *testify as a qualified expert witness:*

24 (a) *A member of the Indian child's tribe or another person*
25 *who is recognized by the tribe as knowledgeable about tribal*
26 *customs regarding family organization or child rearing practices;*

27 (b) *A person having substantial experience in the delivery of*
28 *child and family services to Indians and extensive knowledge of*
29 *prevailing social and cultural standards and child rearing*
30 *practices within the Indian child's tribe; or*

31 (c) *Any person having substantial experience in the delivery of*
32 *child and family services to Indians and knowledge of prevailing*
33 *social and cultural standards and child rearing practices in Indian*
34 *tribes with cultural similarities to the child's tribe.*

35 5. *In addition to testimony from a qualified expert witness,*
36 *the court may hear supplemental testimony regarding information*
37 *described in subsection 2 from a professional having substantial*
38 *education and experience in the area of the professional's*
39 *specialty.*

40 6. *No petitioning party, employees of the petitioning party or*
41 *an employee of an agency may serve as a qualified expert witness*
42 *or a professional under this section.*

43 **Sec. 33.** 1. *If a child in a child custody proceeding is an*
44 *Indian child and active efforts are required, the court must*



1 *determine whether active efforts have been made to prevent the*
2 *breakup of the family or to reunite the family.*

3 2. *Active efforts require a higher standard of conduct than*
4 *reasonable efforts.*

5 3. *Active efforts must:*

6 (a) *Be documented in detail in writing and on the record;*

7 (b) *If the child is alleged to be within the jurisdiction of the*
8 *juvenile court under NRS 432B.410, include assisting the Indian*
9 *child's parent or parents or Indian custodian through the steps of*
10 *a case plan;*

11 (c) *Include, to the extent possible, providing assistance with*
12 *the cooperation of the Indian child's tribe;*

13 (d) *Be conducted in partnership with the Indian child and the*
14 *Indian child's parents, extended family members, Indian*
15 *custodians and tribe; and*

16 (e) *Be tailored to the facts and circumstances of the case.*

17 4. *As used in this section, "active efforts" means efforts that*
18 *are affirmative, active, thorough, timely and intended to maintain*
19 *or reunite an Indian child with the Indian child's family.*

20 **Sec. 34.** 1. *Notwithstanding the provisions of NRS 7.285, a*
21 *tribe that is a party to a child custody proceeding involving an*
22 *Indian child may be represented by any person, regardless of*
23 *whether the person is licensed to practice law.*

24 2. *An attorney who is not barred from practicing law in this*
25 *State may appear in any proceeding involving an Indian child*
26 *without associating with local counsel if the attorney establishes to*
27 *the satisfaction of the State Bar of Nevada that:*

28 (a) *The attorney will appear in a court in this State for the*
29 *limited purpose of participating in a proceeding under chapter*
30 *432B of NRS subject to the provisions of sections 2 to 38,*
31 *inclusive, of this act;*

32 (b) *The attorney represents an Indian child's parent, Indian*
33 *custodian or tribe; and*

34 (c) *The Indian child's tribe has affirmed the Indian child's*
35 *membership or eligibility for membership under tribal law.*

36 3. *An Indian custodian or tribe may notify the court, orally*
37 *on the record or in writing, that the Indian custodian or tribe*
38 *withdraws as a party to the proceeding.*

39 **Sec. 35.** 1. *If a child in a proceeding under chapter 432B of*
40 *NRS is an Indian child:*

41 (a) *The court shall appoint counsel to represent the Indian*
42 *child.*

43 (b) *If the Indian child's parent or Indian custodian requests*
44 *counsel to represent the parent or Indian custodian but is without*
45 *sufficient financial means to employ suitable counsel possessing*



1 *skills and experience commensurate with the nature of the petition*
2 *and the complexity of the case, the court shall appoint suitable*
3 *counsel to represent the Indian child's parent or Indian custodian*
4 *if the parent or Indian custodian is determined to be financially*
5 *eligible for the appointment of such counsel.*

6 2. *Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, upon*
7 *presentation of the order of appointment under this section by the*
8 *attorney for the Indian child, any agency, hospital, school*
9 *organization, division or department of this State, doctor, nurse or*
10 *other health care provider, psychologist, psychiatrist, law*
11 *enforcement agency or mental health clinic shall permit the*
12 *attorney for the Indian child to inspect and copy any records of the*
13 *Indian child involved in the case, without the consent of*
14 *the Indian child or the Indian child's parent or Indian custodian.*
15 *This subsection does not apply to records of a law enforcement*
16 *agency relating to an ongoing investigation before bringing*
17 *charges.*

18 **Sec. 36.** 1. *In any child custody proceeding, if the child is*
19 *an Indian child, each party has the right to timely examine all*
20 *reports or other documents held by an agency that are not*
21 *otherwise subject to a discovery exception or precluded under state*
22 *or federal law.*

23 2. *The preservation of confidentiality under this section does*
24 *not relieve the court or any petitioners in an adoption proceeding*
25 *from the duty to comply with the placement preferences under*
26 *section 37 of this act if the child is an Indian child.*

27 **Sec. 37.** 1. *Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, if*
28 *the parental rights of an Indian child's parents have not been*
29 *terminated and the Indian child is in need of placement or*
30 *continuation in substitute care, the child must be placed in the*
31 *least restrictive setting that:*

32 (a) *Most closely approximates a family, taking into*
33 *consideration sibling attachment;*

34 (b) *Allows the Indian child's special needs, if any, to be met;*

35 (c) *Is in reasonable proximity to the Indian child's home,*
36 *extended family or siblings; and*

37 (d) *Is in accordance with the order of preference established*
38 *by the Indian child's tribe or, if the Indian child's tribe has not*
39 *established placement preferences, is in accordance with the*
40 *following order of preference:*

41 (1) *A member of the Indian child's extended family;*

42 (2) *A foster home licensed, approved or specified by the*
43 *Indian child's tribe;*



1 (3) A foster home licensed or approved by a licensing
2 authority in this State and in which one or more of the licensed or
3 approved foster parents is an Indian; or

4 (4) An institution for children that has a program suitable
5 to meet the Indian child's needs and is approved by an Indian
6 tribe or operated by an Indian organization.

7 2. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, if the
8 parental rights of the Indian child's parents have been terminated
9 and the Indian child is in need of an adoptive placement, the
10 Indian child shall be placed:

11 (a) In accordance with the order of preference established by
12 the Indian child's tribe; or

13 (b) If the Indian child's tribe has not established placement
14 preferences, according to the following order of preference:

15 (1) With a member of the Indian child's extended family;

16 (2) With other members of the Indian child's tribe; or

17 (3) With other Indian families.

18 3. If an Indian child is placed outside of the placement
19 preferences set forth in subsection 1 or 2, the party placing the
20 child shall file a motion requesting that the court make a finding
21 that good cause exists for placement outside of such placement
22 preferences. If the court determines that the moving party has
23 established, by clear and convincing evidence, that there is good
24 cause to depart from the placement preferences under this section,
25 the court may authorize placement in an alternative placement.
26 The court's determination under this subsection:

27 (a) Must be in writing and be based on:

28 (1) The preferences of the Indian child;

29 (2) The presence of a sibling attachment that cannot be
30 maintained through placement consistent with the placement
31 preferences established by subsection 1 or 2;

32 (3) Any extraordinary physical, mental or emotional needs

6 (b) If ~~[applicable, each Indian tribe of]~~ the child who is ~~[the]~~

8 *motion is known to be an Indian child, the child's Indian tribe;*

10 (c) Any known relative of the child who is the subject of the
11 motion within the fifth degree of consanguinity who is residing in

13 5. If an attorney has consented to electronic service, a copy of
14 the motion and notice of the hearing on the motion may be sent to
15 the attorney electronically instead of by certified mail.

16 6. The court shall ensure that any prospective adoptive parent
17 of the child who is the subject of the motion is provided with a copy
18 of the notice of the hearing on the motion. Except as otherwise
19 provided in NRS 432B.5904 or another provision of law, the name
20 and address of the prospective adoptive parent must be kept
21 confidential.

22 7. Any party to the proceeding may file a written response to
23 the motion.

5 8. The number of times the court found that good cause existed
6 to deviate from the statutory placement preferences under section 37
7 of this act, when making a finding regarding the placement of a
8 child in a dependency proceeding.

9 9. The number of cases that were transferred to tribal court
10 under section 28 of this act.

11 10. The number of times the court found good cause to decline
12 to transfer jurisdiction of a dependency proceeding to tribal court
13 upon request and the most common reasons the court found good
14 cause to decline a transfer petition.

15 11. The efforts the Division and the Court Administrator have
16 taken to ensure compliance with the provisions of sections 2 to 38,

19 12. The number of ICWA compliance reports in which an
20 agency which provides child welfare services reported the

14 necessary to implement the provisions of sections 2 to 38, inclusive,
15 of this act and sections 42 to 50, inclusive, of this act.

16 **Sec. 77.** The provisions of subsection 1 of NRS 218D.380 do
17 not apply to any provision of this act which adds or revises a
18 requirement to submit a report to the Legislature.

19 **Sec. 78.** NRS 62D.200, 127.013, 127.017, 128.027, 432B.451
20 and 432B.465 are hereby repealed.

21 **Sec. 79.** This act becomes effective:

22 1. Upon passage and approval for the purpose of adopting
23 regulations and performing any other preparatory administrative
24 tasks that are necessary to carry out the provisions of this act; and

25 2. On January 1, 2024, for all other purposes.
